
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

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NEWLY ELECTED MUNICIPAL COUNCILLORS 2019 - 2024



Timmy Broderick "I am proud, elated. It's my third time to be elected as a county councillor. I found it, by far, to be the toughest campaign" said Tim. He criticised the redrawing of the electoral area, saying "The electoral area is spanning from Banagher Bridge up to Ballymoe. There's no thought being put into that. I thought it would have been far more beneficial having five seats to the south of the electoral area. I thought it would've been more effective to take a seat out of the Ballinasloe electoral area. We're now looking like we may be in the situation where we have three councillors in the North representing six and a half thousand people, and three in the south, representing seventeen thousand – there's an imbalance there. This has been reflected nationally, with the absence of any real thought being put into any proper rural regeneration. I thought I would be in a battle for the fourth or fifth seat – I never in my wildest dreams thought I'd top the poll."

Regarding his future plans: Rural broadband, rural isolation, and the demise of Ballinasloe are firmly in his sights "we need to revitalise Ballinasloe. We need to have people sitting around a table, devising and having a look at how we can make Ballinasloe the great town it once was.

"Thanks to all those people that came out and supported me, and those who canvassed with me night after night".



Michael Connolly "I see a huge opportunity for Ballinasloe. I see we have medtech companies coming to this country, to places like Galway, which is very positive. With the Big Dig soon to be completed, I think we're going to be a very modern town that's open for business. The town is right in the middle of the country. It's connected by road, rail, and has broadband, modern storage facilities, and modern water facilities – there's a new state of the art building about to be built; the planning permission has been granted. I believe when those type of services are delivered, you provide a plan for clean room facilities that companies are looking for now. We can't be dwelling on the past. We need to start looking to the future. I'd love to see the 50 bed unit built in Portiuncula Hospital. All of these new, modern developments to the area would not just give the town, but the outer regions like Kiltormer and Clontuskert a boost.

The two biggest issues I faced on the doorsteps were poor broadband services and the dire state of the roads. Irrespective of where people live now, be it in an urban or a rural area, or they live on a country botharín, they're paying their taxes; fuel taxes and carbon motor taxes – they're all equally entitled to services, and I think service is going to have to be provided.

Biggest issue in terms of Co Galway – we get €2.8 million from the equalisation of the property tax. Mayo get €13 million, Tipperary get €19 million, and Donegal get €21 million. We're paying more in LPT than those areas, and we should be getting our fair return. More pressure is needed to be put on our Oireachtas members.

Very special thanks to my director of elections, my son Patrick, and my wife who keeps me on the straight and narrow. To all the people who voted for me – a very special thanks."



Dermot Connolly "People are finding it difficult as regards to services being delivered. With roads being very poor, there's a lot of issues in the rural part of the constituency. Broadband was a big issue that we found, and it needs to be delivered in areas where it currently can't be achieved. In other areas, agriculture was an issue – it's increasingly difficult to survive on small to medium holdings – there are uncertain days to come in the times ahead. We have a big need to provide the services that Galway County council can deliver, and to get our staff complement up to the proper level that's required."

When asked what his plans are for the next five years, Councillor Connolly said: "I hope to be able to engage with all the colleagues in Galway Council to try and force the funding issue to the fore. Whether that's for crossroads or housing, for example in Ballinasloe town we have the roads network being upgraded now. Rates is a big issue for us small to medium businesses, and to ensure that we don't impose any heavier sanctions on those, to try and increase a situation where businesses can thrive and town centres can develop. Roads network in rural areas is brought up to a proper standard. For transport, route 20 was recently downgraded, and that needs to be made a public service obligation. Flooding is another issue we heard about; communities like up in Clonfert are more or less being forgotten about, and we need to address their issues.

"It was a great relief to get across the line, in a hard fought campaign with a small team of dedicated people, no more so than Gerard O'Reilly who lead us from the front. People really put their shoulders to the wheel and engaged with us, and for that I'm thankful. My wife Kaitija who has kept the home fires burning with three small kids. There were 12 candidates who put their name forward for election, and I salute every one of them for doing so."

Talking Heads



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Peter Keavney Peter earns his living as a farmer and an Agricultural Contractor. Married to Mairead, they have a young family and a very busy household. He is the chairman of the Clane festival committee, President of the local drama group the Players, and also a member of Glenamaddy Musical Society as well as former chair of Glenamaddy Community Council and the IFA. Peter is interested in promoting the interests of the youth and of local families.

"Rural towns have taken a hit, particularly over the few years in the economic downturn. Rates that apply to business people in those towns have been a major financial burden. At Council level we must work hard at influencing National Policy on rates. Ability to pay and a more equitable rate must apply to reduce this burden from businesses. We need a policy whereby the turnover and size of the business be taken into consideration rather than the current blanket charge which is unfair and inequitable. It is my intention to further this policy by mobilizing support at National Level within the Fine Gael party to get the appropriate changes made at Government level."

I am delighted for my supporters, family and friends and look forward to working with all for the next 5 years."



Declan Geraghty "This means an awful lot to me. It's a fantastic achievement for all the people who were involved with me, the people who canvassed, the team, the community, and not only for me but for everybody in the area. To come from Williamstown, to get the chance to branch out, meet people and talk to them about their difficulties - I'm so excited and looking forward to it. I'd like to thank Marty Ward, outgoing councillor Des Joyce, Michael Fitzmaurice, as well as my wife, son and brother, my godmother Peggy, and everybody that helped out."

"I was met with a lot of issues on the doorsteps. Broadband is a massive one, especially in the rural areas. In some villages, we heard that reception is available on one side of a house and not on another. Portiuncula Hospital was another huge issue and Roscommon Hospital also, alongside the overcrowding in University Hospital Galway. I don't know if we can do anything to change that, but what we can do is try and influence how things get done."

"Road and landscape maintenance were another problem that people brought up on the doorsteps. Byroads not being tarred, potholes, hedges and trees needing clipping - the usual stuff that goes on with the County Council. There's an awful lot of work to be done, and hopefully by me getting elected, I may be able to bring a different change of view as to the way we can go about things. Hopefully, if we can all have the same vision then we can all do the best for our communities - I think that's what it's all about. Another thing that's out there is the community manifesto - it's a thing that's not talked about. It's where the community comes together, with little workshops around in different areas, based upon things the area requires. People need to come together and say "Look, this is what our community would like to learn about."



Aisling Dolan "This is for everyone in East Galway, in Ballinasloe and Pollboy. It's been a team effort. We've had thirty people or more working on our team, but it's been everyone. We knocked on everyone's door. I think that people who listened to us realised that what we were saying is what they wanted as well. In other words - how to bring jobs to the area we live in, how to save Portiuncula Hospital, how to make it a place to live, a place to work, a place to visit - this is what people want. It's a love for what we have in the area, and I think that's what made people join our team. How do we attract tourism, how do we tap into hidden heartlands. We have heritage, we have landscape, we have peatlands. We are going to have a greenway coming into Ballinasloe. We are going to have an option to attract people in and show them what a unique community we have. Community spirit, and just a great sense of people volunteering."

People want to keep their towns and villages alive, and they want to have the jobs and the income to do it - it's about things like flexible working, broadband, being able to work from home, being able to support farm incomes, as well as other ways to approach ecotourism, and how to help catering and accommodation in the area.

My major priority is the 50 bed unit in PUH. It's been promised and it hasn't arrived yet. We have to protect that, and how we fight for that is huge. It would mean myself and our other councillors working with our national TDs to ensure we can get this across the line. I want a greenway in the town and that's going to come. I suppose tapping into hidden heartlands, would involve working with all the businesses in Ballinasloe, with other heritage groups to showcase what a wonderful space we have. With that, building a business association in the town would be one of the key things I would like to see happen."

