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


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
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REAMHRA

A new survey conducted by jobs.ie shows half of Dublin based workers would leave the capital for shorter commuting times. 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DONAL BURKE NEW CATHAOIRLEACH

The local Municipal District have elected Cllr. Donal Burke as Cathaoirleach for the next 12 months after Cllr. Aidan Donohue finished his time at the post. He was proposed by Cllr. Michael Connolly and seconded by Cllr. Michael Finnerty.

Donal is from the small parish of Clonfert, just half an hour out from Ballinasloe Town. Donal's family comes from a small farming

background, his father Dan worked as a supervisor in Bord na Móna for many years and his mother Nora was a stay at home mother who also served as an organist in their local church for almost forty years.

He qualified in Architecture from Bolton Street College, and went on to become an architectural consultant in Dublin and Wicklow after he graduated in 1994 before moving back to East Galway. He met his wife Alison nine years ago during tango-dancing lessons. Three years later they went on to marry each other!

Donal was first elected to the local council in 2014 which was his initial foray into politics. His inspiration to become a local councillor came from getting involved in community activities and events, where he saw that there was a need for himself to roll up his sleeves and do a bit more for the local area.

His political party Fianna Fáil suggested that he move from activist to representative that he run as a candidate for the local election: "I had to give it some serious thought, it was never the first thing on my mind. I decided that it was an opportunity I should go for and hopefully do some good for the Ballinasloe District".

I'm very excited to be honest, this is actually my second time as Cathaoirleach following on from two years ago. It's a very rewarding and challenging role but I'm really looking forward to it. There's a lot going on in the district now in Ballinasloe and surrounding areas, so we won't be short of activity", states Donal.

The Town Enhancement Scheme which is currently underway

is Donal's biggest project for the upcoming year, and he says that it will make a huge difference to town: "I'm looking forward to working with all those who are involved with the Town Enhancement Scheme, trying to minimise the impact as much as possible and most importantly trying to get it all completed in time", he explains.

"We've got a very good team of engineers, design team and of course the contractors who are carrying out the work and running the show, all of whom are very capable people. There's a liaison officer in place on the contractor's side to deal with the public, along with representatives from different businesses from each of the streets in the town. There's a lot of ongoing public consultation, priorities and interaction which is always a good thing", remarks our new Cathaoirleach.

Moving away from Ballinasloe town and into the rest of the district parishes, Donal says that his priority is to try and put a lot of funding into the areas with very poor road conditions to help minimise fatalities. "The local district currently covers a huge area, from Fahy in the south all the way up to Ballygar in the north, but in an actual fact this will all be changing in a years' time where the district will become a more larger and changed area.

"Within this area we have a large area of roads, most of which run through the country side away from towns and villages. The current condition of these roads is very poor, therefore one of my top priorities along with working in Ballinasloe town is to try and improve these roads to aid access to our rural areas and lower the number of casualties which take place due to these poor conditions. Funding is always the key issue, but I will do my level best to get as much out of it as we can" notes Donal.

Outgoing Cathaoirleach, Cllr. Aidan Donohue, expressed his gratitude to all the members, the technical staff and administrative staff for their co-operation and assistance throughout his term in office.

Cllr Michael Finnerty was elected Vice-cathaoirleach.

All the local council members and Director of Service Alan Farrell thanked the outgoing Cathaoirleach for his courtesy and co-operation during his term, along with wishing Cllr. Burke for the upcoming year.

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DERMOT CONNOLLY PRAISES COMMUNITY MEITHEAL SPIRIT DURING BOG FIRES

Local Sinn Féin Councillor Dermot Connolly has praised the local community members for helping out their friends and neighbours to desperately save their winter turf during the recent bogland fires in the Ahascragh area.

Turf bank owners were left heartbroken when most of their newly cut turf went up in flames during the scorching heatwave at the start of July. The bog fire spread through many acres for a long time period, destroying everything in its path and disturbing grazing cattle and sheep in the process.

Many locals rushed to the scene to tend to the flames with buckets of water and anything else they could use to help prevent the spread of the flames. This task was made even more difficult due to the nationwide hosepipe ban which had been in place due to drought, adding risk to the locals being fined for not following instruction.

In due course, the Ballinasloe Fire Services (led by station officer Barry McKeon), and other nearby Fire Crews were on site to deal with the blaze, though for many it was too late, and their precious winter fuel was burnt to crisp.

Cllr. Connolly in raising the matter at a recent Ballinasloe Municipal District meeting offered his sympathy to those who have been affected by

the fire, but gave credit to those who showed true bravery to help them out: "Though it was such a tragic event to happen, there's one positive we can take from the whole event, and that's the great community spirit to help out those who are in desperate need" stated Cllr. Connolly.

"I have no doubt that those who have lost their turf will be helped out by the locals who will share their own fuel, and the main thing is that nobody was badly hurt or injured during the fire" concluded Dermot.



UPGRADE APPROVED FOR AHASCRAUGH VILLAGE SEWAGE

Following on from a previous public consultation by Irish Water in Daly's Lounge Ahascragh, there is good news that the Village is to get its Sewage Scheme upgrade.

A Section of the sewage pipe network is to be replaced and increased in size, along with a new pumping station with increased pumping capacity is to be put in place. A new holding treatment plant is also scheduled to be built, which will increase the capacity of the current one. This upgrade will increase capacity from 340 to 470 population equivalent, with further possibility to increase pumping capacity if the need arises in future.



This proposed upgrade has been welcomed by Local Fianna Fail Councillor Michael Connolly. "This announcement will give fresh opportunity for development in Ahascragh Village by giving it a modern treatment system

that meets EPA and EU standards and after much lobbying is very welcome" stated Cllr Michael Connolly.



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The Town Enhancement Project has finally started with the first stages of works in St Michael's Square being undertaken. The works were designed by Ryan Hanley Consulting Engineers, and construction work is being carried out by contracting group SIAC Construction Ltd.

The cost of the construction currently is estimated around €7million including VAT.

The Contractors, who are based in Tuam (with a temporary office site in Poolboy during the works), have previously carried out numerous similar projects to the one in town, most of which have been in County Dublin.

The Contractor has appointed a Public Liaison Officer for the works, Shane Boland. Shane's contact details can be found on the projects website – www.ballinasloetownenhancement.ie. His contact number for businesses effected is 087 7619308. The number of staff members on site sits at around 20, with numbers increasing as the works progress.

Works on St Michael's Square East, which is known as Phase-1A of the works, started in late June, and have so far been running on schedule. The laying of sewers, water mains, ducts and all associated connections and fittings are near completion on this side of the Square. Works on the west side of St Michael's are due to be completed by the middle of August.

With works being completed on the water services, there will be stages where the mains will be shut off for short periods which may be up to a number of hours in some cases Residents and business affected will be notified with a letter, or through public media such as the radio.

The main issue with the works so far have been accessibility and parking according to many locals around the town, with roads being closed off along with many parking spaces.

As the works take place, every business with disturbed pedestrian access to their business all have the same motto 'business as usual'. So far businesses such as the Bread Basket Café and An Táin have been limited to access, though customers still come to them just as if the works were not happening.

With limited access, deliveries to the premises need to be notified to the Contractor in advance so that a pathway can be made clear for the goods to be moved in, however some of these businesses have back entrances which aids the proceedings.

No weekend work will be carried out until they begin on the central junction, where traffic disruptions will be at its peak. It's for this reason the contractors want to get the works done as quickly as possible in that area.

A full-time archaeologist is on site with the team, monitoring for any old building remains or artefacts. So far there has been one significant discovery during the digging process which was a wall of the old Market Building located at the top of The Square. Archaeological finds are not expected to cause major delays, unless they are of major significance.

No works are expected to take place in the town in the run into or during the October Fair, so that traffic build ups or pedestrian access will not be an issue during the towns busiest period.

In her spare time, Leeane competes in grooming competitions all across Ireland, and previously in Australia when she resided there. She enters classes with Terriers, Poodles and Gundogs to name a few, which she learns so much from after multiple 1st, 2nd and 3rd placings.

