If the State and its newest custodians are real about their policies - let the HSE and Dept of Health give a 100 year lease on St. Brigids and all its empty units to either the Dept. of Education or Enterprise Ireland for an IT/Software Hub. - 45 minutes from the Wild Atlantic Way and 110 minutes from the Spire?

Local efforts alone will not solve employment and enterprise development!

NEW MINISTER MAKES HISTORIC FIRST VISIT

The new Minister for Communications, Climate Change and Natural Resources, Denis Naughten, had a historic homecoming to the town of his birth within hours of him receiving his seal of office from Taoiseach Enda Kenny and President Michael D. Higgins.

Whilst the evening was inclement it did not dampen enthusiasim for those supporters and well wishers who met his cavalcade in St. Michaels Square on Saturday night14th of May.

Speaking to the crowd he thanked the people of Ballinasloe and its hinterland who supported him in the last election in a very big way. "I intend to return that trust to you all in everything I can do as a Government Minister and can guarantee that towns like Ballinasloe will be getting a huge focus from this new Government and Cabinet".

He has said that he secured "97 per cent" of what he wanted to be included in the new programme for government.

The Independent Roscommon-Galway TD, who is a member of the Rural Alliance, believed that if the programme is implemented, "every provincial and rural town in Ireland will see significant improvements" during the lifetime of the new government.

He believed that the provisions set out in the long-negotiated programme would make the future of local Portiuncula Hospital more secure.

"There is an ongoing problem with senior management in the HSE who, despite the best efforts of the Minister and the department, published various reviews which reflected negatively on Portiuncula and damaged its reputation.

"There will of course be reviews and they are necessary but it is specifically written in the programme for government that in any review that will take place – geography must be taken into account", said Minister Naughten.

He explained that the job of protecting services is made more difficult when it is claimed that patients will only have to travel 40 minutes from Portiuncula to UCG – not taking into account that there are patients already travelling for well over an hour to reach the Ballinasloe Hospital.

The Minister said he was hopeful that with this new sway at cabinet, he will be able work to secure capital funding and investment in the health services locally.

Rural broadband will not be under the remit of the Minister for Communications. However, Minister Naughten said he will work closely with Heather Humphreys to ensure that the rollout of the programme will take place as soon as possible.

"I have made clear to the Secretary General, and the Assistant Secretary General, that my number one priority in communications is rural broadband – and my number two priority is rural broadband, and my three priority is rural broadband," he stated...

"I want to see all of rural Ireland develop," he said. "All I have ever asked for is that we get our fair share of what we should have been getting up to now".

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TOWN TEAM TO EXAMINE FEASIBILITY FOR NEW APP

This has been a growing issue for many of the businesses within the town and surrounding area. To attract the consumer while being able to show off their products has been a constant struggle. A possible answer to this showed up recently, at a Town Team Business Networking seminar in Gullanes Hotel.

At this meeting, Terry Young of TownApps, showed off an innovative mobile, tablet and desktop app. The principle idea is for Ballinasloe to have its own app, which would contain all the local businesses, community groups and sport clubs within the locale.

Then each business owner or PRO would have its own admin login and would be able to constantly update their own page within the app, with special offers and/or events. This app once started would be free to download and would provide up to date information on a daily, weekly basis to the community and for any tourists who happen to pass through.

It is effectively a weekly newsletter on your phone available at any time. This app concept is already successfully in use in Ireland in towns such as Athlone and Dundalk.

The promising idea was well received at a broad representative meeting with a view towards tapping into the over 2.1 million people using apps. The majority of this group are between the ages of 15-55, the key demographic for many organisations and clubs. It is a huge market pool to dip into and it is crucial that the community makes use of these services in the future, especially when its APPs and social media that is now taking the place of maps and motor way signs for most passing motorists on the M6.

Critically the meeting was briefed on some of the social media landscape facts for our online community - for instance some 40% of businesses here, still have not gone live with the listings on Ballinasloe.ie. A service set up by the Town Team - a year and a

half ago which promoted the businesses and gave them an online presence for FREE. Equally concerning is some 65% of all commercial organisations or facilities have no presence on Trip Advisor, 75% are not on Google Maps and 80% have not been updating or refreshing their information on social media sites within 10 days.

These figures are in in stark comparison to the community groups and clubs who are examples of good utilisation of social media.

Needing a minimum of 80 socially engaged businesses, All Club PROs and community organisations will have to frequently update their own pages - the possibility for this app to be effectively used will take some more ground work.

The Town Team, the LIFE Marketing Team and Ballinasloe.ie Webmaster Sinead Colleran are examining the feasibility of a pre launch rollout campaign for the Autumn – early winter period to ensure that within 12 month that the business community will be app ready.

The enjoyable and successful networking evening hosted in Gullanes Hotel concluded with refreshments and questions and answers from all present.



BALLINDERRY NURSING HOME RATED HIGHLY

The Health watchdog HIQA has recently published its latest inspection report on this Local Nursing Home and the premises received fantastic results!

Ballinderry Nursing Home, Kilconnell opened in 1998 and since then the organisation has worked and cared for their patients to the highest standard over the years and this has been recognised by many.

On behalf of Ballinderry Nursing Home Ltd., Ms. Mary Noone welcomed the positive HIQA findings and paid tribute to the dedicated and professional staff who the inspectorate "found to be to be committed to providing a good standard of care to the residents".

The workers are all highly trained individuals ensuring that the residents will be well looked after and cared for! Comprising of

general staff, intellectual disability, psychiatric nurses, CQI level 5 care assistants, Chefs, Household staff, maintenance, physiotherapist, Activities coordinators, and an occupational Therapist.

The Inspectorate found that recognised assessment tools were used to evaluate residents' progress, assess their needs and develop care plans. There was good standard of personal and nursing care and on admission a detailed nursing assessment, relevant risk assessments and care plans that fully outline the residents' needs were completed.



This is made even more impressive due to the wide range of conditions they care for, including dementia, long term, respite, palliative and post-surgery care. Furthermore the Home has had personnel trained in the "Imagination Gym" programme, SONAS, which it offers to its dementia residents and has impacted very positively on their activities.

Adrian Ahern the recently appointed "Person in Charge" also welcomed the report, which followed an unannounced inspection and said he was very happy and said "all involved in the Nursing Home are constantly striving to improve the life experience of the residents and looking at innovative ways of delivering high quality care to the residents and their families, whether as long term residents or those availing of respite or post-operative recuperation".

Ballinderry currently has 52 staff members and is able to house and cater for 44 individuals and all their needs. They are able to facilitate early discharge from acute hospitals by providing "step down" facilities and by providing services to those residents for whom "Home Care" is no longer suitable as well as to cater for those with the conditions mentioned previously.