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WESTERN DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION PLAN LAUNCHED

The Western Development Commission held an official launch in the office spaces above the Library on Society Street recently.

The 2019 – 2024 strategy, titled “Work Smarter, Liver Better” is focused around growing and developing the Western regions of Ireland by investing in tech, connecting digital working hubs, and promoting the area’s unmatched quality of life.

The strategy has three pillars: Regional Promotion, Regional Leadership and Sustainable Enterprise, with short-term, medium and long-term goals respectively.

Regional Promotion will focus on the further development of the WDC’s jobs and lifestyle portal, called lookwest.ie, and engaging with communities in Clare, Galway, Mayo, Roscommon, Sligo, Leitrim and Donegal.

Regional Leadership will see the continuation of WDC policy analysis, as well as supporting the WDC’s role as co-ordinating agency for the Atlantic Economic Corridor (AEC) project, as set out in Project Ireland 2040. The AEC covers the spine of Ireland’s western coast, and includes all the counties from Donegal to Kerry. BACD Manger Lynn Donnelly and Director Billy King are Ballinasloe’s representatives to this working group.

The launch was attended by various members of Galway County Council, local politicians, members of the Western Development Commission, as well as members from the Ballinasloe Area Community Development clg.

The plan seeks to maximise Ballinasloe Town as the County Town – as one of a key number of strategic investment locations.

Under the strategy, almost €50 million in structured supports will be offered in investment and lending to companies and businesses, with a focus on innovative or tech businesses that are developing or have the potential to develop a global niche. Alongside this, Minister of State for Community Development, Natural Resources and Digital Development, Sean Canney TD, also announced that €1m in Dormant Accounts Funding will be made available to create a network of Enterprise Hubs and Digital Spaces from Co Donegal to Co Kerry. The centres, powered by fibre broadband, will support the growing trend towards remote working, community hubs, and offer a lifeline for early stage rural-based companies and entrepreneurs, such as the likes of the Pulse Club and Grow Remote here in the locality.

Senator Maura Hopkins, attending said “It is very positive to see the first client company operating from this space in recent weeks. This is a very good example of what can be achieved in our enterprise hubs. We need to see further hot desk facilities developed and this WDC strategy seeks to support such development.”

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NEW CHAPTER FOR REMOTE LOCAL WORKERS LAUNCHED

Renate Kohlmann, Chapter Lead of Grow Remote Ballinasloe.

In Ireland, remote working is growing in popularity but from a relatively small base. Grow Remote organisers estimate that there are around 220,000 people working remotely in Ireland currently.

Some of the international companies with operations here have already started implementing these policies. Shopify now has employees working in all 26 counties and has grown rapidly by outpacing the targets it set for the Irish operation. The Canadian e-commerce company started with basic frontline business and customer support positions but has since expanded its workforce by adding many more roles.

Wayfair announced it was launching a "virtual workforce" of more than 200 new jobs around Ireland, aiming to tap into an even broader talent pool and provide employment opportunities to a wide range of qualified candidates.

The ESRI has noted that job stress owing to commuting times and other factors has doubled from 2010 to 2015 – all leading to workforce seeking changes to work remotely from home and leave the gridlock of commute behind them. It's estimated that 50% of the workforce will be remote by 2040.

Grow Remote opened its 60th Chapter in town recently when Renate Kohlmann launched the branch at the Library. Over 30 people ,presenters, trainers, funders and potential workers interested in learning more about the sector and the concept were delivered a full Information and Induction evening into a new "Cottage" style industry of the 21st Century.

Grow Remote was founded on Whatsapp by a couple of Irish Remote Workers in Autumn of 2019 and has now grown in 18 months to over 60 groups in 4 countries. The Volunteer led and owned network is to 1) help Community find employment 2) Help Repopulate their local area 3) Help remote workers engage locally.

The evening had passionate presentations from a cofounder Tracey Keogh of Kinvara, and Gary Mullin who is a team leader with Shopify working remotely out of Athenry. Tracey reflected on the trajectory of the REMOTE network and the power it is having in remote rural places like Achill, Valentia, Ballymahon and Cootehill in getting young couples from the Irish and UK Cities to return or resettle to locations they are happier having a healthier work life balance in.

She reported that everyone in Government circles was very positive about the impact these jobs could have in rejuvenating rural Ireland – alongside (of course) access to broadband. She spoke of Seminars, Conferences and Town or Area Visits that different Chapters were promoting around the country to get people to lessen the isolation of working remotely. She wished Renate and the Chapter well in getting established in Ballinasloe.

Gary told it as it was and surprised many with the range of companies looking for entry level and specialist remote worker. The jobs package and specs on offer were from anywhere between a median salary of €29,000 for a 35 hour week, training,

Summer Tanning Tips

Andrea & Breda from the Front Room

- Gently exfoliate well a few days before application.
- Our best buy exfoliator for the body is BELLAMIANTA GLYCOLIC SCRUB.
- Do not have any perfumes, oils, moisturisers on the skin before applying tan.
- Put a very light coat of moisturiser on your ankles, knees and elbows before application.
- Be extra cautious if you have recently tinted your brows and apply vaseline over the brow before tanning....tint + tan = green or orange! Not a good look!
- If tanning at home our secret weapon of choice for hands, feet and face is a foundation brush. A Blank Canvas F20 is my fav....I mix a small bit of my tan with some moisturiser and brush it on gently. Hands, feet and face should always be slightly lighter than the rest of the body.
- If your tan has been open a while and looks like its changing colour do not use it...it has oxidized!
- If having a spray tan make sure to come to your appointment with some loose, dark, oversized clothing that you can pop on afterwards. Avoid flip flops as they sometimes leave a mark on the tan so we prefer a fluffy, loose sock and a loose trainer or slippers.



- As soon as your tan is applied wipe the palms of your hands and your nail plates with a wet wipe.
- Stay well covered for the following 6 to 12 hours (depending on what brand of tan you are applying) and DO NOT get wet.
- You can even out your tan after showering off the excess by applying moisturiser. An Oil - Free Moisturiser will help maintain your tan for longer and help it wear off evenly.
- For tan removal we love Cocoa Brown Tough Stuff and Bellamianta Glycolic Scrub in the shower. After your shower apply an oil based body product all over the body..we love Waxperts Body Oil for this or Baby Oil works well too! Leave it on the skin for 10 or 15 minutes and get a damp towel and rub over in circular motions. Jump back in the shower to wash off the excess...works a treat on those stubborn areas! We suggest you nominate an old towel as your Tanning Towel for this as it does leave the towel stained!!!

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LOCAL CYCLIST IN MALIN TO MIZEN - CYSTIC FIBROSIS CYCLE

The 5th annual Cystic Fibrosis Cycle from Malin Head in Donegal to Mizen head in Cork was undertaken by 40 amateur volunteer cyclists recently, with local amateur cyclist Brian King undertaking the challenge for the first time this year. Brian was seen around the local highways and byways in the past few months training for the event.

The cycle which is 620 km long, is a real test of stamina for volunteer cyclists and it is broken down into 4 manageable sections with lengths varying from 147km to 168km daily. The group of 40 amateur riders also require outriders on motorcycles and a support staff to transport the cyclists "gear" from place to place over the 4 days in late May.

In this respect Cystic Fibrosis Ireland was hugely appreciative of the assistance of Fred Kilmartin, Ford Dealers who sponsored a new Ford Transit van for the duration of the cycle.

Cystic Fibrosis (CF) is an inherited disease that primarily affects the lungs and the digestive system. It affects 1300 individuals in Ireland. Funds raised by the cyclists (circa €100,000) will be used by CF Ireland to support families during periods of illness and/or hospitalisation, as well as research and equipment.

allowances and up to 25 day holiday allowance with flexible working hours and fixed levels of client or customer interaction - upwards.