Leeane is fully qualified as a groomer after completing her advanced city and guilds exams, where she learnt to specialise in breed trims.

Fairy Dog Groomers are open Monday to Friday from 9am to 5pm, and Saturday 10am to 5pm, but they can accommodate bookings outside these hours if needed.

Prices vary for grooming depending on the dogs breed and hair length. A small short haired breed is €25, and a small long-haired breed costs €45. Large short haired breeds cost €45, while large long-haired breeds are €75.

This includes all hygiene areas of the dog such as their ears, nails, pads, and sanitary area. They get two good washes, a condition and whatever style you would like done for the dog.

CUTS TO BUS ÉIREANN 20/X20 SERVICE UNACCEPTABLE



Fine Gael Senator Maura Hopkins has said that cuts to Bus Éireann's 20/X20 are totally unacceptable and has called on the company to reverse their changes.

Senator Hopkins stated, "The proposed changes due to be implemented from Sunday next 29th July 2018 will mean rural areas along the Dublin-Galway bus route, including the stops at Dubarry in Creagh and in Ballydangan in South Roscommon, will not operate. This will leave a

significant area without any public transport service.

"I know that many people rely on these services daily for healthcare and other essential services. This route provides a vital lifeline for those people and I am strongly opposed to a reduction in this service."

She has written to Bus Éireann and Minister for Transport, Tourism and Sport, Shane Ross T.D. to reverse the change.

She has appealed for public support for the service "I would urge people to contact Bus Éireann and join with me in calling for the reversal of the decision to reduce services along this route."

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TRAINING FOR EMPLOYMENT SEES HUGE GROWTH

Ballinasloe Training for Employment CLG is a Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection funded Community Employment Project which has been in existence for nearly thirty years.

Located on the first floor of the Enterprise and Technology Centre, Creagh, it has a board of voluntary directors, and 34 staff participants. There are two managers who run the project on a daily basis, Billy Ward General Manager who has been with the project since the beginning and Patricia Tierney Assistant Manager who joined in 2008.

Both managers work collaboratively with all local and national agencies along with local voluntary and not for profit groups, to provide training and employment to their participants.

Up until early July this year, the scheme has had a significantly higher than usual number of staff leave due to finding full time jobs. This progression has been made all the more noteworthy by the fact that most of the jobs were based here the locality in Ballinasloe.

Patricia says that it's great to see so many locals going back to employment with businesses so close to home: "It's been very rewarding to see so many local employers expand and open their doors for re-hiring again, which is hopefully a positive sign for the town and community".

In terms of benefits of the scheme for users, Patricia explains "Firstly, you gain invaluable support in areas such as CV and Upskilling,



job searching, training needs analysis, and registering on many online Government supports. The project has spent many years building up valuable contacts within local and national training and employment agencies, and within our local employer database all this is used to enhance the participant's progression routes".

The Project could not survive without the dedicated long hours the Board of Directors put in of their own time. All the invaluable work experience received by participants is sourced within the local community's voluntary and not for profit sector, sports clubs, mental health support groups, cancer support groups, tidy towns and the local Ballinasloe Enterprise Centre.

Each participant works on their own individual training progression path at their own level. A needs analysis is carried out upon entry to the project and after discussion between the managers and the participant, the department

helps to fund the training. All participants at the moment are completing training which will help them progress into employment in areas such as security, lorry driving, taxi driving, office and sport administration, social media, payroll and accounts, and much more.


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BACD TO MARKET & MANAGE NEW PULSE CENTRE SPACE IN OLD LIBRARY



A fully furnished 4,000 square ft. office, located on the upper floors of the old Library is to be aggressively marketed and managed by BACD – Ballinasloe Area Community Development CLG, following a contract signing with owners Galway County Council.

It can accommodate up to 50 office workers. The area which is available for immediate occupation covers two floors and is complete with new carpets and office furniture. Just five minutes from the M6 and a free car park 100 metres from the front door, this is an ideal stress-free commute. Galway and Athlone are thirty five and fifteen minutes' drive respectively, with excellent bus and rail connectivity.

As part of an employment creation initiative by both Ballinasloe Area Community Development (BACD) Ltd board and Galway County Council (GCC), this office space is being offered at competitive rental rates with the objective of creating new jobs for the town.

A three tier approach is being taken with this focus in mind.

- 1) There is a dearth of quality office space immediately available in both Galway and Athlone, targeted companies are being identified to relocate their "non-essential" head office staff to the new Ballinasloe office. Functions that could be moved include Finance / Administration / After Sales service / Marketing research etc.
2. To assist young entrepreneurs develop their business concepts, part of the office space will be allocated as an incubation zone. "Hot Desks" will be made available at a nominal monthly rental and the BACD will be on hand to introduce mentors and offer a pathway to resources,

grant aid and contacts.

3. Fast Landing, the IDA from time to time requires a "Fast Landing" site. Companies who have decided on the Midlands to locate their headquarters, often require immediate and suitable office space for many reasons including: Advance teams for planning and implementation / recruitment, Project management of a construction site, A base for market research.

Whilst Skibereen and other provincial towns have their Ludgates – for new high speed, cyber space companies – the Building and location may well lend itself to some Hi – tech start ups as the town is also earmarked for a Broadband speed upgrade.

The general terms – are a letting Minimum 12 months, Broad band speed Fibre Broadband, Parking Free carparking in fairgreen carpark, Catering Self-service kitchenette, Access: Own access through blue door, Disabled: fully disable accessible. Customisation or reconfiguration of space would be based on length of lease and type of employment numbers the project could offer.

BACD Board Director Brian King (Ex AT Cross Management) believes that the space and approach are ideal for targeting the next generation of young entrepreneurs "the location, the premises are well positioned to assist is us mentoring and reaching out to our young people in colleges, or at the start of their careers who are priced out of the major population centres" states Brian.

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EXPRESSIONS OF INTEREST SOUGHT FOR NEW FACTORY

Ballinasloe Area Community Development Chairman Seamus Duffy has announced that they are now seeking expressions of interest from parties regarding the development of a new Commercial Unit in Creagh.

Planning permission is in place for a 15,000 square feet industrial unit and the Development Company is now looking to move to the next level.

Several options are available to potential investors; the option is there to purchase the site and build on spec. If a company is interested in building and occupying this can be facilitated. A third option is that the Development Company will build if they have a party interested in committing to a long-term lease.

Currently home to several multinational companies and is an ideal location to establish a base, along with a high quality regional hospital namely Portiuncula.

From a logistics point of view there are two exits off the M6 Motorway which link the town to Knock, Shannon & Dublin Airports, and the Business Park is located on the main Dublin / Galway rail line and again has direct links to all major Irish Ports.

The town has a highly educated workforce, with close links to NUIG, GMIT and AIT, with two top quality feeder secondary schools (Ardscoil Mhuire and Garbally College).

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REIMAGINING ST. BRIGIDS SEMINAR REPORT SIGNALS PATHWAY FOR MULTI USE FUTURE

The Final Report on potential uses for the future of the St. Brigid's campus in Ballinasloe highlights "a very clear consensus around the vision for St. Brigid's and the next step" Minister Denis Naughten has confirmed.

The report follows Minister Naughten's discussion-based workshop as part of his and the town team project 'Reimagining St. Brigid's' and highlights that those who attended – State agencies as well as businesses and community representatives from throughout the area – all shared a common vision for the site and how this should be progressed.

The delegates to the workshop were chosen to represent various sectors of the community, and senior management of the key state stakeholders. Some participants were invited to the facilitated workshop on the basis of their submissions to the open call for ideas launched on line through the survey portal. Over 700 submissions and questionnaires were received on ideas for the use of the campus and site.

"This report clearly shows how positively this project has been met and the commitment and enthusiasm of the workshop attendees," explained Minister Naughten. "When we started this project it was because of my belief in the huge potential of not only the site but also the town of Ballinasloe as a whole. I believe this site can be transformed breathing new life into the town. What was most interesting was that a consensus of opinion emerged for the future of the site despite the diverse nature of the stakeholders in attendance, a strong indicator of the support for the project."