With a bed capacity of 44, with 14 single bed rooms and 15 double rooms, and as the majority are en suite not only do they fully meet the requirements of HIQA and Health Acts and that they are recognised by VHI, this also ensures that you will be very comfortable during your stay at the home!

A new and exciting initiative to develop the municipality as an accessible, inclusive environment has been recently launched.

The focus for the project is to develop the town and hinterland as an area which welcomes and supports everyone to live an independent and healthy life regardless of their age or any disability. Many representatives from all Clubs, Groups, Organisations, Businesses and Schools attended the event in Gullanes Hotel, enforcing the message

that together we can identify what changes we can make and how we can make them happen!

The project was born out of a recognition that although much progress has been made to date, there are still many shortcomings and this is at a stage which requires continuous develo pment and adaptation to meet the needs of everyone in our community.

Accessibility Ballinasloe are taking a holistic approach which will be cognisant all life stages from parents with babies and young

children to older adults. Another key aspect of the project will focus on empowering persons with disabilities - sensory, physical and intellectual. Considerable work is currently taking place within this area both nationally and regionally and there will be many opportunities to form effective and helpful collaborations with groups throughout the country who have already made inroads in developing more supportive communities.

Many businesses are also taking the initiative to provide a more inclusive service with Supervalu Monksland and Clonakilty leading

the way providing sensory friendly shopping which is of particular benefit to those with autism as well as other special needs! At set times during the day all music and in-store announcements are turned off and lighting is dimmed to create a calmer environment with less sensory stimulation. These businesses have taken a lead in this area in the hope that many others including the large chains will follow suit.

The Project will be driven by a Team represented by Deborah Brady, Ken Campbell, Marion Ruane and Teresa Coughlan who each bring with them a wealth of experience and knowledge within this area. They however stress that the overall model for the project "will be

> Community based with all sectors contributing to the development and implementation of our Accessibility Ballinasloe Action Plan. There is ample opportunity for all groups and clubs to work together in identifying creative ways of improving the lives of people in our community." This was very much a key element of the success of the recent Fit Town project where we saw groups with a common interest (such as the Brothers of Charity and Ballinasloe Rugby Club, Ballinasloe Eagles and East Galway Hunt) join forces to support each other!



There are a number of priority projects that they are interested in pursuing over the coming year including; working towards universal design to ensure our public areas are accessible to all, awareness and education campaigns, national Buddy Bench project with local schools network, outdoor fitness equi pment fit out, working with the business community to identify areas for improvement - physical layouts, service area, awareness/training, visual picture menus.

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MEIC GLAN AGUA - POWERS AHEAD FOR EAST

GALWAY

After some eight years of being a key tenant in the Enterprise Centre, Creagh, the time has now arrived to see the once fledgling enterprise spread its wings and move its greatly expanded operation to a new premises.

Founder and Finance Director Gerry Fahy is philosophical about the move but looks back with pride on the phenomenal growth from effectively a two man operation to a 100 employee holding that now has both an Irish Headquarters and a London office!

Gerry and Tom O'Connor were two ex-Coffey Construction directors, who came to the Enterprise Centre with a business idea, and a requirement for 800 square feet of space – aiming to deliver specialist services to the civil construction sector as MEIC.

Within a few short months they were quickly accommodated with new larger offices and their operations developed through a partnership with a Portuguese company Mota-Engil.

"We found it tough to get on on tender lists for certain types of projects and we found through a JV Venture in Kilkenny that partnering with Mota-Engil for technical expertise and scale was the way to go".

Since the turn of the decade the firm now needs 25,000 square feet of space and additional fleet and machinery requirements, has nearly 100 employees and is managing a range of 60 projects per annum from €20.000 to €37 million.

Reflecting on the achievements to date Gerry muses "it's that old adage – the harder I work the luckier I get". He cites the hard work of his co-founder Tom and the staff of the firm in very difficult recessionary times – as one of the main reasons for the success.

"In fairness we were very well looked after here at the Centre by Lyn the Manager and the Board - they were always supportive of us and were very flexible in accommodating our growing needs – like any good incubation space".

Gerry suggests that the location of the centre, the broad band, the connectivity to other businesses in the locale, the engagement with the agencies all helped their fledgling business grow.

"We could take clients from Dublin Airport and have them here at our offices in less than two hours and later that evening they could be cycling a greenway, golfing or having a swim in one of two well maintained leisure centres before we entertain them for dinner – in any of the fine establishments that we used regularly "states Gerry.

Having had his business operation headquartered in the Enterprise Park he would best describe the advantages for new starts ups as centrality of location, quality of accommodation for employees, quality of hotel, hospitality and leisure amenities, quick access to the Wild Atlantic Way for employees or guests and a develo pment company team who are pro-business.

"We have been very impressed with the quiet way that this town has been found to be attractive to our workers, clients and visiting consultants. We have brilliant business relationships and will continue with them even though we are moving a few miles West – firms like the Kilmartin Family who look after our Fleet, Stronges who do our client site photography, Barry's Cycles who has looked after our pedal fleet and all the Hoteliers and caters".

On the downside – he too was critical of the parking regime "So many of our staff here would just drive to Dolans Centra Shop in Kilgarve, rather than head into the town and deal with meters – there is 100 lunches here, another 80 in Aptar and possibly another 45 in Creagh

Medical Devices before you look at the schools or HSE firms out on the Creagh side of town - that won't waste a lunch break looking for a parking spot"

His staff have also been very impressed with the quality and affordability of rental accommodation in the town.

The company enjoys strong connections with the Galway/ Sligo / Athlone I.T's NUIG and is developing a Graduate Programme in Business/Engineering with them – "We have found it tough in the latter few years to find skilled personnel for our posts and this is reflected throughout the construction sector".

Whilst the company is in the wrong sector for Enterprise Ireland or IDA support, they did find the IDA very useful to them in assisting them with the set up last year to open their London Office in St. Albans to make inroads in the Civil/M&E Sector there – worth €15 billion a year!

When asked if the move to Loughrea leaves a sour note after enjoying 8 years in town, Gerry is very quick to point out that every avenue was fully explored before they decided on the move "I want to assure the community that there was no stone left unturned by us, the Develo pment Company, or the agencies in trying to find us a suitable premises in this town, the Enterprise Centre is for startups – we have moved beyond that phase – our needs were best met by an existing building not a new build, so we have to move; but as a Ballinakill man I personally happy that we are still making a contribution to the East Galway Economy and keeping jobs local".