There were then some perspectives on leading innovative educators who recognise that not everyone can come to this work zone without some training. There were insightful presentations from Nuala McGinn NUIG, Patricia Farrell from the GRETB who spoke about the range of courses, CPD opportunities and certification processes that they are developing to cope with demand for these type of new posts.

Renate, in wrapping up the evening, spoke about how a dedicated Remote working Hub in the locality would be a huge asset in raising awareness and getting more people to join the Remote Chapter and seek out new opportunities.

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GALWAY RURAL DEVELOPMENT



The Galway Rural Development Office in Ballinasloe offers a range of services to the local community, including employment and enterprise support and assistance, community development and TÚS, a community work placement scheme.



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


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CELEBRATES 70 YEARS OF PRINTING

Kelly's Printing Works or KPW as it is now known, was founded by the late Sylvester Kelly in St Michael's Square in 1949. Starting in a 200 sq. ft. workshop, the business purchased the old "East Galway Democrat" premises in Society Street in 1950 and in 1983 they moved to Poolboy Industrial Estate where they now operate from a 30,000 sq. ft. unit, catering for all types of printing for the home and international markets. Now trading under the name KPW Print Management with Brendan and Michael Kelly as directors, the company now employs over 30 people and it proudly boasts the third generation of the Kelly family employed in the business.

Celebrating its 70th Birthday this year is truly a momentous milestone in the history of Ballinasloe after a 33-year-old man had the foresight to establish a "New-look Printing" outlet. Unfortunately Sylvester passed away inside six months of its

opening but his brother Michael took over the reins when he purchased "The Democrat" in 1950. He was joined by his sons, Ken in 1955, Michael S. in 1969 and Brendan in 1980 before modern technology forced the family to seek more space. They became the first occupants on the new Poolboy Industrial Estate, when in November 1983, they moved into a 5,000 sq. ft. specially designed plant.

Soon the company was employing for the first time and as the business grew they were forced to add new equipment and enlarge their factory space to a massive 30,000 sq.ft. over a few years. They became the first printers in the West of Ireland to introduce computer continuous printing, with the installation of

a £1.2million machine, which attracted customers from every county in Ireland as well as overseas. KPW was even contracted to print Electricity Bills for the Ugandan Government as well as customers in South Africa and Australia.

Now employing over thirty workers, the company have six graphic designers to meet the needs of its medical and corporate customers nationwide. "Customer relationships are paramount here in KPW" said MD, Brendan Kelly. "We have a great team here who can cater for all types of designs, printing and delivery. Our 24-hour express colour printing service is in big demand while our range of Memoriam, Wedding and Baby Cards is comprehensive" he explained.

Brendan further added "Printing has changed a lot over the past seventy years and we have moved with it. We have now one of the most modern plants in Ireland, producing everything from a raffle ticket to programmes, hard-bound books, cheques, continuous stationery, all-weather outdoor signs, roll-up display signs etc. The recent elections saw up print for candidates in ten constituencies which was an indication of our quality service."

KPW have kept abreast with many changes in its industry – an industry that has claimed the demise of so many print companies over the past 12 years. KPW has invested wisely and conservatively over the same period and has made crucial decisions to partner with like-minded companies where they share expertise and particular types of work that is to each other's satisfaction. While KPW now boasts a major producer in the production of Pharmaceutical and medical life instruction leaflets to many of Ireland's leading companies, it still relies on commercial print work and continues to design, print and stock hold products for Ireland's biggest hotel chains, supplying not only their Irish sites but also their UK outlets. To meet the needs of their loyal customers, five years ago KPW made a significant investment in the production of sign making equipment. In particular for the past month they have been very busy producing Election signage for all the parties in the Local and European elections.

Once he left school, Raj got involved in the automotive industry and after spending over 15 years working in both the British and Irish market, he now specialises in Electric vehicles.



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ST. TERESA'S SCHOOL CRISIS NEARING END

As we go to print there is a little more positivity from St. Teresa's Special School about the future. As readers will know the school is awaiting the acquisition of a site for its new facility in the town.

The Minister has said that his Officials are negotiating the purchase and the County Manager has said the matter rests with the Department. We hope to be able to report, in future issues on the progress of this development. After two years of an inexplicable wait, it appears that the 25 jobs directly associated with the school will be maintained in Ballinasloe. More importantly, it means that those children in our communities that are most disadvantaged will be able to avail of their educational rights in a modern, secure and well managed school. The realisation of the school will be a credit to all involved.

However, it emerged in early April that the school was facing an increase in its annual insurance premium from €3,000 in 2017, to €26,000 in 2019, an increase of over 700%.

St. Teresa's receives Capitation funding from the Department of Education to run its daily activities and all the maintenance of the school, but it still finds itself reliant on the generosity of local funding and initiatives. The capitation grant would not cover even half the cost of the insurance alone. The school's fundraising events throughout the year are used to enhance the children's education. However, all that money would have to go towards paying for insurance, if this

situation cannot be resolved.

A recent meeting with the department, to discuss the crisis and the implications if the school were to close was both positive and productive. The school has sought an interim solution to their insurance crisis with a permanent resolution to be in place before next year and a route to be clearly mapped out for the new purpose-built school.

The centre caters for those with severe and profound special needs. The school's pupils typically are on the autism spectrum with multiple complex special needs. Its pupils come mainly from Ballinasloe, Loughrea, Ballygar, Portumna and the surrounding areas also.

As a full national School, there are four teachers as well as 11 special needs assistants with nursing staff, care assistants and bus escorts. There are multi-disciplinary services provided to the school by Ability West and various other early intervention teams.

"We are overwhelmed by the good will and support from the community and every Councillor, TD, Senator, MEP and candidate from all shades of political opinion who rallied to our help in recent weeks" stated Principal Anita O'Reilly.

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Ballinasloe Cycling Club held their hugely successful annual Charity cycle recently in aid of the Special Care Baby Unit in Portiuncula Hospital.

"2019's 'Tour d'Shams' saw that over 165 cyclists were treated with fantastic weather on the day and there were two separate races to cater for all abilities of cyclists. Setting off from the Ballinasloe Enterprise Centre, on the Creagh Road, beginners and slower cyclists were brought on a 50km round cycle, and more seasoned cyclists and sprinters tested their mettle against the longer 105km track.

Chairman of the cycling club Noel Slevin, mentioned how important the local community's efforts and help were in ensuring the event was successful. He said: 'From the cyclists to the sandwich makers, as well as all the marshal, it's these people that help shape events like this. It's great to see those newer members, who only started cycling with us recently through our new 'Couch to 50k' programme, undertaking their first ever 50km in the Tour D'Shams. It's a great achievement, whether it's your first tour, or your fifth.' A sum in the order of over €3,500 has been raised so far, with some donations still yet to arrive.

The club are still undertaking cycles every week. They meet on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings at 6.30pm, and also on Saturday and Sunday mornings outside Barry's Cycles, on Society Street.

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DEVELOPMENT COMPANY REVIEWS 20th YEAR

The Board of Voluntary Directors, led by Chairman Seamus Duffy and Manager Lyn Donnelly and over 45 members of the company, reviewed progress on their 20th year of activities, in Gullane's Hotel and Conference Centre recently.

Apologies were received from Kevin Kelly Interim CEO Galway County Council, Alan Farrell, Director of Community & Enterprise, Denis Naughten T.D. Present (on the last night of their own busy respective canvasses) were Councillors Aidan Donohue, Michael Connolly, Michael Finnerty; Candidates Harriet Bruce, Aisling Dolan and Senator Maura Hopkins. Eimear Dolan of the Economic Development Department of Galway County Council also attended.

Opening the meeting, the Chair celebrated the 20th Anniversary of the formation of BACD and again he congratulated the vision of its founders some of whom were present at the meeting.