Chairman of BACD Seamus Duffy welcomed both the process and the report's outcome "this has energised us all into seeing the positives that can come about from the current sad eyesore that is deteriorating in front of our eyes and provides us with a route map for next concrete steps. Certainly the Town Team and the Development Company will continue to partner with the stakeholders on the next phases of this project" stated Seamus.

The overall consensus that emerged is for a multi-use space that would draw on the mental health history of the site by creating an interactive museum and heritage site, forming a global centre of excellence around this centre with research and training facilities as well as a wellness village and trails.

The need for a commercial element to drive job growth locally and regionally was acknowledged as was the potential to incorporate opportunities for training and education and both indoor and outdoor community spaces.

It was agreed that the next steps should be forming an action group and main promoter, continuing community engagement and completing a feasibility study of the vision.

"From the beginning this project has been about stimulating debate on the future for the town and the St. Brigid's site and



about bringing together local knowledge and national expertise to map how this could progress and what exactly the future could look like for this landmark location" commented Minister Naughten.

"The response to this project has been extremely positive from

both the local community and the State agencies with the likes of Enterprise Ireland, the IDA, Government Departments, the Film Board and RTE among the many who attended the discussion workshop" concluded Minister Naughten.

25th September: Content Creation for Website and Social Media (half-day course).

Learn how to create and develop unique and relevant content for your website and social media channels. Find out how to keep your customers engaged and interested in your business. The Course costs €30.

2nd October: Search Engine Optimisation.

Learn the importance of search and SEO for marketing your business and driving traffic to your website. This workshop aims to provide a detailed overview of current Search Engine Optimisation best practice, it will address keyword research, long tail keywords, structure, navigation and sales conversion. The Course costs €50.

9th October: Facebook for Business (Advanced course).

This workshop is for people already familiar with Facebook and have a Facebook business page already in operation. Facebook is constantly changing and has evolved into an advertising business platform. This will cover the latest Facebook marketing techniques and advert campaigns. The Course costs €50.

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THE PILLAR HOUSE 60-YEAR ANNIVERSARY

Whilst many families have opened and closed doors on various streets – it's nice to see one family synonymous with Society St. celebrate six decades of successful trading.

The late Godfrey & Evelyn Gibbons first bought the pub in August 1958 from Maureen (nee Dolan) & Mick Croghan. During the 1800's The National Bank of Ireland was the original building before it was bought by the Dolan family in the later part of that century and converted into a Pub and Grocers.

Godfrey was originally from Ballindine and Evelyn had worked with her mother in Cahill's Pub, in Ahascragh. They wanted to own their own business and when The Pillar House came up for sale they paid the princely sum of £2,500 after it had been withdrawn at auction.

Son Raymond and his wife Claire now own the business, with up to 15 staff members with them in the bar and in the kitchen, which is led by Raymond's sister Kathryn. The Pub serves food from 9am – 9pm daily with a full Breakfast, Lunch and A La Carte Dinner Menu with daily specials.

"Our menus change regularly, we aim to provide quality food which is good value. Over the last few years one area of the business which has grown is Outside Catering. It's a great option for parties at home for whatever occasion and we provide a full package from Hot & Cold Food options, cutlery right down to Ice and Ice Buckets" states Kathryn.

Cathal the eldest son was just two when Godfrey & Evelyn bought the premises in 1958. Over the next 40 years until their retirement 7 children were brought up in a very busy house.

Godfrey started the Midland and West of Ireland Darts Tournament which brought teams from all over the country through the 60's. The bar once had a great reputation as a card playing venue and many Christmas Dinners were had from the hampers which were played for.

Raymond says there have been many ups and downs along with changes throughout the years of business in town, but has good hopes for the future. "The 80's and the most recent recession were the hardest, but there have been many happy times which will always outweigh the others" reflects Raymond.

"We have great family behind us and most importantly fantastic customers, people who came in with their own grandparents and parents for a glass of red lemonade and now they are coming in with their own families for lunch and dinner" continues Raymond.

"There have been so many changes in the last 60 years, a lot of developments in the trade which help in the management of the business, but like other traditional industries such as farming you need to be able to wear so many other hats than just that of a barman". The town has suffered greatly in the recent recession with a lot of businesses closing their doors, but it's great to see some new doors opening up. A thriving urban area needs to have choice to attract people into town. If that choice doesn't exist people will go elsewhere", states Raymond.

Looking back he remarks there have been many changes to Society St. in our time, probably most notably the number of families who live on the street. "Our business has changed hugely. 60 years ago, up until 25 years ago our business was just a pub trade, but now a major part of our business is the Restaurant & food operation" he commented.

"There's been a major consolidation on the number of pubs in the town. 20 years ago, there were up to 30 pubs, now there's 12 or 13. It's important that we continue to support our local businesses particularly

with the start of the Town Enhancement Work. When it's done it will bring a positive change to the landscape of the town, but it certainly will bring challenges while it's ongoing" said Raymond.

2 YOUTHS TO CYCLE FROM MALIN TO MIZEN FOR JIGSAW

challenges of their lives to date, by taking on a cycle which includes 2,500km of Ireland's famous Atlantic coastline.

"Mental health is a problem nobody likes to talk about, even the Government who seem to sweep everything under the table and really haven't recognised it as a growing problem. It will forever be implanted within us during our time within college, where nearly on a weekly basis a young person went missing or committed suicide which is so tragic when you consider they had their whole lives ahead of them yet" states Shane.

When searching for the organisation that the boys felt would do justice to the funds the hope to raise, Jigsaw stood out to them. Jigsaw are a charity organisation with support mental health centres all throughout Ireland, and what stood out for the duo was the charity's emphasis on early intervention and prevention.

Although Jigsaw offer a range of services to those suffering by helping them find their way back out of the dark space of their mind, they are also working hard to prevent others ever having to undergo such a scary experience.

Both Shane and Graham have witnessed the effects that losing someone through suicide can have, both on a family and the community. Ireland currently ranks 4th in the world for Suicide

rates among young men between 18- 24, yet suicide is rarely talked about due to the stigma that surrounds it.

"We believe breaking this stigma is the key to seeing real change within our country and hope you will join us in our support for this wonderful organisation and help them fulfil their vision of a happier Ireland" said Graham.

Barry of Barry Cycles helped the boys out with the mechanics of the bike and proper cycling techniques. The lads couldn't credit him enough for all his assistance when it was needed.

The charity cycle starts on the 8th of September, which has given the lads lots of time to train and prepare for their adventure and good cause.

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European Union Vice-President and MEP for Ireland's Midland and North-West Constituency Mairéad McGuinness visited the town library for a Q&A session with locals as part of Europe Day 2018.

Mairéad, who was invited to attend on the day by Senator Maura Hopkins, had a great turnout of locals and primary school students in the Church Gallery. Senator Hopkins and Councillor Aidan Donohue welcomed Mairéad on stage before they opened the floor for questions.

The Primary School Students were well prepared for the occasion as they got the ball rolling, by asking questions which really challenged the trio and put them on the spot.

Some lucky students were brought up on stage by McGuinness as they got to take part in brief discussions on the importance of Ireland being a member of the EU. Topics such as Brexit and EU policies were touched upon as the children got a better insight to what exactly the EU is all about.

Mairéad was very impressed by the turnout at the event, saying that it was great to see people of all ages get involved: "To see the young children show an interest in matters such as EU politics is great, it shows that they are willing to learn about modern day issues which will help them a lot in the future".

After the presentation and questions were over, Mairéad invited everyone in attendance forward for photographs, before taking a tour of the new Pulse Business Centre above the Library. Members of the BACD were happy with the reaction McGuinness had about the new office spaces, saying that they will prove to be vital in bringing employment to the town.

Speaking after the tour, Mairéad spoke about how businesses in the town can attract foreign direct investment from other countries; "The opportunities for investment are there for the taking, what people need to do is just keep pressing and pressing to get people to come and look at the facilities ye have here in town and the surrounding areas. Sometimes Ballinasloe can be forgotten about as its centralised

between two large business hubs (Galway and Athlone), but the value of my visit is that I can now see that people here are very enthusiastic about business opportunities.