NEW RATES REBATE SCHEME LAUNCHED FOR VACANT PREMISES BY BRIAN CIEPIERSKI

After much discussion and debate at County level -Galway County Council has decided to pilot a new Rates Rebate Scheme to primarily assist small indigenous businesses and to regenerate the vacant commercial premises in the town centres.

With empty shop fronts and premises in so many of our streets in the county's towns and a falling rateable base - the council are piloting this

scheme - (the first of its type in the country) to encourage and support new businesses and commercial activities in town centres - that choose to locate in a vacant commercial premises.

The scheme shall operate as a payment of a grant by Galway **County Council to the qualifying** applicants in respect of rates struck for the premises which have been paid to the Authority in accordance with normal payment criteria.

The scheme shall apply in the total extent of area zoned for "Town Centre" purpose in any current or new Local Area Plan only.

The scheme shall apply to businesses which have a total Rates bill not exceeding €3,000 in a calendar year/rates year. This is to ensure that small business benefit are the principle beneficiaries.

The scheme shall apply to any new businesses that choose to establish in commercial premises in the qualifying area that have been vacant for a period of 12 moths immediately prior to opening (as identified in the rates vacancy list held by Galway County council)

The scheme shall also apply to businesses that seek to expand into commercial premises immediately adjacent to their current location. Businesses that choose to establish or expand into upper floors of properties in the Town Centre zones in towns which are subject to a local plan shall also be eligible.

Where it appears that the scheme is contributing to the displacement of any existing businesses to the detriment of the overall wellbeing of the local economy, the local Authority may deem a proposal that would otherwise be eligible to be ineligible. Certain types of businesses cannot be considered for the scheme like Takeaways and

Betting Shops.

The application must be accompanied by a lease agreement whereby the parties agree to a minimum 3 year lease period, reviewable and renewed each year.

Failure to remain current on any charges will result in the immediate cessation of the scheme and removal of supports.

All Applications for the

scheme must be made through the Local Enterprise Officer. Director of Services Catherine Mc Connell insisted that while the scheme will pilot to a review at the end of 6 months with a June 1st start date, consideration would be given on a case by case basis to businesses that opened in May.

Welcoming the new decision Town Team Member and local Councillor Aiden O'Donohue believes that it is a progressive move in trying to revitalise footfall back into the town centre. "This is another positive step in tackling the vacant business premises in the town centre and a strong signal from the County that we are serious about supporting local retailers and small entrepreneurs as opposed to the larger operations ".

HOSPITAL WATCH BY BRIAN CIEPIERSKI

New Minister for Communications and Climate Change Denis Naughten TD has stated that the limiting of the hours in the emergency department of Portiuncula hospital was a red line issue for him during negotiations with independent TD's while creating support for the Fine Gael led minority government.

A leaked draft HSE report had strongly suggested that the ER Department be curtailed to a 8.am to a 8.00 pm service!

The HSE has apologised recently for delays in a review of Portiuncula Hospital. According to RTE the HSE has apologised to families for lengthy delays in publishing a review into the care provided to women at the Maternity Unit at Galway's Portiuncula Hospital. This review of 18 cases - which was commissioned after a number of serious incidents during childbirth at the hospital last year - is now expected to be completed later this summer.

According to RateMyHospital.ie Portiuncula is now the 26th best hospital, in the field of the 69 public and private, in the country. They have moved up 4 places in recent months from 30th! In comparison University Hospital Galway is still rated as the third worst at 67th.

The Hospital has received an increase in staff numbers recently. According to Saolta 1 extra ED consultant and 4 new medical consultants have been hired. There are several new staff about to begin working there as well. One Consultant General Physician and 1 Consultant in Obstetrics and Gynaecology are in their final stages of clearance and they are due to begin in the near future. Two Consultant Radiologists posts are in clearance and 1 Consultant Cardiologist is set to begin in October. Interviews will also be taking place in September in an attempt to fill the role of Consultant Respiratory Physician. This increase in the amount of filled posts is great for the facility and the community and promises to provide more well-rounded and indepth medical treatment.

Latest figures (March 2016) from Trolley and Ward Watch indicate indicates an unusual spike in numbers. There were 86 people recorded to be on trolleys throughout the hospital. This is a significant increase from the 13 the previous month, though it should be noted that this is down from last year's figure at the same time of 99.

For the University Hospital of Galway the latest data from Trolley and Ward Watch is still quite high. There were 539 individuals on trolleys throughout the building. These numbers are down from last year's 634, suggesting some improvement.

Meanwhile the newly formed Friends of Portiuncula Hospital held a fundraising event for patient comforts. This event was the 'Women's Health Awareness Evening' which invited people to attend a dinner and information evening at the Shearwater hotel to help raise funds. Key note speakers on the night were Dr Gordon Pate, Dr Michael O Dowd, Niamh Flynn, and writer Michael Harding.

The Battle of Aughrim is one of Europe's most historic battles that changed the course of Irish history. Discover how three rival European Kings- William of Orange, James II, and Louis XIV- took hold of Ireland in their struggle for power with over 45,000 soldiers gathering at Aughrim in 1691 in a bloody encounter, in what proved to be the defining battle of the Williamite War in Ireland.

On the 16th-17th of July 2016 Aughrim village will come alive with the sights sounds and smell of history as the Battle of Aughrim is remembered on its 325th Anniversary. With a living history camp, men (in the Green).

Clonmacnoise is an ancient monastic site near Shannonbridge, and a top visitor attraction in Ireland. Founded by St Ciaran in the mid-6th century, it became a great centre of religion and learning, visited by scholars from all over the world. Many historical manuscripts, including the 11th century Annals of Tighernach and the 12th century Book of the Dun Cow, were written here.

The visitor centre is Open from 9:00am-6.30 pm and admission prices are: Adult: €6.00 | Senior/group: €4.00 | Child/student: €2.00 | Family: €14.00

The standing remains of the Clontuskert Abbey are of the Augustinian Priory of St. Mary, founded in the twelfth century by Turlough O'Conor King of Connacht, in a graveyard surrounded by a stone wall. The original Augustinian Priory was burnt about 1413 and the standing remains are mostly of the fifteenth century



reconstruction. Located on the Portumna Road about 4 km from the rugby club.

A Franciscan friary in Kilconnell founded in 1353, by William O'Kelly, Lord of Ui Maine. The remaining building which are in good condition, consist of a church with nave, choir, south transeot and aisle, as well as some domestic buildings. The windows in the church probably date from the early 15th century. The church was in use until the 17th century, and was beseigned by Cromwellian Forces in 1650. The friars finally left the abbey in the early 1690s. It is open to all in Kilconnell.