"Its' Mission from day one was job creation and we have achieved success but let's go back 20 years and imagine a group of people going to a financial institution looking for a €500k loan to buy a practically derelict building with over 250 broken windows and no sign of a tenant, but the money was sanctioned and well done to Ballinasloe Credit Union for their Social Fund and their leadership at the time. Fast forward now and we have the loan cleared, a modern building with over 170 people working in it and a Company that has seen over 350 sustainable jobs created over the years and still in the Community" stated Seamus.

Highlights of the last year were taking on a management agreement with the Council for the Hub space upstairs in the Library - within the next few weeks this space will be fully utilised. A new expanding company has set up on the first floor and we are at an advanced stage in securing a quality tenant for the upper floor.

The Pulse Club has evolved under the guidance of Director Brian King; essentially it is the bringing together of individuals who are self-employed and networking and upskilling internally. 10 of these people did a start your own business course with the Local Enterprise Office.

Ballinasloe GROW REMOTE club was launched by Renate Kohlmann, which effectively is facilitating P60 employees to

work remotely and again this is a project well suited to our town as more and more companies facilitate remote working.

The main priority continues to be to build an Advanced Technology Unit on the IDA site and while it was a set-back in not securing funding on the last round of Rural Regeneration Funding, they are more determined than ever to secure capital grant of €2m.



Thanks to Denis Naughten TD, who co-hosted a symposium on St Brigid's Hospital last Summer and hopefully the outcomes of same will be valuable into the future. "As it stands our hands are totally tied in regarding to moving forward as we cannot be putting money into a project where the HSE will not work with us on the site. This requires Ministerial intervention" stated Seamus.

He paid tribute the people on the Town Team, under the stewardship of Jacinta Divilly, who have ongoing projects like the Leaflets, the Business networking, the Window Competitions, the Zombie Walk, The People of the Year Awards and of course the Christmas Lights and Festival. As a team most of the short term goals have been achieved but are struggling with our longer term ambitions which will get renewed focus in the next few weeks.

He also thanked the various funding agencies, like GRD, Galway County Council, Lyn, Manager and Paula her Admin Assistant, Town Team members and of course the voluntary directors.

The Manager, Lyn Donnelly, gave a detailed overview of the stats behind the LIFE Magazine, the rebranded and new look town website Ballinasloe.ie.- led by Sinead Colleran, the Investment Brochure, the various conferences and networks that the Company and its team continually push for investment and focus on the town.

She noted that there are some 25 organisations using some 90% of space employing some 170 people locally in the Enterprise Centre.

She mentioned that the Heritage and Tourism Working Group had been joined by the newly created Ballinasloe Walks and Trails Groups which along with the Tidy Towns would provide a serious amount of activity and focus in positioning the town as a key Hidden Heartlands Town.

Auditor James Coyle of Coyle and Co., gave a detailed audit presentation of the financial results showing certified

income at €320,544 and Expenditure at €260,317.

The Auditor reported that the building and the company were now debt free and in a very healthy position to invest again in a capital project. The Audit was moved for adoption by Pearse Keller and seconded by Sean Tully.

Coyle and Co. were re-appointed Auditors. There was one vacancy for Director with the stepping down of Ann Conlon and the meeting approved of Catherine O'Connor being nominated to succeed her. Catherine was President of the Chamber, one of the founding Directors at the startup period and has her own Audit and Accountancy practice in Dunlo Hill. The Directors for the next 12 months are:

Guest Speaker for the evening was former CEO of the Western Development Commission and Director of Knock Airport Liam

Scollan, who gave a passionate and animated insight into 3 decades of working in the non profit sector in the UK and West of Ireland .

He had some observations on the proceedings and outcomes he had been briefed on "I can safely say that in attending some 40 odd AGMs of community development groups countrywide I have never heard or seen a better summary or as comprehensive of positive activity. Social Enterprise like you are practicing here is the future for Rural Ireland. I have witnessed the future of our island here tonight – total transparency, action, achievement, promises made and delivered, strong management, accountability and civic minded leadership from within the community."


He went on to explain how in his analysis "throughout Europe and the world Big Government and Big State or Regional led solutions are failing us all, the answer no longer lies in the big but in the sanity of small groups with an ethos of community."

He detailed some of his travails in both the Airport and the Development Commission over securing funding and dealing with various state bureaucracies concluding that if a community "can find and harness the right people first, the right projects will eventually follow and he was confident this will happen for Ballinasloe."

A general Questions and Answers session followed about funding of local Government, volunteerism, state regulations and finding new investors for the town.

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SO YOU THINK YOU CAN RECYCLE?

On the same day Ireland made history by being the second country in the world to declare a Climate Emergency, the Minister for Communications, Climate Action and the Environment, Richard Bruton visited St. Augustine's National School, Clontuskert outside Ballinasloe.

This small rural school has spent the past two years researching Ireland's Waste Management Systems and has discovered a major issue with packaging and waste separation. They wanted to alert the Minister to this problem personally and appeal to him to action change. Minister Ciaran Cannon set up the meeting, following the ESB Science Blast event at the RDS, where the students had explained the issues and their solutions, and asked him to work with the government on their behalf.

The problem arises with the Green Dot symbol. In Ireland this European award is given by Repak. It is NOT a recycling symbol. It means that the company who made the product contributed financially towards a recycling fund in Europe and does not necessarily mean that the packaging can be recycled. These funds are used for worthy projects across Ireland; however, problems arise with the system as the Clontuskert students discovered.

In a survey of adults, designed by the students of St. Augustine's, they found that 84% thought the Green Dot was the Recycling symbol. Furthermore, following an invite to Dunne's SuperValu in Ballinasloe students were shocked to find that over 17% of packaging only had the Green Dot on it and could not be recycled. The findings in other supermarkets and shops are similar to this. Because the Green Dot is perceived to be the Recycling Symbol this waste goes into the recycling stream and contaminates the rest of the recycling in the bag. In some waste management companies once a bag is contaminated, it all goes into Landfill.

The students found that while 25% of products had both the Green Dot and recycling symbol, 10.5 % had no symbols at all and 60% of products with more than more two layers, were not labelled correctly! In Ireland there is no system wide synchronisation of waste symbols on packaging which leads to confusion when householders are separating their waste. This is not only an issue in Ireland but in Europe also, compounded by the fact that 84% think the Green Dot is the recycling symbol.

At Galway Science and Technology Festival in November, led by teacher Kathy Colahan, students showcased their work and sought to educate people about their recycling and waste separation. The Project won the Overall Schools' stand Award for their work. Dr. Anne Dolan of Mary Immaculate College and Nóirín Burke of Galway Atlanticaquaria, connected with the class and developed their understand of the effects

of climate change.

Clontuskert students have linked with other schools across the world to empower them to create change. They are currently members of the #NoMorePlastic project involving 416 schools across 68 countries. Here they explore, brainstorm, discuss, create, connect, reflect and share their findings via weekly videos on <http://www.no.moreplastic.info/> Collaboration with their global peers leads to a deeper understanding about global problems with plastic, microplastics and the plastic soup in our oceans.

The students received a letter from President Michael D. Higgins who encouraged them in their work. He wrote; "As President of Ireland, I am very proud of the many young citizens in this country who are constantly willing to rethink, reimagine and re-consider the way we live in order to that real difference can be achieved. The pupils of St. Augustine's are such young citizens and I would like to thank you for your commitment to working together, to explore the many ways in which we can address the critical challenge of climate change."

The students created a website called www.soyouthinkyoucanrecycle.com with a short animation to explain the problems with waste symbols in Ireland and especially with the Green Dot.

They are now working with parent and graphic designer, Caitríona Murphy to design an app that will scan packaging and inform the householder of what can and cannot be recycled. This app will be linked to each householder's own waste management company, as what can be recycled varies in different companies. Campbell Finnie of Barna Waste came to the school to help the children with their project and gave tips and ideas for the app.