"Take for instance the new facilities I'm in right now (Pulse Centre), businesses in more urban areas around Ireland might be under pressure with expanding their company due to lack of properties or high prices, and with the enthusiasm I've heard today from locals saying that we will not be forgotten will prove to be a huge prospect in attracting foreign investment" added the MEP.

On the topic of Brexit, Mairéad says that it's not yet known how much it will affect small towns such as Ballinasloe until more discussions between Ireland and the UK take place; "We don't yet know how extreme Brexit is going to be for businesses all across Ireland, of course trade is going to be the biggest issue should a hard border be brought in which I certainly hope will not be the case. What we (The EU) are trying to do now is limit the damage so that the severe damage that could happen is restricted.

"Trade of goods which come through this town will no doubt have to pass through the UK at some stage to get onto the continent, if a hard

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border or no trade agreements are made at that time then it will have effect on business. My sense from talking to UK officials is that they don't want to disrupt trade, but unfortunately we haven't found a way of having a new relationship with the United Kingdom once they do leave the EU.

"We most certainly have the support of the other 26 members in the parliament so that businesses all across Ireland, and in particular small rural areas such as the town here don't lose all their employment values just for the sake of one member leaving".

Mairéad believes that farmers in rural areas such as here are vitally important to the Irish economy, and that the EU is doing everything they can to be sure that it stays this way;

"The Common Agricultural Policy (CAP) is such an important factor for rural Europe, but in particular for rural Ireland. Money from this budget goes such a long way to help farmers pump

more money back into local shops and businesses all across Ireland. In regard to new policies, the new reform of the CAP is shaped heavily on more environmental delivery, and with this we are doing our best to protect the budget, so no farmers fall short of income in the future. I think rural areas like Ballinasloe have a lot more to offer when it comes to agriculture, but with Britain leaving we now need more countries from the EU to get involved and help boost our agricultural climate".

Regarding tourism, Mairéad believes that Ballinasloe along with other small towns across the midlands have a lot to offer, and the EU is working hard on making that happen;

"The EU wants to help develop rural regions, and tourism plays a major part in that. When you think of the Wild Atlantic Way, years ago no one would have even known all the wonders that exist along it, so now its all about promoting the many eye-catching scenes which lie around our delicate midlands" she concluded.



Educate provides finance not just to third level students. The research and focus groups found that education costs starts back at Primary School level, therefore all age groups participating in education are included under this Educate offering.

If parents find themselves stressed in kitting out their child with uniforms, books, netbooks, iPad's etc. in the primary and secondary level education, Educate can also help them. If your child is beginning a third level journey, taking up an apprenticeship or going back to study something new, then don't hesitate to enquire about the Educate loan.

The Credit Unions designed Educate to allow the student and parent to take control of their education. Eligible members (student or parents of student) can borrow for a wide range of educational needs. From Primary school right up to graduating with a third level degree, a Post Grad, Mature Student, Apprenticeships, Online

courses or even studying abroad; Educate is designed to suit you.

There are several flexible options available for repaying this loan type. The borrower can pay off the loan early, make additional lump sum repayments or increase the regular repayments, all without penalty. Other repayment options can also be discussed for this loan.

Typically education is an expensive time in the life of a young person or for someone who wishes to re-enter training or education at a later stage in their life. Educate can also be suitable for these members.

This Educate loan pack is different to many of existing loans offered by the credit unions. It offers an element of flexibility different to all other loans, and the CU's encourage those interested in borrowing to call in and discuss this with a Loans Officer.

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

Just over twenty-one years ago the Ursuline Sisters opened a prayer centre, near Shannonbridge, which has become a "Place of Peace" for many hundreds of people since. It is located only 500 metres from Shannonbridge, just off the R357 road to Ballinasloe.

The place of prayer at Rahrabeg is located within five miles of the ancient monastic site of Clonmacnoise and is in the parish of Moore and Clonfad. It is named Ard Chiarain and was officially opened by the late Bishop Joseph Cassidy, the retired Archbishop of Tuam, who was Parish Priest of Moore at the time. The land was donated by the late Fr. Paddy Kenny, a native of the area.

Sr. Maura Moran said the project was funded by the Ursuline congregation, benefactors and the South Roscommon Leader Group. It was the result of "her vision" that the place of prayer and reflection, near the Celtic Christian Community of St. Ciarain came into being. It is comprised of a central meeting chalet and four surrounding residential chalets distant from each other with electricity, toilets and cooking facilities. All five units are surrounded by gardens and walks.

"I wanted the general public to find the place a place of peace, rest and general relaxation, where



they could experience a renewal of spirit before returning to the market place" explained Sr. Maura who is assisted by two other Sisters at the Centre, Sr. Margaret Mary and Sr. Marie.

The Centre offers Directed Retreats, Centering Prayer, Morning and Evening Prayer of the Church as well as Advent and Lenten Devotions and Spiritual Direction or Counselling. The chalets are situated in landscaped gardens, overlooking the Rivers Shannon and Suck. "Ard Chiarain is a Centre of Prayer and Reflection, offering an opportunity for relaxation, peace and self-renewal" added Sr. Maura who wanted to thank all those who supported them over the past twenty-one years, especially the Ursuline Community.

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PASSING OF KITTY MULVIHILL

Catherine (Kitty) Mulvihill, Birchgrove, (nee Finnerty, Ardnaglug), recently passed away peacefully in St. Brendan's Community Nursing Unit in her 97th year.

Kitty attended Attyrory N.S where she excelled in her studies, winning a scholarship to the Convent Secondary School in Ballinasloe. She had a thirst for knowledge and loved learning, but unfortunately the economic climate at the time didn't allow her to continue her studies, which was something she always regretted.

Kitty was a great believer in work, and one of the things she always said was "Hard work never killed anyone". She extended her farm where she sowed crops, and with the help of her sons Peter and Tom would sell her products on the top of the Square and to Hayden's Hotel.

She was an exceptionally resourceful person, whether it was making clothes for all her children, carrying out repairs, cooking, baking, and working on the farm and bog. She always displayed amazing bursts of energy and skill, a wonderful role model for all her family.

The Irish language was one of Kitty's fascinations in life, which she attributed to Master Flynn, a Moore native in Attyrory. She helped teach her children and grandchildren with their studies, where learning Irish empowered them to excel in their

examinations.

Religious faith carried Kitty through her times of crisis. She was a daily Mass goer for several years and prayed the rosary daily right up to the end of her life. Her rosary beads and prayer book were two of the most treasured items Kitty carried in life. "Is Giorra Cathair Né Ná an Doras", meaning God's help is nearer than the door, was Kitty's phrase when ensuring that her family got holy water leaving the house.

Kitty's garden was always well kept. She had a love for flowers and was always fascinated by their bright colours. Reading was also one of her favourite hobbies, especially the daily newspaper each morning.

Keeping in touch with loved ones overseas was very important to Kitty. Sending and receiving letters gave her great pleasure knowing that no one was too far from home.

Though she didn't play sport, she had a keen interest in G.A.A, Rugby, Athletics, Golf, and most of all the show jumping in the RDS. Seeing Roscommon win the Connacht Championship in 2017 brought her great delight, and she was down to meet them on their return to Padraig Pearse's.

Her manners were pushed into her family as they grew up. She respected everyone regardless of their status, and with this she showed great empathy towards those who were less fortunate.

Music always brightened Kitty's day, where she had numerous favourite artistes and songs to dance to with her children. Her favourite of all was the song "Fields of Gold" by Eva Cassidy, as it reminded her of her childhood.

The greatest tribute we can give Kitty is to embrace the values of what she stood for, such as cherishing family and friends, her hard work and of course her love of prayer and religious observance. A wonderful role model for everyone.



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20 PARAMEDICS GRADUATE FROM NATIONAL TRAINING CENTRE

The Graduation of Student Paramedic Course P28B from the National Ambulance Service College, Ballinasloe took place recently at the NAS College and Gullane's Hotel. The Paramedics were taught by lecturers John Marshall, Ivan O'Grady, PJ Commins, Tom Connaughton and Pdraig Glynn.