Turoe Pet Farm first opened in May 1993. This family-run enterprise is situated in a rural setting near a village called Bullaun, 4km off the M6 main Galway/Dublin route. They have many facilities and these can be viewed in the 'Amenity Section' on their website www.turoepetfarm.com. Opening hours are 10am to 7 pm.

For countless years many in our country have suffered the horrors of depression and other mental health issues silently, believing there was no help for them and ultimately resorting to taking their own lives. In recent times the destructive nature of these issues such as depression, anxiety and suicide and its hold on many in Ireland is being slowly dragged to the forefront of society with many organisations taking a stand against this beast.

Pieta House is one such place which has had enough of turning a blind eye to this creeping epidemic. An institution created to helping victims of mental illness and their families, they have been a selfless and dedicated group for any and all who needs them.

While those who volunteer work tirelessly, to keep their progress going they need support from communities across the island. In recent years they have held an annual fundraiser known as 'Darkness Into Light'. This event invites everyone to join in a 5k walk or run starting just before dawn so the participants will walk into the bright light of the sun after being in the darkness of night.







CAROLINE FLED AUGHRIM 100 YEARS AGO BECAUSE SHE FELT UNSAFE. BY KEN KELLY

The grand-daughter of a lady who was placed in the Aughrim Orphanage for six years and later driven out of the locality, one hundred years ago, has made a donation to the Church of Ireland community in the village where her ancestors are buried.

For 80-year-old Maureen Clark who now lives in East Anglia, it was a nostalgic visit to the Glebe Graveyard in Aughrim where many of her relations are interred. Her grandfather, Thomas Connell, whose family originally hailed from Kilclooney, outside Ballinasloe, was born in Portsmouth, England in 1842 where his father was in the Army but he returned to Ireland and joined the 91st Galway Regiment of the Militia at 14 years of age as a drummer. Subsequently he worked in Aughrim for the Wade family at Fairfield and also at the local orphanage.

Maureen Clark's grandmother, Caroline Campe was born on 1st January 1872 in Bombay, India, where her father was stationed in the Army. She had two older sisters, Catherine Isabella, born in Portsmouth in 1863 and Mary Jane, also born in Portsmouth in 1865 as well as two younger brothers. Their mother died at the age of 43 in 1880 and a year later their father passed away at the Renmore Military Hospital in Galway.

Caroline was sent to the Aughrim Orphanage and remained there until she was sixteen She did not know the whereabouts of her brothers and sisters. Then she went to work with Mrs. Butson, looking after children before marrying Thomas Connell in The Holy Trinity Church, Aughrm on 2nd October 1890. Her first child was born at the Fairfield homestead on 8th August 1891 and was named Justin Harold. In 1893 Claude Stenson arrived and their third son, named Alan Campe (her maiden name) was born 1894. Four years later she had her only daughter, Madeline Florence.

In her diaries, Caroline said she "fled Ireland with her daughter Madeline Florence around 1916 when we felt unsafe due to the political unrest. Fairfield (the home house) had been raided four times and apart from the estate owner, Robert Rochford Wade, we had no men to protect us. Thomas had passed away



several years earlier and my sons had not returned from military service." Caroline lived to be 91 but was brought back to Aughrim, in 1963 and interred with the rest of her family.

It was the fifth time that Maureen Clarke had made the overseas journey to visit the graves in Aughrim. "There is a bond there that I can't explain. It's lovely coming to Aughrim, the people are so friendly and helpful. Even though it's 100 years since my grandmother and mother had to leave the area, I still enjoy going back as I have a special affinity for the area" explained the former nurse who had seen military service in many hospitals in the Far East, Cyprus and Europe.

Meeting the new Rector, Rev. John Godfrey for the first time, Maureen said the Glebe Cemetery was very dear to her heart and she wished to make a donation to the Church of Ireland community in Aughrim as a token of her appreciation for the kindness and hospitality afforded to her on each occasion she came over to visit.

Ballinasloe Fair and Festival Committee have begun the planning for this October's Programme of Events.

"We commence by conducting a thorough review of last year events seeing what worked well, what didn't go so well and then plan accordingly" says Adrian Ahern Chairperson

Last year the Friday night was more family orientated with the Fireworks happening earlier than previous years and the introduction of face painting, music, fire eaters, stilt walkers etc., all adding to the feel good factor of relaxed free entertainment for all.

Ballinasloe Fair and Festival is a large undertaking for the small voluntary committee many of whom have been associated with the event for many years now. Pressures increase year on year, things like insurance, health and safety considerations, fund raising and arranging a varied programme to attract visitors to the area and raise the profile of the town.

Costs are increasing year on year and the committee relies mainly on the support of the towns businesses - they really appreciate all those who contribute so generously but unfortunately it is increasingly becoming more difficult to garner financial resources.

This year the programme may have to be reduced to reflect the budget available but it is hoped to continue and enhance the programme with favourites such as the craft market, the fireworks, dog show and related activities, the soap box derby and horse & pony lunging events continuing.

The organisation of the events involves co-operation from a number of groups statutory and non-statutory, e.g. Galway County Council, H.S.E., Ballinasloe Show Committee, Civil Defence, Gardai, Department of Agriculture, I.S.P.C.A., Ballinasloe Musical Society and a host of volunteers, businesses and people of the town and district.

Secretary, Mary Phelan said "our unique October Fair & Festival generates a wonderful interest from overseas journalists and T.V. crews. In 2014 we had a detailed article published in "Canadian Cowboy" magazine where the journalist was in Ireland for a few weeks attending various festivals. She attended the first weekend for the magazine but returned again for our second weekend of family fun because of the enjoyment and welcome she got here. Last year we hosted media people from France, Australia, Scotland and Sweden. In the past week I have received the Swedish article and it makes me very proud to see our historic event make an impression in print round the world!".

Not to mention the revenue it brings into our locality!" states the Organisation's longstanding Secretary.

Ciara Croffy, Treasurer and who also heads up the Equine subcommittee stated "that the quality of animal coming to the Fair has improved immensely over the past few years and the geographical spread of entries in our various equine competitions cover all Ireland. We are constantly implementing and updating Health & Safety laws and work hand in hand with the Dept. of Agriculture. Horses are sold on our Fair Green every year and transported all over Europe! PASSING OF MOSSIE DILLANE

Mosssie Dillane, the former bank official and priest, who passed away recently was a native of Templeglantine, Co. Limerick. He worked as a teller in the Munster & Leinster Bank in Ballinasloe (now the AIB) more than fifty years ago before studying for the priesthood.