Principal teacher, Kate Murray said, "The students want their work to have an impact on the way packaging symbols work in Ireland, to make it clearer for people and to raise awareness of the issues. Now, they hope, following Minister Bruton's visit and enthusiasm for the project that a coordinated approach will ensure positive change for the future."

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POWER OF HOPE IGNITED BY DARKNESS INTO LIGHT DAWN EVENT

Darkness into Light Ballinasloe hosted its fifth successful flagship fundraiser for Pieta House recently, when at 4:15 am over 650 people from the area and its hinterland joined over 200,000 people nationwide on the unique 5km walk from Darkness into Light.

Each participant proudly wore the iconic DIL T-shirt, creating a sea of yellow as the waves of people wove their way from the Emerald Ballroom up through the lit streets of Brackernagh and Mackney, walking, talking, listening and engaging. They then entered the darkened reflective kilometre along the avenue to Ard Scoile Mhuire, remembering loved ones lost to suicide, before entering the wondrous section of the walk through Garbally College, flanked by candle-lit lanterns, accompanied by atmospheric live music, played by Paul Drysdale and Katia Connolly.

As morning began to dawn they walked the impressive tree-lined avenue lit with yellow night lights, experiencing the dawn chorus of the birds twittering in the canopy of trees, before emerging at the important point of HOPE, a large brightly lit sign on the crest of the avenue, reinforcing the power of Hope in everyone's journey. Turning once more onto Brackernagh they returned to the Emerald Ballroom for refreshments, feeling elated, energised, empowered, emotional, exhausted. and slightly overwhelmed.

In the last five years Darkness into Light Ballinasloe will have

contributed a combined total of over €100,000 to the coffers of Pieta House, allowing them to assist those in a mental health crisis and to help the bereaved families and friends of those that have died by suicide. Brian Derrane, Chair, was delighted with the turn out again this year. "The local people have been very loyal to this special event.

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VOLUNTARY TRANSFERS - GIFTS OF PROPERTY

A voluntary transfer is a transfer of lands or property to another as a gift or for a reduced amount. They are commonly used by parents to transfer a site or a farm to a child.

The first step is to consult your solicitor so your title deeds can be reviewed and any prior consents (e.g. from a charge holder) can be

arranged. They will advise you on your options, how to protect your interests and they will prepare the documentation.

You must be solvent at the time of the transfer. You cannot use it to avoid your creditors' claims. To do so will undo the transaction.

You will need a map of the property and an open market valuation of the property (to be dated within 6 months of the transfer).

Stamp duty, capital gains tax (CGT) and capital acquisitions tax (CAT) can or may apply to a voluntary transfer.

Stamp duty is calculated at the open market value of the property at the date of the transfer. It is payable by the beneficiary of the gift. The present rate of stamp duty is 1% for residential property and 6% for commercial property (i.e. agricultural land). There are reliefs and exemptions available, namely young trained farmer

relief, consanguinity relief and farm consolidation relief. These exemptions and reliefs are limited. Clawback of the relief can occur if the beneficiary fails to satisfy the requirements of the relief.

Capital Gains Tax at a rate of 33% may be charged on a gain made by the transferor. There are certain reliefs available namely farm re-structuring relief, retirement relief and relief on transfers of sites from parents to children. Each relief has its own qualifying criteria and clawback of the relief can apply.

Capital Acquisitions Tax at a rate of 33% may be payable on the total of all gifts and inheritances a person receives during their lifetime. It depends on the open market value of the property at the date of the gift (i.e. the valuation date) and the relationship between the parties. There are tax free thresholds for various degrees of relationship. Once the open market value of the property exceeds the relevant threshold, CAT will apply on the excess amounts. All gifts or inheritances received are aggregable since 5 December 1991.

There are reliefs from CAT which can be used in addition to an individual's tax free threshold. The most common reliefs are agricultural and business relief. Both reduce the taxable value of the qualifying assets by 90%. Other reliefs include favourite nephew relief and dwellinghouse relief. All reliefs are subject to clawbacks if the beneficiary fails to meet the qualifying criteria.

All tax rates, reliefs and clawbacks are subject to change and it is advisable to pay close attention to any announcements made to these taxes in the annual budget.

Mark Breen from Kilgarve, Ballinasloe, a former lifeguard at the Ballinasloe Swimming Pool, is now a Director of Cuckoo Events which is responsible for keeping people safe at large social events. Together with his business partner, Martin Cullen, they specialise in crowd and event safety all over Ireland and abroad.

Mark Breen grew up in Kilgarve Park in Creagh, attending Creagh NS and Garbally College, before heading to the University of Limerick in 1999 - like so many others from Ballinasloe.

Having worked as a lifeguard in the pool in Ballinasloe, Mark did similar work in UL and also became involved in training lifeguards over the years there too through Irish Water Safety.

Nowadays, Mark is Director of Cuckoo Events and Safe Events and he continues to work hard to provide a safe environment for people, but now he does so at a wide variety of events, domestically and internationally.

With Safe Events responsible for the planning and management of events including Fleadh Cheoil na hEireann this year and last in Drogheda, Wild Lights at Dublin Zoo since its inception, Dublin Pride since 2015, Arts Festivals in Saudi Arabia and many more, Mark and his full-time Team of five people are kept busy in their office in Dublin city centre.

"In 2018 we ran a new festival in Galway City Airport on behalf of some clients, who run licensed premises in Ballinasloe and Loughrea. This was our first time running an event in Galway and we're glad we waited for that one. We also quoted to work on the Ballinasloe October Fair & Festival in 2018, but it seems we were a little too expensive" said Mark.

Mark and his business partner, Martin Cullen, set up Cuckoo Events

(Safe Events is a relatively new brand within the company) back in 2012, while Mark was in London working at the London Olympics in a Safety Management capacity.

He was recently named one of Health & Safety at Work's '40 Under 40', being recognised as an outstanding achiever and among the best and brightest of the younger generation in health and safety management globally.

He was also recently upgraded to a Specialist Fellow of the International Institute of Risk & Safety Management, on foot of his commitment to his craft and efforts to develop the industry he loves so much.

"Worldwide Crowd and Event Safety industry is a relatively young one. From our work internationally as well as our digital and social media activity, we've developed a very strong global network of like-minded professionals. We're keen to do what we can to help the industry develop and to help people running events of all sizes to run them more safely. Free resources, industry seminars, Practical Skills Workshops for students and more are all elements of our efforts in that regard" he stressed.

Mark and his Team generally occupy the Event Controller and Safety Officer roles on the events they plan and manage. Those are the roles with the ultimate responsibility for the safe delivery of the event. You may not even see them on an event they're running, as they'll likely be in the Event Control unit, coordinating everything.

The future looks bright for Mark and his Team, with 2019 looking like another crazy busy one. The Team in Safe Events are having to turn down work at certain times of the year. There are only so many large events they can work on and deliver to their exacting standards.

It's a good problem to have, according to Mark.



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
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Ballinasloe-born Fr. James (Jimmy) Keane, who ministered in the Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle for over fifty-four years, passed away after a short illness in Freeman Road Hospital, Newcastle. His late brother, Fr. Michael, who died in 1972, also ministered in the same diocese.

Following his early education in St. Grellan's Boys' National School, where he was a brilliant scholar, and later Garbally College, Fr. Jimmy studied for the priesthood in St. Patrick's College in Carlow. He was ordained on 6th June 1964 and two months later was appointed Curate of Our Lady and St. Edmund's Church in Backworth, in Newcastle. He later spent eleven years in St. Bede's in Jarrow and five years in St. Patrick's in Felling.

In November 1981 Fr. Keane was made Parish Priest of St. Joseph's in Highfield before being moved to St. George's in Bell's Close in October 1993, where he ministered up to his death.