Twenty undergraduates received their degree in advance paramedics, which is a level 9 honorary level. They went through a one-year undergraduate programme followed by a one-year postgrad, and a year of operational practice before undergoing a two-year advanced paramedic course in the local Enterprise & Technology Centre complex.

The training centre was set up in Ballinasloe back in 2008 by the National Education Manager professor Shane Knox. Since that time there has been hundreds of students studying within the complex from all over Ireland and the rest of the world.

Lecturer Pdraig Glynn gives an insight to the training process involved within the complex: "The training involves didactic, practical, super numery and observation on ambulances, which is all conducted by the Pre-Hospital Emergency Care Council. After training is completed and the students get their degrees they become operational paramedics, where they can be distributed to any part of Ireland" stated Pdraig.

"At the moment we currently have 120 students studying with us. The numbers keep rising every year which is something we are very happy with, and we hope it continues over the coming years. All of the lecturers here carry diplomas in Emergency Medical Science (Para-Medicine)" he explains.

Students are recruited through the HSE, where they must hold a leaving certificate with one science subject and maths. With this applicant must also hold a C1 drivers licence (extra haulage vehicle compared to an ordinary licence).

The graduation was honoured to have present Martin Dunne (Director of the HSE National Ambulance Service), Macartan Hughes (National Head of Education and Competency Assurance) and Shane Knox (National Education Manager).

"We are all very proud of what these students have achieved this year. To become a paramedic is not an easy journey any of our staff members will tell you that themselves. These guys have worked long hours, given up so much of their free time and worked in some very hard conditions, but now it has all paid off for the team and I wish them all the best in their careers" remarked Pdraig.

The students now leave the college and go operational as Paramedics with the National Ambulance Service Nationwide.

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ADOPT A DOG IN KILLIMOR

Galway SPCA (Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals), was set up in 1985. From very humble beginnings, with volunteers caring for animals in their own homes, they have progressed to a sanctuary in Killimor and a shop, offices and small cattery in Galway city.

Their aim is to rescue, rehabilitate and re home all animals in their care to forever homes. In addition to caring for these animals they also work closely with other organisations and government bodies to monitor and support as many animals in distress or causing concern to the public as their resources allow.

Now volunteers in Ballinasloe and Aughrim are fostering some of these unfortunate animals in their own homes and even adopting some of them. Diane Dolan from Kilclooney and Margaret Manning from Aughrim are leaders in the field. Diane said "We absolutely love animals and do our best to bring them back to full health. They are often neglected or abandoned and you really feel for them."

Diane went on to appeal to the public to assist in this worthy cause and added "the Killimor Sanctuary is open seven days a week, 365 days of the year, where there are cats, dogs, rabbits, guinea pigs, snakes, turtles, ferrets, birds and even goats, ready for adoption. On average they care for 750 animals each year, which takes a lot of time and money. If you are looking to adopt and of the above feel free to visit the Sanctuary. It can be a moving experience. We are constantly looking for volunteers, even for a few hours a week" explained Diane.

With animal neglect and cruelty at an all-time high, they believe education is the key and regularly visit schools throughout the county, giving talks to students about animal welfare.

One such case is that of Sparrow. A young lurcher girl found wandering the streets of Tuam on a cold and wet January night. Clearly in distress,

limping, shut down and void of emotion. After x rays revealed a badly broken leg Sparrow was referred to a specialist vet in Galway city where an operation was carried out and plates were inserted into her leg. But it doesn't end there. Surgery is just the beginning. Weeks of crate rest, numerous vet visits and hydrotherapy treatment are needed to make sure Sparrow makes a full recovery. Which will hopefully give her back her freedom and use of her damaged limb.

The Sanctuary rely heavily on public donations and throughout the year hold a variety of fund-raising events. "As part of their campaign we are having a 'Wags to Riches' night of Fashion in Gullane's Hotel on Friday 7th of September at 8.30pm. This year's theme will be smart casual, night on the town, girls night out, informal dresses, shoes and handbags. Tickets are only €10 and can be purchased on

the night or on eventbrite.ie" said Margaret Manning.

"If you are considering getting a pet whether it be a cat, dog or other smallie then please think about a rescue pet. A visit to the sanctuary is a must where their experienced staff will guide you through the process. Their aim is to match the right pet to the right home. All pets are neutered, microchipped and vaccinated which is included in the rehoming donation they ask for" stressed Diane Dolan, head of the Ballinasloe Volunteer Group

TOWN GARDENING & TIDYING IN THE HEATWAVE

Over the summer period we witnessed one of our hottest ever summers, with weeks of sunshine with no rain, and temperatures reaching up to the 35°C in our locality.

Terrible drought led to the hose-pipe ban, which in turn saw many plants dying and withering. However, the town's flora, plants and bedding were still looking in good shape thanks to the work of many different organisations.

The Tidy Towns, Community Employment Scheme (Ballinasloe Training for Employment), Probation Community Service Project, Moore Scouts, and local businesses all played their part in maintaining the flowers and plants fresh blooming look, by keeping them well watered and replacing the ones which had died.

Different areas around the town were adopted by members of each groups depending on their location. The Tidy Towns took matters into their own hands to keep the plants watered by collecting water from rivers. The plants were tended to for an hour each day, split during morning and night.

The Tesco roundabout flower beds were the worst effected of the lot during the heat, due it being one of the driest areas in town. The moss peat soil which the plants were bedded in didn't help the situation, which led to earth soil being placed in the bed to hold moisture.

The Tidy Towns currently has a small committee of 12 people, with support from local stakeholders who have been very helpful over the past few months. They are Johnny Walshe, Patricia Tierney, Michael Mullins, Marirose Cullinane, Billy Ward, Kevin Connolly, Claire Connolly, Carmel Grealy, Nancy Cregg, Martin Healy, Nora Smith and Mary Whelan.

Chairperson Tom Madden says that the group is continuously working hard to keep the towns floral features healthy, along with their other duties such as litter picking.

The National Tidy Towns Competition has been entered again this year and they are hopeful that they can improve on last year's mark of 299, although Tom believes the construction work associated with Town Enhancement Programme may prove to be a challenge to this.

"Our committee gives a lot of our free hours to help make our

locality more attractive and bright town for the community and visitors. We can't do this without the help and support of

other organisations and individuals who play their part in helping us when we are not around" states Tom.

"Funding applications are never an easy process to go through, though we never stop to look for financial aid, and Galway County Council always give what they have to help us" continues Tom.

The committee has again been successful with funding from Galway County Council under their Community Support Scheme 2018. It will replace plants and flowers that were lost during the dry spell.

The committee is actively promoting a biodiversity project in consultation with the National Biodiversity Data Centre and Galway County Council, which will see the erection of a number bilingual signs in chosen planted areas of town.

This year Galway County Council are promoting a new 'Cleaner Community Awards', in 4 categories; Best Planted Area, Best Kept Burial Ground, Sweep Your Streets/Litter Clean Up and Best Presented Public Recycling Area.

The Tidy Towns Committee along with several volunteers have put together an application under all four categories and are hopeful of some success.

of my grandmother, and her family's lives. To connect with any of my family living in or whose heritage is from Ballinasloe would be wonderful! To be able to learn about my grandmother and her family, after all this time, well, it would be emotional that's for sure!"

Holly has never been to Ballinasloe before, as she didn't know her family was from there until recently, though she has been to the Emerald Isle on two occasions (Cork and Dublin), in which she claims that she loved them both and is hoping for another journey across the Irish Sea soon.

Looking for lost family is a difficult task according to Holly, though she highly recommends that people in similar cases to hers should most certainly give it a go: "For anyone who is trying to find their long-lost family, I have found that from one birth, marriage or death certificate, with the help of Google, patience and ordering subsequent relevant certificates, you can unravel a lot of mysteries!"

"It does take time though, and it can be incredibly frustrating, but keep at it, talk to people about it, as an objective view point from others can lead to more leads than you yourself may not see".

The Irish Cancer Society has recently launched a Cancer Information Point at PUH. Located in the front foyer of the hospital, it provides cancer information to hospital patients and out-patients as well as visitors and the general public.