Born in 1931, Mossie attended the local national school where both his parents were teachers before receiving his secondary education in St. Munchin's College in Limerick. He then joined the old Munster & Leinster Bank in 1950 but after two years entered the Columban Missionary College in Dalgan Park to study for the priesthood. However he left there two years later and returned to his banking job for the following four years, some of which were spent in Ballinasloe where he hit up a rapport with some golfing friends and took a great interest in the game.

In 1958 Mossie entered St. Kieran's Seminary in Kilkenny and five years later was ordained a priest for a Texas Diocese in the USA, serving in many parishes. Returning to Ireland in 1970, Mossie served as curate in for two years in Ballinasloe town and a further two in Portumna.

He was very popular in both parishes, loved the people and "the craic" while spending his leisure time on the fairways of both golf clubs.

Returning to San Antonio, Texas in 1974, Mossie ministered in many parishes there for twenty years before returning to work in the parish of Killimor and later in the parish of Mullagh and Killoran. He later moved to the parish of Woodford and Looscaun but retired from the priesthood in 2006 following his personal life revelations. He had been a priest for over fifty years and his passing came after a long period of hospitalisation.

Mossie excelled as a golfer, playing at one time off a single figure handicap and winning one Captain's and two President's Prizes in his career. He also had the distinction of having three holes-in-one over the years as winning many other major trophies. He was a member of both Portumna and Ballinasloe clubs for many years, was elected President of the Ballinasloe Golf Club in 2005 where he proved to be extremely popular and hardworking during his term. Members of the Club formed a guard of honour at his funeral in Portumna where his remains were interred.

A FOND FAREWELL TO DOR SCANNELL'S

There was a wide outpouring of grief at the passing of one of Ballinasloe's best-known business people and community activists Dorothy (Dor) Scannell, "Fort Rose," Cleaghmore. For over forty years she had been involved in all aspects of the business and community life of her adopted town where she was held in the highest esteem by all who knew her.

Dor, as she was affectionately known, was born and reared in Eyrecourt where her parents, Anna and Kieran Kenny had a business on the Main Street. They also operated a hackney

business, which her late mother drove for over fifty years. Dor's first job took her to Ballina, Co. Mayo, working with Friends Providence Assurance before being transferred to Galway City, where she lived with her sister Pauline.

In 1970 Dor took up employment in Portiuncula Hospital, Ballinasloe and on her 21st birthday married **Donal Scannell and joined** him in the running of Cul na Greine Hotel on Dunlo Hill. This proved to be outstanding business enjoying enterprise, widespread reputation but in the summer of 1975 the couple decided to sell the business and move to live in Derrymullen. Well used to feeding the masses in Cuil na Greine Hotel, Dor went into the business of providing the catering at the Ballinasloe Livestock's Mart canteen for six years.

Now the mother of two sons (Donal and Mark) and a

daughter (Susan), Dor and husband Donal purchased "Fort Rose" in Cleaghmore in 1981. It was Dor's "pride and joy" where its big red door became a symbol of her boundless generosity, where for the following 35 years of living there, she laid on a massive welcome to all that passed through. More recently her favourite visitors were her beloved grandchildren whom she doted on.

Dor treated Ballinasloe like she did her home village of Eyrecourt, making it her business to be acquainted with and helpful to all and sundry. Kindness was her currency and she never put herself first. She was deeply involved

with many charitable groups, particularly with the annual Daffodil Day, since its inception, where she manned the stall outside the AIB on collection days.

A founder member of the Soroptomists Association in Ballinasloe, she was honoured with the presidency and accompanied the group on the special visit to Arus an Uachtaran. Her colleagues formed a guard of honour as her remains made their final journey to Creagh Cemetery. Dor had a unique ability top make the world come to her. There were few people she wanted to meet and she usually wound up chatting to them in her adopted town, from Charlie Haughey to Michael D. Higgins.



Her absolute musical hero, Joe Dolan, visited her during one illness while Daniel O'Donnell also dropped in. One of the early mourners to pay their respects at her wake was Gay Byrne, as over 1,600 signed the books of condolences at the family home, where she reposed.

Dor's devotion to Our Lady of Clonfert was immeasurable. Every month of May she would join thousands of others in visiting Clonfert three times to ensure here prayers were answered. She always supported those affected by illness or personal problems by encouraging them to pray to Our Lady. Firmly believing "that to sing is to pray twice" Dor was a member of St. Michael's Choir for the last two decades but following a hip operation had to retire as negotiating the spiral stone steps to the choir was too challenging. Her fellow choristers, led by Michael McCullagh, did her proud with a magnificent performance at her requiem mass.

Despite being in ill health for the past two years, and initially given little chance of survival, Dor battled against the odds and was back to her buoyant best in the months preceding her sudden and unexpected death. At her graveside, singer and family friend Mundy, gave a rousing rendition of Joe Dolan's "Good Looking Woman" where he was enthusiastically joined in the chorus by all present. This ended a "great send off" for a very popular local lady.

The late Dor Scannell is survived by her husband Donal, sons Donal and Mark, daughter Susan, brother Joe, sisters Pauline and Anne, grandchildren and many other relatives and friends.



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
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

BUDDING RETAILERS IN SCOIL CROI NAOFA

The 5th and 6th class students of Scoil an Chroi Naofa showed a lot of local shops how it's done recently with the undertaking of their Junior Entrepreneur Project. This tested their ability to market a money making idea and to sell it to 3 judges.

"Our class recently participated in the Junior Entrepreneur Project (JEP). This a project which allowed us the opportunity to set up our own organisation. We were initially divided into 4 groups and each group came up with their own business idea. Each idea was presented to the "Dragons" in a Dragon's Den type scenario. Ms. Connor (our principal), Val Colleran (local businessman - owner of Utah,) and Fr. Garvey (Chairperson Board of Management) were the "Dragons". Their job was to decide on the idea which they believed could succeed and this would be the basis of our JEP.

Their choice was 'Cool Cases'. The idea was to decorate or personalise plain pencil cases which we could then sell for a small profit. Our target market was the school community.

We were divided into 5 teams - (1) Design and Production, (2) Finance, (3) Sales, (4) Marketing and (5) Storytelling. Each group had their own specific responsibilities to help make our business a success.

Special mention to Val Colleran (Utah) who was a HUGE help to us in setting up our business. He sourced and ordered the pencil cases for us and delivered them to the classroom for us personally. We ordered the sticky letters and decorations online.

We then had a Showcase Day where we displayed and advertised our product for all the other classes and teachers, as well as for the parents. The prices per pencil case were €4 for 1, €7 for 2 or €10 for 3. We took almost 200 orders on that day alone!