A cousin of Galway's 1956 All-Ireland corner back, Sean Keeley, Fr.



Jimmy practiced football growing up in Cleaghmore, demanding to be the goalkeeper in the wide turf-shed. He played in the Town league with Derrymullen, both in goal and centre-field and had the honour of playing on the Ballinasloe senior team on a number of occasions. He always valued the two East Board medals that he won with the senior black and amber side.

Fr. Keane's remains were received into St. George's, Bell Close where a special Requiem Mass was celebrated by Bishop Robert Byrne before his body was taken back to Ballinasloe. Following his repose Fr. John Naughton was the principal celebrant of Fr. Keane's funeral mass in St. Michael's, which was attended by the Bishop of Clonfert John Kirby and nine priests. Afterwards Fr. Jimmy's remains were buried in Creagh cemetery alongside his parents, brother Fr. Michael and his sister Maureen.

The late Fr. Keane, who was in his 79th year, is survived by his sister Kathleen Glynn, Fohenagh; brother-in-law Frank, nephews, nieces-in-law, cousin Sean Keeley as well as many other relatives and friends.

Help for consumers: For information on EU consumer rights, air travel, car rental etc, and for advice and assistance with cross border complaints contact your local European Consumer Centre. Call on (01) 8797620 or email info@ecceireland.ie.

Roaming: The EU "roam like at home" rules mean that when travelling in any EU country don't have to pay any additional roaming charges for mobile phone use.

Car hire: Ensure you know how much you will be liable for in the event of accident. Inspect the vehicle carefully with a rental company employee present during the pick-up and return stages. Before leaving, request a written statement that the car was returned in good working order.

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LOCAL R.A.F. GUNNER'S FAMILY ATTEND GRATEFUL VILLAGE COMMEMORATION

Joseph R. (Ronnie) Dowling, a cousin of the Jordan and Beirne families of Dunlo House and Creagh, grew up in the town in the early decades of the last century. Along with his father and uncle he was a keen sportsman and spent many hours fishing and shooting in the countryside around town. These skills were to prove useful in his later career.

In common with many others in Ireland during the economically depressed 1930's, Ronnie emigrated to England. He had developed an interest in the then still novel concept of powered flight pioneered by the Wright brothers only 30 years earlier. Accordingly, he applied and was accepted into the RAF which he joined around 1935, several years before the outbreak of World War II. He rose to the rank of Flight Sergeant and after the outbreak of the war, was assigned to Bomber Command. Due to his proficiency as a marksman during his hunting days in his youth, he was assigned as a turret machine gunner, in a Wellington bomber which had a total crew of six.

On 5th April 1944, just a year before the war's end, Ronnie was on board a New Zealand Air Force Wellington bomber on a training flight over Northamptonshire in Southern England. During the flight the aircraft developed mechanical problems and the crew struggled to maintain control. They rapidly lost altitude and the pilot identified a field, large enough to attempt an emergency landing, just outside the village of Rothersthorpe. The pilot brought the plane around to line up for a landing, all the while losing altitude, when a major fire broke out in the left wing engine. Efforts to quench it failed, as the pilot saw that they were headed straight for the village school, with children jumping up and down waving at the plane.

Veering sharply away, the left wing sheared off and landed on the road just yards away from the school playground. With a wing lost, the plane immediately went into a spin and crashed in a huge fireball in a field about 100 yards away from the village. There were no survivors, as all the crew were instantly killed. To this day there is a noticeable depression in the field where it came down.

The village council organised a church service recently to remember the 75th anniversary of the tragedy and to honour the memory of the young men who gave their lives so that the schoolchildren would survive. George Dickens, on whose father's land the plane crashed some years ago, recovered a largely intact propeller from the plane, and a memorial plaque was created around it. Some pieces of equipment were salvaged, and George gave Ray Jordan a parachute buckle as a memento.

The local Rector conducted a service with Ray, Joe and Kenneth Jordan coming from Ireland, and another cousin Louise James, travelling over from Monmouth in Wales.

The club won the Heidenfeld Trophy and will now play in the FIDE rated (World rated) Division 1 series for the first time ever next season. The team comprised of John Dunne (captain), Paddy Divilly, Tommy Dunne Jr., Kenneth Higgins, David McCann, George O'Brien, Josef Vezely, Rory Quinn, Denis Rucho, Keegan O'Mahoney and Conor Barrett.

The club ended their 18th season on May 15th with the conclusion of the Junior Club Championships - David Cunningham emerged as A champion, Leah Cunningham as B, Hayden Naughton as B1 champion, Jack Finn as C and Tommy Hughes as C1 champion.

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In 1894 a group of local aspiring golfers approached the 5th Earl of Cloncarty, Viscount Dunlo with a view to setting up a golf club. Ballinasloe at the time had a population of over 7,000 a drop from 10,000 during the famine years. The Earl looked very favourably on their request and granted them lands rent free at Garbally Demesne. On the 10th of November 1894 a meeting was held to form a Golf Club in Ballinasloe. Fourteen members were elected to form the first committee (3 ladies & 11 men) and their names are on display on a plaque in the clubhouse.

On the 9th of November 1923 a general meeting of the club was held in Hayden's Hotel Ballinasloe to discuss the future of the club. After playing golf on lands rent free at Garbally for almost 30 years, Garbally Court & Demesne was sold to the Diocese of Clonfert. At the meeting Mr. William Hession, Club President offered the use of his lands for a golf course at Rosgloss. The meeting was adjourned until the 4th January 1924 to see what support would be forthcoming for the project. Support for the move was most satisfactory with one fifth of the cost to develop the new course handed to the treasurer at the meeting. The land was purchased in 1924 but according to records was not paid for until 1928.

Thanks to local weekly newspapers like the *Western Star*, *The East Galway Democrat* and the *Ballinasloe Advertiser* the club has a very good record of its early years. A very detailed booklet of the club's history was produced for the Club's Centenary and a few copies of this book are available in the club.

In 1984 the club developed an extra 9 holes to make it an 18 hole course. In 1992 the present revised course layout was opened. The clubhouse has also seen many changes since the first tin shed pavilion built in 1924.

Over the years the club has had good success in mens, ladies and under age Inter Club Competitions and several members have been selected on Irish Teams for International matches.

The loss of over 2,000 jobs in the town over the years (at A.T. Cross, Square D, Dubarry & St. Brigid's Hospital) saw the membership of the club drop from 850 members in 2007 to 430 members today.

Ballinasloe Golf Course continues to be a great facility, not only for its members but also for the town and it is also used by many local clubs and organisations for fund raising events. 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
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BUSY SUMMER AHEAD FOR PEARSES GAA

Padraig Pearse's GAA club, Woodmount, Co. Roscommon is heading into the business end of the GAA season. Pearse's has a strong focus on teaching players key skills and techniques early, which perhaps explains why the club is so decorated with county players. Every Saturday morning, u6 to u12 boys and girls train in football, and the girls and boys have hurling training from 6:30 – 7:30pm, on Mondays and Wednesdays respectively. The u14 teams across all codes will take part in Feile 2019, with the hurlers travelling to Cork in early June, and the boys and girls footballers hosting St James from Wexford, and St Brigid's from Monaghan at the end of June.

The annual summer camp returns this August 19th to 22nd for 4 to 12 year olds. The camp will take place from 10am to 2pm each day at the club, and no pre booking is required.

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TENNIS SUMMER SEASON CONTINUES TEMPORARILY

Ballinasloe & District Tennis Club are running their Summer Camps from Monday 8th July for 4 weeks. The camps will take place at Ard Scoil Mhuire, in the mornings between 11- 12 for children aged 5-12. They can attend for 1, 2, 3 or all 4 weeks for €30 per child. The participation fee will include all equipment and they are suitable for both complete beginners and more experienced players.