The information covers subjects such as Cancer prevention, risk reduction, early detection, and services available to patients and the public, how to contact the Irish Cancer Society, and local services such as Cancer Support Centres.

Speaking at the launch of the Information Point, Joan Kelly, Cancer Support Manager with the Irish Cancer Society said "We are delighted to officially open the Information Point in Portiuncula Hospital. On average, over 1,700 people in Galway receive a cancer diagnosis each year so the Information Point will be a valuable support to local cancer patients, their families and the public.

"The team in Portiuncula University Hospital have been very enthusiastic about having the Cancer Information Point at their hospital which services a wide community in East County Galway and surrounding counties."

James Keane, the new General Manager of Portiuncula University Hospital added "We are very pleased to unveil the new Cancer Information Point. It will serve as a valuable resource in the hospital to the significant number of patients and visitors that attend the hospital daily."

The Hospital made major headlines recently when news broke that they have spent over €28 million on hiring agency staff over the past 5 years. In 2017 alone, the hospital spent close to €5.8million. There has never been so much spent on agency staff alone in the



hospital in the years before 2013. Since that time the figures kept on increasing each year as far as 2016, where they gradually started to decrease.

Sinn Féin general election candidate Claire Kerrane says that the result of PUH not being able to hold onto staff members and recruit suitable ones, has led to this splurge of unnecessary spending. She vehemently believes that so many highly trained nurses and doctors could have been hired with that sum of money.

According to RateMyHospital.ie, Portiuncula Hospital remains at 29th place since May out of the 69 public and private hospitals across Ireland in terms of overall ranking.

Regarding our neighbouring hospitals, Roscommon County Hospital sits six places behind on 35th, whereas University College Hospital Galway sits well below in 65th.

During the month of June, only 5 people were recorded on trolleys during the month according to www.imno.ie, a drop from 8 in April.



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
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RESTORATION OF TOWN COUNCILS BILL ON AUTUMN OIREACTHAS AGENDA BY IAN O'BOYLE



Former Mayor of the old Ballinasloe Town Council, Johnny Walsh, believes that the passing of The Local Government Restoration of Town Councils Bill 2018 will be a huge benefit to Ballinasloe. The Bill was introduced in the Dáil in early July by the Labour Party, in which it effectively restores Town Councils throughout the State for towns with a population of 5,000 or more residents.

According to Labour Leader Brendan Howlin TD, "We have identified a clear problem, which is that national and regional level public bodies have lost focus on urban development, and whole towns are missing out on opportunities for economic development due to the lack of a local figurehead, such as a mayor, to promote the town.

"We want a Local Government Commission to consider and define each qualifying town. We provide that each Council would elect a minimum of 9 town councillors. For towns with a population over 25,000, 15 Councillors would be elected. There would be one local electoral area for each town. They would be a body corporate, and under the proposals a rating authority. Every enactment that applied to old town councils would be restored under the Bill and the costs will be met from existing resources said Mr. Howlin.

The Government believe the adoption of a town council system would

cost in the region of €40 million. If the Labour Party Bill is to become law, it will have to go through several stages in the Oireachtas, and ultimately it will have to be voted on by the Oireachtas members and TDs.

Johnny says that it's now or never for members of the Dáil and Oireachtas to push for the Bill to be passed, along with members of the public to start campaigning for their return. "Given the mathematical configuration of our current Dáil, there will never be a more ideal opportunity to pass this legislation. Even if the Government Party do not support it, it can still be passed by the combined opposition. This can become Law even against the wishes of the Government.

"It is because of this sense of injustice at the abolition of our Town Council that I have vigorously campaigned over the past 4 years for restoration. This campaign has now culminated in the Restoration of Town Councils Bill 2018 being tabled" continued Johnny.

"It's clear to me that the community in our Town of Ballinasloe desperately want and need our Town Council restored. I for one will certainly be canvassing our TDs, Senators and Councillors seeking support for this Bill in the Dáil, and I would respectfully suggest that members of the public in Ballinasloe who feel strongly on this issue should do likewise. If we want our Town Council restored, well now is the vital time to push for it" he added.

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BAN ON TRAUMA PATIENTS TO HOSPITAL PUTTING LIVES AT RISK

Fianna Fáil TD for Roscommon/Galway Eugene Murphy has said that the confirmation he has received from the HSE that no trauma patients are now been accepted in Portiuncula; is further putting lives at risk.

In a recent parliamentary question reply, the HSE have confirmed that as they have implemented their "major-trauma by-pass protocol" in relation to Portiuncula University Hospital Ballinasloe Co Galway.

"The confirmation that Portiuncula Hospital A&E has basically been downgraded is damning news for the people of Galway and Roscommon. When Roscommon Hospital was downgraded, and the A&E lost, we were given a commitment that Portiuncula would be our emergency hospital in cases of Trauma.

"The people of Roscommon and East Galway were promised a comprehensive ambulance service and more investment in Portiuncula Hospital to ensure that we didn't lose the 'Golden Hour' in relation to accidents and emergencies. We have no chance of delivering the sickest and most urgent patients to University Hospital Galway within the 'Golden Hour' from many parts of Roscommon and Galway.

Therefore, Portiuncula is a vital A&E for this area.

"The figures that I received last year in relation to ambulance turnaround time are also very worrying as 21% of ambulances that

arrive at UCHG take longer than 60 minutes to book in patients due to the back logs already experienced" continued the T.D.

"The HSE's decision that all trauma patients will now go to the already overwhelmed UCHG is another bad decision", concluded Deputy Murphy.

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IRISH CANCER SOCIETY PROMOTES FREE TRANSPORT SERVICE

The Irish Cancer Society is promoting awareness of a free transport service for patients attending hospital for chemotherapy treatments.

This service, which has been available to patients locally since March 2012, is volunteer delivered. Patients are picked up by a trained and garda vetted volunteer driver who will collect the patient at the door of their home, drive them to the hospital and when finished treatment they will be collected and brought home again.

It is a one-to-one service, though the patient may bring a companion. This service is available to cancer patients in Galway and Westmeath travelling to any of the following partner hospitals for treatment: Portiuncula Hospital, Galway University Hospital or the Midlands Regional Hospital, Tullamore.

Gail Flinter, Patient Travel and Financial Support Manager with the Irish Cancer Society said "The Volunteer Driver Service allows cancer patients to access free transport to and from their chemotherapy treatments, removing the worry, difficulty and financial burden of travelling at an already stressful time. This is a door to door service with local drivers driving local patients to and from their treatments. We have a fantastic national network of volunteers who give generously of their time to help patients that are struggling with transport" she added.

William Duthie, a Ballinasloe Volunteer Driver who has been with the service since October 2012, has completed over 100 drives to date. He said "I'm delighted to have been involved with the service

since it started in the area. I first heard about the service during the 24-hour fund-raiser held in Ballinasloe in 2012. They needed volunteers to drive patients to treatments and seeing as I have the time I volunteered. It's been a very worthwhile experience for me. I hope to continue with the service as long as I'm able."

The Volunteer Driver Service is completely free to the patient, and drivers are paid a contribution towards their fuel, all road toll costs and some refreshments during the day.

The Irish Cancer Society's Volunteer Driver Service is now available in 24 hospitals nationwide. In 2017 the Society's 1,217 drivers brought 1,345 patients to and from 12,156 appointments, covering more than 1.2 million kilometres in 2017 alone. Now in its tenth year, the demand for the service continues to grow.

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
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SARAH CORCORAN WINS AIMS AWARD BY IAN O'BOYLE

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
BOOK LAUNCH & MAPS EXHIBITION FOR CULTURE NIGHT IN LIBRARY

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


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
COMMUNITY GAMES 45 SUMMERS OF PARTICIPATION

Ballinasloe GAA are hosting an Oscar ceremony fundraising event later this year. This promises to be one of the largest Community Events to ever take place in town, which takes place on Friday the 7th of December.

While Lips Synch and Strictly come dancing have nearly worn themselves out on the voluntary fundraising scene – the Club will create Seven short films of 12-minute duration to be shown on the night, all of which will be shot locally by incorporating local Actors and Actresses. Chairman of the GAA, Seamus Duffy, says that as well as bringing in much needed funds into the Club, this whole event will enable people living in the area to form new friendships and further develop existing

relationships that will benefit the whole community long into the future.