Our next job was to design, produce and deliver the cases to our customers. When all was said and done we ended up making a profit of more than €450! This was after we had repaid our initial loan from the Board of Management and taken away the cost of our raw materials. We plan on spending our hard earned profits on a trip to Baysports in Athlone.

All in all the JEP was a very enjoyable and educational experience for all of us. Don't be surprised if you see some of us in the "Dragon's Den" for real sometime in the future with our own business ideas!

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
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A CHAT WITH JOE HIGGINS BY GERARD DEVLIN



Joe Higgins was born in 1924 in Plaza Terrace now called Emmet Place. He went to school in rooms behind the Town Hall. Joe's class was part

of an all Ireland "Schools Collection" project in 1937/38. This project has been digitised and can be found @ www.duchas.ie/en/cbes/4566075

In 1939 Joe began working as a machine operator in Dubarry shoe factory. At the same time with a desire to further educate himself Joe attended classes four nights a week in the Ballinasloe Workhouse.

In Dubarry he worked his way up and was eventually responsible for the distribution of moccasins to hand stitching homes all over the midlands.

One of those hand stitchers recently, said "Joe was like Meals on Wheels - as the hand stitching money often put the dinner on the table." In 1984 after spending 45 years in Dubarry, he retired? And went on to manage various shoe shops locally.

School plays gave Joe his love for grease paint and stage lights and he started to write short


funny sketches. Typically during Lent when dance halls closed and cinema projectionists got holidays, Joe and some friends would visit local village halls.

They would act out these sketches and follow with a bit of a dance played on an old tape recorder. Old Mother

Riley will always be remembered as Joe's most famous character. Local charities or clubs usually benefitted from these shows. Christmas, entertainment in St Brigid's Hospital, old folk's parties and children's shows in the Parochial Hall were the norm.

"We never got paid but we were fed rhubarb tarts, cakes and buns. I suppose we worked for the food but really it was for the love and satisfaction of acting "remembers Joe

Assisted by John Gilligan his musical director and "a talented musician", Joe then wrote, directed and acted in his own shows in the Town Hall. Many a nervous Dubarry worker made their acting debut in one of Joe's packed out shows. Older Town Hall audiences still remember Joe's "death defying high-wire walk" in a tutu, with a large "L" pinned to his back and John Gilligan giving a drum



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roll. It was really "two tall painter's ladders and a plank with a rope nailed to the edge", he tells me.

In 1953 Joe married Phil, daughter of a local postman Christy Regan. They've been living in St Joseph's Place for over 60 years. They have one daughter and four grand children.

In 1954 (the Marion Year) when the Dubarry workers contributed weekly and had a statue of Our Lady purchased and erected on the factory grounds Joe arranged with Fr Cummins and invited Bishop Philbin to celebrate the open air mass. He also organised an FCA colour party led by the late Oliver O' Grady to meet the Bishop.


One of Joe's greatest memories was coming down the canal on a Guinness barge, being crowned King of the Fair by Andrew Jennings and Tadhq Mac Lochlainn and then welcoming the victorious 1956 Galway team to Ballinasloe. Another was a Cabaret and Candlelight supper he organised in the Emerald Ballroom, in aid of the Ballinasloe Mentally Handicapped. Assisted by the late Peadar Burns (then chairman of **Ballinasloe Mentally Handicapped Association),** Dr O'Shea, Dr Browne, Bridie McKenna and the St Brigid's hospital Matron over 1,000 people were dined and entertained by celebrity musician Dermot O'Brien, RTE's Brendan O'Reilly and locals Ancel O'Carroll and Dermot Cullen.

At 75 when Joe REALLY retired he still continued writing, but his passion

Nearly 80 years since he did his "All Ireland Schools Collection Project" Joe and his family were guests of honour in the new library. Joe presented a group of young budding writers with their prizes and "Writing Competition Certificates". Maybe in this group there is another Joe in the making?

Older locals still say.... "There was no show like a Joe show" and the ain't referring to the late singer from Mullingar!

Outgoing Chairperson Mary O'Connell gave a detailed annual report to the Society's A.G.M. in which she detailed over 85 nights of performances, cinema, rehearsals, recitals, summer schools and events. She reminded the large audience in attendance that the whole project was dependent primarily on volunteers and that without the greatful assistance of Solas, and TUS a great deal more energy would have to be utilised. She thanked all the local performing groups, those who supported the fundraising, the events, Galway County Council, AOIFE and her fellow Directors and Officers of the Company that operates the venue on a long lease from the Diocesan Trustees.

Secretary Colm Croffy in his final report gave an overiew of the last nine years of the project, it's successful fundraising and delivery of some €165,000 of investment in a new roof and capital refurbishment of the building. The meeting warmly thanked the outgoing Secretary for his efforts and commitment since the project committee was founded in 2005.

Treasurer Gerry Sweeney gave a detailed report on the Society's finances while Claire Curley the Company's Auditor was on hand to present in detail the audited figures for the previous year trading.



She was also able to assist with any questions that the meeting had on the turnover of the year of some €36,000 and expenditure of some €35,000.



This season on the river sees a fond farewell for one local waterways man as he starts his first season with Killary adventure centre. After starting his first ever water adventure in a kayak in Ballinasloe over fifteen years ago with upriver.ie Portnick Resident Robert Mulvaney has been hooked ever since!

When the town marina was still just a drawing, Robert was learning how to negotiate the river Suck in a kayak. Since falling in love with the water way of life at a young age he has since completed his third year in adventure tourism management in Tralee and is now working full time in Connemara as an outdoor instructor.

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CONNECTIONS TO THE REMEMBRANCE OF 1916 BY BRIAN CIEPIERSKI

Accepted by most that Ballinasloe did not have much of an impact during those fateful few days in 1916, it may be a surprise that there are a few interesting stories connected to the events of that time and the subsequent commemorations of it.

Recently the St Brigids Hospital Heritage Group held a 1916 Celebration, which included a march to the Ada English Grave in Creagh Cemetery, a camogie match, readings, and recitals in Gullanes Hotel. Significantly the April day's events included the proclamation being read by DCU Professor John Carroll.

Pádraig Ó Ceithearnaigh, local man and past teacher relates the story of the late Paddy Caroll, a court clerk and grandfather of the professor. In 1918 "he was the first person to read out the proclamation of independence in this town" - as part of the subsequent Easter Week celebrations by Sinn Fein. For this act he was arrested by the British forces there in August of 1918.

Following his arrest the Royal Irish Constabulary raided the Carroll home, which can still be found on Dunlo Hill. Looking for any 'incriminating' papers as evidence, they entered the home to find his wife, Greta, doing the ironing. Informing her of their planned actions they proceeded to turn the house upside down looking for anything that would be 'damaging' for Paddy. During this Greta continued to do the ironing and badgered them for the destruction being caused to the house. Though for all their efforts no papers were found.