At the end of the 2018 season, after a close member's vote at the last AGM, left its long term home to allow the Rugby Club to expand their facilities. The rugby club has since completed their new all-weather pitch, using the tennis courts as the foundation of the pitch, effecting some savings to the rugby club's overall development costs.

Moving from their base has not been as positive for the tennis club, as they had expected to have their new facilities, at the site the Council has leased to the club above the running track in Brackernagh, built in time for the 2019 season. Regrettably the Sports Capital Grants required, which were expected to be announced in the early part of this year have now been delayed until at least the Autumn.

The club has moved to its temporary location at Ard Scoil Mhuire where it is now offering regular activities for juniors, teens, adults and special needs, including Junior Coaching on Wednesday at 6pm and Adult open sessions on Fridays at 7pm.

Due to the limited access available to the courts and other facilities, the club has decided to forego membership fees from its 120 plus members for this year. Instead, both members and non-members are welcome to participate in all organised activities without

Although planning permission to build 4 courts with artificial surface and lights at the new site was obtained well over two years ago, it was only this year that the lease on the site was finalised. 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Ballinasloe's first-ever All-Ireland Powerlifting Champion will attempt to bring a European Title home when he competes in the European WPC, AWPC Championships later this month. 22-year-old Tristan McDonagh from Hymany Park will hope to improve on his All-Ireland record-breaking success in the Powerlifting Bench and Deadlift events in the 67.5kilo class, which were held in Limerick.

Only three years in the sport, and overcoming a serious hand injury, Tristan is self-taught in the unique sporting events that has already won him several medals, two at National Level. "In the All-Ireland championships, the Ballinasloe man competed in the 67.5kilo class where a person attempts the maximum weight they can lift

Competitors can have up to three attempts at each lift and in the third class, the Deadlift, Tristan opened with 195kg before setting another

National record with a lift of 202.5kg.

I trained hard in the Shearwater Gym, Shear Fitness for the last few years, and winning this title, is beyond my wildest dreams. I would love to see other youths take up the sport. It is a tough fitness regime and very healthy. To achieve such success in such a short time is unbelievable" added Tristan.

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AUGHRIM MAN COMMEMORATED IN MANHATTAN

East Galway people living in and visiting Manhattan, in New York City, have a special interest in St. Paul's Churchyard where a 35 feet high obelisk is erected to the memory of Dr. William James MacNeven, who was born in Ballinahown, Aughrim on 21st March 1763.

After studying medicine in Prague and Vienna, the young Galwayman returned to Dublin before emigrating to America where he established the first chemical laboratory in New York. His contribution to American medicine was immense and one of the inscriptions on the monument reads: "An Irish Patriot, MacNeven came to this country in 1805. As Supervisor of Hospitals for New York City, he was instrumental in staving off cholera and smallpox epidemics."

Another side of the obelisk has the inscription: "William James MacNeven, M.D. Born in Ireland, March 21st A.D. 1753. Died in New York, July 12th A.D. 1841. Who in the cause of his Native Land Sacrificed the bright prospects of his youth and passed years in poverty and exile; till in America he found a country which he loved as truly as he did the land of his birth. To the Service of this country which had received him as a son he devoted his high Scientific acquirements



with eminent ability."

He is buried on the Riker Farm in Astoria, Queen's. A road in Ballinasloe's Fairgreen is named after him.

St. Paul's, which is very close to the new World Trade Centre, was designated a historical landmark in 1960, having opened in 1766. President George Washington attended a service there on his Inauguration in 1789, President James Monroe's funeral service was held there in



1831. It was spared from the Sept. 11th attacks in 2001 and became a home for volunteer relief ministry and recovery workers. Bishop Desmond Tutu preached there in 2005 and in 2016 it celebrated its 250th anniversary.



In the churchyard, near Broadway, is a monument to another Irish emigrant, the Honorable Thomas Addis Emmet, who is described as "An activist for an Independent Ireland, he emigrated to America in 1803 and was New York State Attorney General from 1812-1813. He is buried in St. Mark's Church, in the Bowery."



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KEEPING THE SUMMER BLOOMING

As we slip past high summer and towards late, it is tempting to take your foot off the gas. This is a time to enjoy the garden, to relax after the hard work, with maybe the odd push-around of the mower to make room for a blanket or deckchair. But as welcome as the laziness of the season may be, those who give up too early are missing out. The flowers of late summer and autumn are particularly beautiful. They are also long-lasting, perennial and repeat-flowering plants.

We all aim to get the most out of our summer bedding but how is this achieved, the answer is simple food, water and a small bit of dead heading. It can't be stressed how important it is to feed your plants throughout the summer to achieve long lasting blooms. Feeding isn't just for summer bedding, shrubs are often crying out for attention make sure to feed any shrubs and hedges to ensure good growth and healthy leaves throughout the season. We recommend giving your lawn a tonic during the summer this will ensure a green lawn and promote lawn health. Having a healthy

lawn will help keep the weeds and moss at bay throughout the year.

Plan to use plants that thrive in summer as this will save you work and help conserve water. Herbs are fabulous plants, with garden and kitchen uses galore, and are particularly useful in a dry season. Rosemary, sage, thyme, and chives are among our favourites in the garden and the kitchen, and they will do well in a sunny spot even in a drought. Leggy herbs should be trimmed back now as well. Dry or freeze the trimmings from your herbs, so nothing goes to waste.

Many annuals are just reaching their prime blooming period. Keep them deadheaded, and they will continue to give you flowers for a few more weeks. Another fertilizer application will give them the boost they need, especially if the weather has been hot and harsh. Be sure everything is well watered. Check for insect damage, and use appropriate treatments.

During the summer months regularly prune off dead stems on roses to give the optimal care and ensure regular feeds. Finally, August is an ideal month to plant herbaceous perennials, these will provide you with colour through out the summer year after year.

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LIAM MELLOWS "The birth of a nation is never the result of an immaculate conception."

A prominent revolutionary figure in the years from 1916 to 1922, his association with the town of Ballinasloe has been all but forgotten. In the publications of local historians he receives no mention. His name was Liam Mellows, born at Hartshead military barracks, Ashton-under-Lyne, Lancashire, on 25th May 1892.

The son of a sergeant in the British army, after the family had moved to Ireland in 1895 Liam was educated at a number of military schools in Cork and Dublin. On leaving school in 1907 he worked as a clerk in Dublin. Possibly influenced by his nationalist-minded mother, in 1911 he joined Na Fianna, a Republican scouting organization, and was appointed a full-time organizer in 1913 at a salary of 30 shillings a week.

Already a member of the Irish Republican Brotherhood, he joined the Irish Volunteers on their formation in November 1913. After the parting of the ways with Redmond's Volunteers, he was elected to the executive committee and was sent to Galway to rebuild the organization there. He based himself in Athenry where his landlady was Julia Morrissey, a young woman who was a commandant in Cumann na mBan. Sharing a political outlook as well as a love of music, they became close friends. Julia's later life was tragic: she developed a psychotic illness and was committed to Ballinasloe Mental Hospital in the 1930s where she remained up to her death in 1974. Sometime in 1915 Mellows conducted a Volunteers' training camp in a field adjoining St. Joseph's College, Ballinasloe, then located at The Pines in Creagh, the choice of campsite undoubtedly influenced by Mellows's friendship with Fr. Patrick Connolly, an advanced nationalist and member of the college teaching staff.

He was arrested on 2nd April 1916 under the Defence of the Realm Act and deported to Staffordshire. Swapping places with his brother, he managed to return to Ireland in the days before the 1916 Rising disguised as a priest, and assumed command of the Connacht contingent in the Insurrection, the story of which is too well known to be repeated here. Suffice it to say that the Galway Volunteers disbanded at the end of Easter Week without having achieved any of their objectives, after which several hundred local men found

themselves shipped off to internment in North Wales. Mellows went into hiding in a remote part of County Clare, remaining there until October when a plan was devised to smuggle him out of the country via Dungarvan. Posing as a seaman, he boarded a vessel in Liverpool bound for New York, arriving at his destination in mid-December.