An event of this magnitude will require meticulous planning, but a committee is already putting a schedule in place with a launch night pencilled in for late August or early September, according to Seamus.

The Club run a sizeable fundraising event every 4 to 5 years, the most previous being their Cycle from Croke Park to Ballinasloe in 2014 from which €50,000 was raised. Four years prior to that in 2010, an Auction was held in the Emerald Ballroom which raised a similar amount of money.

Over the past 10 years, the club have built three pitches and a new Clubhouse, which came to a total outlay of €2.5million which caters for over 30 teams in Hurling, Football & Ladies Football.

Casting will take place on the 24th of September for the event. Rehearsals will be held on the 22nd/29th of October and the 5th/12th of November. Filming will take place over two weekends, the 17/18th of November and on the 24/25th of November.



Local Community organisations have rallied around Ballinasloe Town A.F.C. in the Club's bid to be named the F.A.I. national club of the year. The club have recently qualified as one of the 8 finalists in this prestigious competition and the overall national title winner will be selected at this year's F.A.I. congress in August.

Local organisations ranging from resident's associations, local primary and secondary schools, charitable groups, youth groups, training workshops, community employment schemes, B.A.C.D., Community Games, The Credit Union and Tidy Towns all contributed in a positive fashion to the club's application by highlighting the contribution that the Club make to the Ballinasloe Community.

The community involvement/integration is one of the criteria in which the national adjudicators will assess the applications. Other criteria consist of club development of facilities, youth structure and policy, involvement with F.A.I. Programmes in terms of coaching courses, child protection courses and player development, success on the field of play and promoting the sport of association football (soccer).

The Club are certainly to the forefront regarding satisfying the relevant criteria in that they can successfully boast of a €1.75 million euros development which is currently 97% debt free and consists of 2 grass playing pitches (1 floodlit), 2 floodlit astro turf pitches, a state of the art newly constructed clubhouse, spectator stand and machinery/storage building. The club also have a licence agreement regarding the use of a grass pitch and floodlit training area with the H.S.E. at St. Brigid's Grounds.

The youth structure, sees the club cater for under 8s right up along the line to under 18s. Annual street leagues, weekly youth soccer academies and the hugely successful annual youth soccer camp are also an integral part of the club's youth activities. The Clubs managers/coaches have

successfully completed F.A.I. coaching courses, child protection courses and garda vetting this season.

Former club players who progressed up through the club youth structure have this season featured on Irish International teams, namely Heather Payne (ladies senior team), Jordan Carr (Irish under 16 team) and Conor Lyang (under 18 Irish schools team). Conor Lyang and Eoin McCormack have both signed for Galway United and are starring for the League of Ireland club.

Also featured as recent highlights were the under 16 International between Ireland and Hungary, along with the recent official opening of the new state of the art clubhouse.

Success on the field that was listed included being the current holders of the Connacht Junior Cup, winners of the over 35 league, winners of the under 12/13 combi league, runners up in the combi cup and winners of the A.D.S.L. Futsal Tournament. The clubs senior team finished as runners up in the league, just one point behind St. Peters of Athlone.

The winner of the F.A.I. club of the year will be announced on the 17th of August during the F.A.I. National Congress and Gala Dinner Night in Cork.

Club Development Co-ordinator Johnny Walsh paid tribute on behalf of the club to all Community Organisations who supported the club's application and to all involved with the club for all their excellent work.





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FINE GAEL



August and September are the perfect months to enjoy all the hard work you have done throughout the summer months. Autumn gardens are filled with an abundance of colour fruit, vegetables and flowering plants.

After a very hot summer your plants and garden will be looking for some extra TLC this Autumn. Watering and liquid feeding is more important now than ever to replenish the nutrients as your plants grow, this will ensure long lasting healthy flowers. Liquid feeding and deadheading is especially important in bedding and container

plants to encourage growth and ensure you get longevity out of your summer bedding.

Lawns will need a good feed to get ready for the winter, to counteract the damage done by the dry spell. September is an ideal time to apply a lawn Feed and weed killer to control broad leaved weeds and clover ask your local garden center for recommendations on which brand will work best for your lawn. August and September are ideal for Re-seeding bare patches in the lawn after summer conditions.

Continue to make sure the veg patch has plenty of water in dry spells. To help tomato plants ripen remove the bottom leaves from the stems starting from the base up, this will help to expose the plants to sunshine thus ripening fruit. Cut back herbs now to encourage a new flush of tasty leaves before the onset of frost in winter months. Dry herbs now and freeze any fruit for winter use.

Evergreen hedges can be given a final trim now. August is the perfect time for trimming hedges and shrubs that have now finished flowering for the summer. Pruning midsummer blooming shrubs this month will result in better displays next year and gives the plant time to recover from the pruning.

Planting trees and shrubs now will prepare your garden for the autumn months bringing colour and variety to your garden through the autumn. Planting shrubs and trees now also allows root systems to develop before the winter and will allow the plant to harden off over the winter months.

VETERAN CAR CLUB RALLY AUGUST VISIT

Plans are underway for the annual Vintage Car Club Rally, being hosted by the Ballinasloe and District Vintage Club.

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JUDGE KEOGH

**He insulted our clergy and likewise our bishop,
And scoffed at MacHale, the bright star of Mayo.
All Galway denies him, and Ireland will think on
The name of that hero – so help me God – Keogh!**

Born into a family that hailed from Taughmaconnell, William Keogh first drew the breath of life in Mary Street, Galway, on 17th December 1817, the son of a solicitor and former clerk of the Crown for Kilkenny. Educated at Dr. Hubbard's school in Dublin, young William, aged fifteen, entered Trinity College in 1832 to study science, but left in his third year without taking a degree. While there he had been a frequent speaker in the debates of the Historical Society and was awarded the first prize for oratory at the age of nineteen. The law beckoned, and in 1835 he was admitted a student of the King's Inns. Called to the bar in 1840, he joined the Connacht circuit where his family connections lay.

During a vacation in London he met and impressed the Birmingham banker and political reformer Thomas Attwood who persuaded him to stand for parliament, which he duly did in the 1847 general election, winning a seat in the borough of Athlone as a Peelite Conservative, thus becoming the first Irish Catholic Tory member of the House of Commons.

Pope Pius IX decided in 1850 to restore the Catholic hierarchy in England and Wales, which had been governed by Vicars Apostolic since the Reformation, a move some professed to regard as an encroachment on the rights of the Established Church, since it would involve the use of the names of Anglican dioceses. In response to public hysteria, the British government introduced the Ecclesiastical Titles Bill proposing to make it a criminal offence for anyone outside the Church of England to use as an episcopal title "the name of any city, town or place, or of any territory or district in the United Kingdom."

Because of their noisy opposition to the proposed legislation, the Irish MPs acquired the nickname of "The Pope's Brass Band", though they themselves preferred to be known as "The Irish Brigade". Keogh took an active and prominent part in the obstructive parliamentary campaign, and this greatly increased his reputation and popularity

in Ireland. After a meeting in Dublin in August 1851 he became one of the founders of the Catholic Defence Association set up to protest against the measure. About the same time, the Irish Tenants' League was established, whose aim was to secure for the tenant farmer the Three Fs: fair rent, freedom of sale and fixture of tenure. These combined bodies constituted

the only nation-wide organisation on any kind active in the 1850s, and their objectives were at once espoused by the Irish Brigade.

Prior to the 1852 general election, forty-eight Irish MPs, including Keogh, took the following pledge: "So help me God, no matter who the minister may be, I will never support that minister or that party unless he comes into power prepared to carry the measures which universal, popular Ireland demands". Following the election, a Conservative administration was formed under Lord Derby, with the Independent Irish Party, as they now styled themselves, holding the balance of power. The government collapsed before the end of the year, to be replaced by Lord Aberdeen's Liberal-Peelite coalition, with the Irish MPs still in the role of kingmakers.