As they left, the Cumman na mBan member, finished the ironing and pulled the would be 'suspicious' papers out of their hiding place- up her sleeves, where the RIC did not think to look.





Not widely known but another connection to the town and the leaders of the 1916 Rising was the fact that Padraig Pearse's father was the Chief Marble Sculptor for both St. Michael's Church and St. Brendan's in Loughrea. A lot of the original marble work was designed and commissioned by the man who's son signed the instrument of surrender and was one of the first to be shot - May 100 years ago!

For the 1966 fifttieth commemoration, the Government decided to host a competition which would challenge artists to design a sword of light, which was taken from Padraig Pearse's newspaper 'An Claidheamh Soluis'.

The winner of this was Dublin born Una McDonnell who was married to local man Eugene Waters (Eoghan O Tuairisc). Her design was inspired

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by one of the stain glass windows in St. Michael's Church.

"When I was a boy in the 1960s, I recall entering the church and Father Peter Dunne came over and brought me to one of the windows. He told me that this is the window which inspired her winning design." recalls Pádraig.

At the same time her husband Eugene, a well-known writer and past teacher, published a book on the Rising called 'De Luain'. Considered to be one of his best works, of both English and Irish, and is archived in NUIG library for Research.

Sadly though, Una passed away suddenly in November of 1965 before she could see the fruit of her labour. Eugene passed away in the 1980s.

By far the most distinguished member of the Trench family of Garbally was Richard, who was born on 18th May 1767, the eldest surviving son amongst his father William's nineteen children. He was educated at Kimbolton School in England, St. John's College, Cambridge, Lincoln's Inn, London. Called to the Irish Bar in 1793, he was elected MP for Newtown Limavady, Co. Derry, in 1796, and the same year he married Henrietta Staples, whose family was related to Lord Castlereagh, British Foreign Secretary between 1812 and 1822. Two years later Richard also represented Co. Galway

in the Irish House of Parliament. The Trenches opposed the legislative union of Britain and Ireland when it was first proposed in 1799. However, after the intervention of Castlereagh, with whom Richard had struck up an enduring friendship, they were persuaded to support the measure. Another view is that Richard and his father decided to drop their opposition to the proposal on discovering that all the other landed families of Co. Galway were in favour of the Union. In any event, the Trenches ultimately voted in accordance with the wishes of the British government and were suitably rewarded after the Union had passed into law. William was created First Earl of Clancarty in 1803, while his son was launched on a dazzling career in British politics, eventually holding a constellation of top-ranking government posts.

Having inherited the Clancarty title on his father's death in 1805, Richard went on to secure a whole string of highprofile appointments such as Commissioner for the Affairs of India, Postmaster General, Representative Peer, Master of the Mint and President of the Board of Trade. When the Prince of Orange assumed the crown of Holland, he accompanied him there in 1813 and remained on as British Ambassador to The Hague until 1823. A series of letters he wrote to his wife at this period is extant.

The Congress of Vienna was convened in 1814 to redrawn the political boundaries of Europe following the defeat of Napoleon, and Clancarty attended as the second British plenipotentiary. He is portrayed in a comical light in the following extract from a letter to the Austrian foreign minister, Prince Metternich, from his secretary, dated 20th June 1815:

"Yesterday evening the originals of the final act of the Congress of Vienna were signed. This session, which was held in Your Grace's antechamber next to your office, could and ought to have been solemn and imposing; it failed to be so, however, since everyone was excessively preoccupied with his own copy, and since, in particular, Lord Clancarty, by his painstakingness and punctiliousness by turns



tormented and greatly amused us. He sat for three hours and a half, eyes fixed on his tome, examining the seals, the signatures, and the thread with which the whole thing was sewn, before he could resolve himself to sign his name. It got to the point where on repeated occasions a general laughter involuntarily erupted."

Richard was on terms of intimate friendship with Kina George IV. They exchanged correspondence, and the Earl commissioned the full-length portrait of the King that which which adorns the dining-room of Garbally House. He also had a throne constructed and installed in what is still known as "The Throne Room" in anticipation of a royal visit that never in fact took place. It had been expected that His Majesty would include Garbally in his itinerary during his 1821 trip to Ireland. George, however, was unable to tear himself away from Slane Castle, the home of Lady Conyngham, his latest girlfriend,

who was reputed to be as well-upholstered as his regal self. A contemporary balladeer commented in doggerel:


'Tis pleasant at seasons to see how they sit,

First cracking their nuts, and then cracking their wit,

Then quaffing their claret - then mingling their lips,

Or tickling the fat about their broad hips.

Give the devil his due, she's a prime bit of stuff,



And of curves in right places she has surely enough.

He'll never need pillows to keep up his head

Whilst himself and herself sleep and snore in one bed.

Sadly, the throne succumbed to an outbreak of republican fervour in the 1920s when St. Joseph's Diocesan Seminary relocated to Garbally. At the behest of the college president, the throne was dragged outside by a group of students and kicked to pieces.

Enoch Powell once remarked that all political careers end in failure, and so it was with Richard, who in 1823 was recalled to London in disgrace after he had got drunk at an official reception in The Hague and insulted the mistress of a member of the Dutch Cabinet. Thereafter his abilities were exercised in the develo pment of the town of Ballinasloe, where he earned the reputation of being an exemplary landlord. He landscaped his demesne and replaced the old house in Garbally, which had been gutted by fire in 1818, with a late Georgian mansion designed by Thomas Cundy, an English architect. After his death in Kinnegad on 24th November 1837, he was succeeded by his eldest son, William, as the Third Earl of Clancarty.

43 YEARS ON & STILL GOING

Their under-11 rugby squad won Silver medals having been pipped in the final at their first attempt. 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CLONFERT ANNUAL DIOCESAN PILGRIMAGE TO LOURDES BY BISHOP JOHN KIRBY

Clonfert Diocese has been going on pilgrimage to Lourdes, France for twenty six years. Lourdes is a small town, located in the Pyrenees, South of France, where in 1858, Our Lady appeared to Bernadette Soubirous, a young girl who was born into poverty. Our Lady had told Bernadette to ask to have a chapel built on the site of the apparitions. While there was some scepticism as to the apparitions initially, there was acceptance that Bernadette did indeed see Our Lady. Since then, Lourdes, and the grotto where the apparitions took place, have been a place of worship for millions of people.