In New York he contacted John Devoy, leader of Clann na Gael, the American counterpart of the IRB, and editor of "The Gaelic American" newspaper. Devoy hired him as a columnist to write for his paper; however, in October 1917 Mellows was arrested on a charge of attempting to get to Germany to buy arms and with travelling on a false passport. Eventually he was released on bail, but Devoy dispensed with his services because the pro-German sentiments expressed in his articles had become a source of embarrassment to the Clann now that America had entered the Great War as an ally of Britain and France. Mellows was obliged to find work as a labourer, and soon began to experience serious health problems. Nevertheless, he recovered sufficiently to accompany Hannah Sheehy Skeffington on her successful lecture tour of the States in 1918, and became an indispensable organizer of Éamon de Valera's activities in the US during the following two years. Thoroughly disenchanted with America, Mellows returned to Ireland in October 1920, stating he was "very glad to have shaken forever the dust of the soulless place from my feet."

At a Sinn Féin convention in Ballinasloe in October 1918 Mellows had been selected in his absence to contest East Galway in the forthcoming general election, and was subsequently returned unopposed. It was rumoured that the Sinn Féin national executive was less than enamoured of his candidacy given his known German sympathies, but apparently his popularity in the constituency decided them against exercising their veto. As it happened, East Galway was the only constituency in the county in which the party faced no opposition.

On his return to Dublin, Mellows was appointed Director of Purchases to the Volunteers, thus becoming a member of the GHQ Staff. Michael Collins, Director of Intelligence, saw his appointment as an invasion of his own territory and began to refer to him disparagingly in correspondence as the "little man". The reality was that Mellows found himself caught between two combatants.



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

Cathal Brugha, Minister for Defence, was trying to use him to get at Collins. At the same time, Mellows came to distrust Collins so much that he refused to stay in the same house as him. His antipathy to Brugha would eventually be almost as great.

A company had been registered in Ballinasloe under the name of Kenny and Murray Ltd. During the period of the Truce declared on 11th July 1921 its legitimate trade was accompanied by the clandestine importation of arms for the IRA. Mellows visited the town from time to time to co-ordinate plans, and on one occasion when he arrived at the railway station he was met by and inspected a 46-man IRA guard of honour under the command of Jack Keogh, a well-known local Republican activist.

Following the signing of the Anglo-Irish Treaty on 6th December, most of the IRA's rank-and-file were opposed to the settlement, while a majority of the GHQ supported it. Those against were Rory O'Connor and Liam Mellows. On 29th December Mellows attended a Sinn Féin Comhairle Ceantair meeting in Ballinasloe's Town Hall. Only one man spoke out against the Treaty, namely Paddy Beegan, a future Fianna Fáil TD for East Galway. In the event, 9 out of the 27 delegates voted against ratification.

Mellows, who had once again been returned unopposed in the 1921 general election, now stood for the third time as a candidate in the so-called Pact election of June 1922. Addressing a meeting in Ballinasloe on the eve of polling, he said he was in favour of breaking up the ranches and compensating the owners, but condemned any seizures of land as a religious reprisal. There had been instances of this in the neighbourhood. He told the meeting that he preferred a Protestant who believed in the freedom of Ireland to a Catholic who did not. The fight would go on until complete independence was achieved. On this occasion, however, he was to lose his seat.

When the anti-Treaty Four Courts garrison surrendered to

Provisional Government forces at the end of June, Mellows was amongst a group of IRA leaders imprisoned in Mountjoy. The Irish Free State officially came into being on 6th December 1922. The following day, Seán Hales TD was assassinated. Next morning, Mellows and three others were executed by firing squad as a reprisal. Though without any basis in law, the Government's action effectively aborted the IRA's declared policy of shooting Dáil deputies, and arguably contributed to the survival prospects of the newborn state. Ironically, it was the Feast of the Immaculate Conception.

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
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Ballinasloe TOWN MAP

Ballinasloe History Walk

- Start at the statue known as *The Man with the Horse*, where Main Street joins St. Michael's Square. From the crossing near the statue, continue by turning right onto Main Street. The prosperity of Ballinasloe in Georgian times can be seen in the scale and classical style of the buildings here. A fine group of four frontages stand across from the statue of The Man with the Horse. With shops and pubs on the ground floor for the most part, these Main Street premises have several floors above.
 - Walking along Main Street, lift your eyes above the shop frontages for one of the town's characteristic sights. There are the Diocletian windows that grace several facades. They are from the years after 1805 when the 2nd Earl was in charge. A window of this sort is formed under a semi-circular arch with two upright divisions so that the whole opening is divided into three parts.
 - As you stand at the meeting point of Bridge Street and Main Street, you will see the Victorian frontage of a commercial premises, originally the Masonic Hall. Next to it stands a classical looking, beautifully-crafted, early 19th century stone house, currently a guest house. Beside these is a tall, fine stone-fronted classical mansion, which is now the Bank of Ireland. It was originally the town mansion of the Lord of all of Ballinasloe, the Earl of Clancarty. A friend of King George IV, the Earl was one of the architects of the resistance to the emperor Napoleon. It could be said that he was the person to whom most credit is due for the layout, growth and architectural character of Ballinasloe as we see it today.
 - At the end of Main Street, head along Bridge Street, then turn to the right to the pathway which runs to the riverscape where you can see channels flowing through the several arches of the long stone bridge over the river Suck, one of the town's most precious monuments. The Bridge has been in continuous use since the 16th century and its extension in 1754 prepared it structurally to carry even the heaviest juggernauts of today.
 - Walk through to the far end of the park; you will approach St Michael's Church (1852-58) that stands in a commanding position over the Square. Its architect was J.J. McCarthy, a follower of Augustus Pugin (famed for other Neo-Gothic churches in Ireland) – and the design is said to have been revised by Pugin himself. Inside are many fine stained glass windows. Of particular quality are those of St. Patrick and St. Rose of Lima, of 1925, by the renowned Dublin stained glass artist, Harry Clarke and The Raising of the Daughter of Jairus by Patrick Pollen, inserted in 1958.
 - From St. Michael's Church now walk up St. Michael's Square back towards the Man with the Horse Statue. Take a left into Dunlo Street, an important street in the history of the town, which contains, together with other buildings of about the same date, the late-Georgian Garda Station. The Station is towards the far end of the street, on the right hand side. Also on this street, over Dolan's Electrical Shop, you can see another fine example of Diocletian windows.
 - Halfway up Dunlo Street, turn right up Duggan Street, which will take you to St. John's Church (Church of Ireland, 1843). It dominates the vast Fair Green which becomes a hive of activity during one week every year when up to 100,000 people throng to the October fair. Look out over the Fair Green and admire one of the grandest freestanding classical monuments in the region. Dedicated to Charles Le Poer Trench, it was designed in the Neo-Greek style by the English architect George Papworth (1781-1855). A mile past this monument on the Main Galway road, South West of the town, the Earl of Clancarty's former country house is situated, where imposing gates mark the entrance to Garbally Court. It has been a school since 1923.
- Walk down Church Hill onto Society Street and turn left, arriving at the Courthouse on the right. Society Street, like Main Street, was the 19th century location for the professional classes. As well as the Courthouse, it contains the former Bridewell (or gaol) from the 1840s. Further along this street, Ballinasloe Railway Station is a must. Constructed in 1851, it is a Neo-Gothic limestone tour-de-force and a fine example of the quality of rural Irish railway architecture in the mid-19th century.

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