Despite the new administration's lack of interest in furthering the policy objectives of the Irish Party, Keogh, its unofficial leader, accepted office under the government as solicitor-general for Ireland, while his friend, John Sadleir, MP for Carlow, became a junior Treasury minister. Keogh was subsequently appointed attorney-general for Ireland before advancing to the judicial bench

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in 1856. His opportunistic behaviour – which he never deigned to defend – caused widespread dismay amongst his erstwhile supporters who accused him of betraying the principles he had pledged himself to uphold. Furthermore, his reputation was not at all enhanced by his association with Sadleir, a failed banker and notorious fraudster, who later took his own life by swallowing prussic acid. It may be mentioned in passing that neither the Catholic Defence Association nor the Irish Tenants' League survived into the 1860s: the Ecclesiastical Titles controversy proved to be much ado about nothing. The Act soon became a dead letter, quietly ignored by the Catholic community, while the prosperous state of agriculture in post-Famine Ireland temporarily

relaxed the pressure for agrarian reform. A similar fate befell the Independent Irish Party, which had fragmented by the end of the 1850s, due to indiscipline and lack of effective leadership. Besides, they had nothing to show for their time in parliament, neither the Three Fs nor the repeal of the Titles Act.

Keogh incurred further odium by his remarks in the course of his judgement on the Trench petition in relation to the 1872 Galway by-election. Though in light of the evidence, Nolan, the Home Rule candidate, was properly unseated, Keogh imprudently allowed his indignation at clerical interference with the electoral process, combined with his emotional attachment to Unionism, to influence his choice of language, prompting him to castigate the behaviour of the Catholic clergy in coarse, sneering and profoundly offensive terms. His remarks were deeply resented, and aroused much popular feeling. Meetings were held at which he was denounced and his effigy burnt. (Our photograph shows an example from County Clare.) Such was the strength of feeling against him that he remained under police protection for the rest of his life.

By the late 1870s, Keogh was physically and mentally unwell. In 1878 he travelled to London to consult a specialist, who referred him for a course of treatment to a German clinic, where he died on 30th September that year. He was survived by his wife Kate whom he had married in 1841, and by a son and a daughter. Fearing that his coffin would be seized and thrown into the Liffey if his body were brought home for burial, his family opted for a local interment. Bearing the inscription, "To the Honourable William Keogh. His friends and all who admired him", a Celtic cross marks his grave in Bonn. There seems to be no evidence in support of the allegation that he committed suicide.

When lady shoppers in Ballinasloe hear the complimentary remark "You're looking very SALUBRIOUS today, Mrs." it can only come from the one and only Georgie Grehan, one of the town's most popular and lovable "characters." Renowned for his wit, good humour and happy smile, Georgie is highly popular with all sections of the community.

Born in St. Grellan's Terrace, sixty four years ago, he is the youngest son of Patsy and Molly (nee Ward). The rest of the family comprised Mikey, Mary (Finnerty), Patrick (Toby), Martin, Christy and Denis (Lully). As a very young boy, Georgie with some of his other brothers, accompanied their late father Patsy to GAA games, shows etc. where he "entertained" spectators to his own brand of singing. Often called "Caruso" the entertainer was rewarded with showers of coins from the spectators (often to encourage him to move on) and these were gratefully collected by his children.

Georgie joined the local Boxing club, where under the guidance of Colman Hernon and Buddy Donnellan he won a Co. championship title, in the 6 stone class, in the early sixties. He seldom failed to attend a GAA match, particularly if Galway were playing, and was on The Hill for Galway's historic three-in-a-row All-Ireland victories. This encouraged him to set up his "own business" of selling team colours prior to the games, ironically following in the footsteps of his second cousin, "Pancake" Ward.

It was then he picked up the word "Salubrious" with which he used to great advantage to woo customers. "I don't know what it means or where I heard it first but the ladies really love it" said a beaming Georgie. "I like to be good humoured, helpful and mannerly. I have never been in court and the gardai respect me for that. As a youngster growing up I tried to keep out of trouble but the improvements in St. Grellan's have been for the better and has given it a new lease of life. I like paying my respects at funerals and try to lead a good life" added Georgie.

Some years ago Georgie featured in the RTE's series of "Our Town" speaking of growing up in St. Grellan's and the poverty that existed in his childhood. After leaving school he worked in Dubarry before joining Toft's Amusements at the October Fair and subsequently in Skerries, Inchicore and Lahinch with his good pal Pat Loughnane. Later he took up employment in different restaurants and take-aways in the town where he continued to complement patrons with his trademark phrase "You're looking very Salubrious" with a cheeky grin on his face.

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




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Ballinasloe History Walk

1 – Start at the statue known as *The Man with the Horse*, where Main Street joins St. Michael's Square. From the crossing near the statue, continue by turning right onto Main Street. The prosperity of Ballinasloe in Georgian times can be seen in the scale and classical style of the buildings here. A fine group of four frontages stand across from the statue of The Man with the Horse. With shops and pubs on the ground floor for the most part, these Main Street premises have several floors above.

2 – Walking along Main Street, lift your eyes above the shop frontages for one of the town's characteristic sights. There are the Diocletian windows that grace several facades. They are from the years after 1805 when the 2nd Earl was in charge. A window of this sort is formed under a semi-circular arch with two upright divisions so that the whole opening is divided into three parts.

3 – As you stand at the meeting point of Bridge Street and Main Street, you will see the Victorian frontage of a commercial premises, originally the Masonic Hall. Next to it stands a classical looking, beautifully-crafted, early 19th century stone house, currently a guest house. Beside these is a tall, fine stone-fronted classical mansion, which is now the Bank of Ireland. It was originally the town mansion of the Lord of all of Ballinasloe, the Earl of Clancarty. A friend of king George IV, the Earl was one of the architects of the resistance to the emperor Napoleon. It could be said that he was the person to whom most credit is due for the layout, growth and architectural character of Ballinasloe as we see it today.

4 – At the end of Main Street, head along Bridge Street, then turn to the right to the pathway which runs to the riverscape where you can see channels flowing through the several arches of the long stone bridge over the river Suck, one of the town's most precious monuments. The Bridge has been in continuous use since the 16th century and its extension in 1754 prepared it structurally to carry even the heaviest juggernauts of today.

5 – Walk through to the far end of the park; you will approach St Michael's Church (1852-58) that stands in a commanding position over the Square. Its architect was J.J. McCarthy, a follower of Augustus Pugin (famed for other Neo-Gothic churches in Ireland) – and the design is said to have been revised by Pugin himself. Inside are many fine stained glass windows. Of particular quality are those of St. Patrick and St. Rose of Lima, of 1925, by the renowned Dublin Stained glass artist, Harry Clarke and The Raising of the daughter of Jairus by Patrick Pollen, inserted in 1958.

6 – From St. Michael's Church now walk up St. Michael's Square back towards the Man with the Horse Statue. Take a left into Dunlo Street, an important street in the history of the town, which contains, together with other buildings of about the same date, the late-Georgian Garda Station. The Station is towards the far end of the street, on the right hand side. Also on this street, over Dolan's Electrical Shop, you can see another fine example of Diocletian windows.

7 – Halfway up Dunlo Street, turn right up Duggan Street, which will take you to St. John's Church (Church of Ireland, 1843). It dominates the vast Fair Green which becomes a hive of activity during one week every year when up to 100,000 people throng to the October fair. Look out over the Fair Green and admire one of the grandest freestanding classical monuments in the region. Dedicated to Charles Le Poer Trench, it was designed in the Neo-Greek style by the English architect George Papworth (1781-1855). A mile past this monument on the Main Galway road, South West of the town, the Earl of Clancarty's former country house is situated, where imposing gates mark the entrance to Garbally Court. It has been a school since 1923.

Walk down Church Hill onto Society Street and turn left, arriving at the Courthouse on the right. Society Street, like Main Street, was the 19th century location for the professional classes. As well as The Courthouse, it contains the former Bridewell (or gaol) from the 1840s. Further along this street, Ballinasloe Railway Station is a must. Constructed in 1851, it is a Neo-Gothic limestone tour-de-force and a fine example of the quality of rural Irish railway architecture in the mid-19th century.



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