The formal pilgrimage ceremonies include the opening Mass, the anointing of the sick, a penitential service, the stations of the cross and the closing Mass. There are other ceremonies that take place every day within the sanctuary and members of the Clonfert pilgrimage participate in these on given days. The first of these is the Baths and Water Walk. The baths are filled with water that comes from the spring under the grotto and are a fascinating phenomenon. The Blessed Sacrament procession takes place every day at 5 pm and proceeds to the Underground Basilica of Pope St Pius X. After a series of prayers, and hymns, the exposed Blessed Sacrament is adored and there is then a blessing of the sick. The candlelight procession is the highlight of every evening in the sanctuary at Lourdes. From about

8.30 pm, thousands of pilgrims gather within the ground of the sanctuary. It is a wonderful spectacle to both view and participate in, as the pilgrims pay homage to Our Lady of Lourdes through song and prayer and for many pilgrims, it is the highlight of their trip to Lourdes.

In addition to the ceremonies and, prayer, there is also a very relaxed atmosphere, with the possibility of a tour to an outside venue and there is a good social atmosphere as well with entertainment and a sing-song.

The pilgrimage runs from Tuesday 23rd August to Sunday 28th August 2016. Pilgrims travel by air from Knock Airport to Lourdes (Tarbes) Airport. The flying time is approximately 2 hours. Travel arrangements are being handled by Society Travel, Society Street, Ballinasloe, Co. Galway (090) 964 5350. All pilgrims must have a valid passport with an expiry date of no earlier than 31st December, 2016. If you do not have a passport you are advised to commence making application for one without delay. The European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) is also essential. You must possess this card which will enable you to receive medical treatment abroad under a reciprocal agreement between countries. EHIC application forms may be obtained from your local HSE Office or on line at – www.ehic.ie.

The cost of the pilgrimage is €695.00. A deposit of €200.00 should be forwarded to Society Travel. Applications for assisted pilgrims should be made to: The Secretary, Clonfert Diocesan Office, Coorheen, Loughrea, Co. Galway. Tel No: 091-841560.

MARK'S FRIENDS NOW HELPING OTHERS BY KEN KELLY




The achievement of a group of people in Ahascragh in helping to raise nearly a quarter of a million euro so that a four year old boy could walk, has inspired parents in other parts of the country to follow suit.

Just twelve months ago the group was formed to launch "MARK'S WISH TO WALK" and raised the money so that Mark Dolan could get the best medical treatment in St. Louis, Missouri to enable him to walk. The operation was a huge success and now the Ahascragh Group are helping families in Dublin and Kells, Co. Meath to fundraise for children similarly affected.

At a recent meeting, Mark's parents Kevin and Fidelma reported on the huge strides their child had made in walking but was still receiving medical care. Mark's mother said "the confidence and lack of fear of standing and walking is just incredible." His doctor had told them that whilst it could be a long road, he had no doubt that Mark would be able to participate in sports.

Committee chairman Seamus Concannon said they had raised €238,923.44 during the campaign and were delighted that in the space of twelve months so much had been achieved in Mark's young life.



Ballinasloe History Walk

- 1 Start at the statue known as The Man with the Horse, where Main Street joins St. Michael's Square. From the crossing near the statue, continue by turning right onto Main Street. The prosperity of Ballinasloe in Georgian times can be seen in the scale and classical style of the buildings here. A fine group of four frontages stand across from the statue of The Man with the Horse. With shops and pubs on the ground floor for the most part, these Main Street premises have several floors above.
- 2 Walking along Main Street, lift your eyes above the shop frontages for one of the town's characteristic sights. There are the Diocletian windows that grace several facades. They are from the years after 1805 when the 2nd Earl was in charge. A window of this sort is formed under a semi-circular arch with two upright divisions so that the whole opening is divided into three parts.
- 3 As you stand at the meeting point of Bridge Street and Main Street, you will see the Victorian frontage of a commercial premises, originally the Masonic Hall. Next to it stands a classical looking, beautifully-crafted, early 19th century stone house, currently a guest house. Beside these is a tall, fine stone-fronted classical mansion, which is now the Bank of Ireland. It was originally the town mansion of the Lord of all of Ballinasloe, the Earl of Clancarty. A friend of king George IV, the Earl was one of the architects of the resistance to the emperor Napoleon. It could be said that he was the person to whom most credit is due for the layout, growth and architectural character of Ballinasloe as we see it today.
- 4 At the end of Main Street, head along Bridge Street, then turn to the right to the pathway which runs to the riverscape where you can see channels flowing through the several arches of the long stone bridge over the river Suck, one of the town's most precious monuments. The Bridge has been in continuous use since the 16th century and its extension in 1754 prepared it structurally to carry even the heaviest juggernauts of today.
- 5 Walk through to the far end of the park; you will approach St Michael's Church (1852-58) that stands in a commanding position over the Square. Its architect was J.J. McCarthy, a follower of Augustus Pugin (famed for other Neo-Gothic churches in Ireland) - and the design is said to have been revised by Pugin himself. Inside are many fine stained glass window. Of particular quality are those of St. Patrick and St. Rose of Lima, of 1925, by the renowned Dublin Stained glass artist, Harry Clarke and The Raising of the daughter of Jairus by Patrick Pollen, inserted in 1958.
- 6 From St. Michael's Church now walk up St. Michael's Square back towards the Man with the Horse Statue. Take a left into Dunlo Street, an important street in the history of the town, which contains, together with other buildings of about the same date, the late-Georgian Garda Station. The Station is towards the far end of the street, on the right hand side. Also on this street, over Dolan's Electrical Shop, you can see another fine example of Diocletian windows.
- 7 Halfway up Dunlo Street, turn right up Duggan Street, which will take you to St. John's Church (Church of Ireland, 1843). It dominates the vast Fair Green which becomes a hive of activity during one week every year when up to 100,000 people throng to the October fair. Look out over the Fair Green and admire one of the grandest freestanding classical monuments in the region. Dedicated to Charles Le Poer Trench, it was designed in the Neo-Greek style by the English architect George Papworth (1781-1855). A mile past this monument on the Main Galway road, South West of the town, the Earl of Clancarty's former country house is situated, where imposing gates mark the entrance to Garbally Court. It has been a school since 1923.

Walk down Church Hill onto Society Street and turn left, arriving at the Courthouse on the right. Society Street, like Main Street, was the 19th century location for the professional classes. As well as The Courthouse, it contains the former Bridewell (or gaol) from the 1840s. Further along this street, Ballinasloe Railway Station is a must. Constructed in 1851, it is a Neo-Gothic limestone tour-de-force and a fine example of the quality of rural Irish railway architecture in the mid-19th century.





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
