

Barry factual analysis is stark, cold and bare whereas Eoghan's reminisces convey vividly the cruel poverty of the times and tumult brought about by the First World War, the War of Independence and subsequently the Civil War in succession for young parents struggling with a clatter of children and infrequent income.

I did not review the Book – far greater than I in the literary world have, but I found myself steeped in the lore of my Grandparents generation who were born in the first years of this new State and recalled in their latter years to us pups what they understood to be

Very often through a prism of political opportunity our forebearers interpreted the events that saw them as toddlers or young children witness, in a certain tribal way.

I laughed and smiled at Lewey's recollections of so much that was familiar with growing up and oddly could recollect some of the characters mentioned. All the complexity of a child being raised where violence is usual, poverty is endemic and the absolute might of the Roman Catholic Church was shinning in its post McHale legacy, is narrated convincingly.

But to a family in the early years of this state with an average brood of 10 - sending the second son to the seminary and a daughter to the nuns had its economical as well as spiritual benefits.

Not every Irish women who professed wished to do evil, some did,

others covered up that evil but in examining their role on the island since the time of St. Brigid their legacy and efforts perhaps need to be seen from a more balanced and long distance perspective.

A motion having the Ballinasloe Townparks inner relief road inserted as specific project under named road projects, was carried recently and will also be in the County Development Plan which is a higher order plan than the Ballinasloe Local Area Plan.

The council are now enabled to support the delivery of the Inner Relief Road and to explore appropriate land uses adjacent to the road and River Suck harnessing the potential for recreation and related activities in association with the River.

The motion that was put forward by Cllr. Evelyn Parsons can now be progressed to form the basis to seek planning and a co-funding applications as it's listed as a road project in the CDP for the first time ever.

Cllr Evelyn Parsons stated: "It was an issue the Ballinasloe townspeople and business community repeatedly brought up with me. They wanted to open up the town and backlands towards the river and there are many fine commercial, tourism

and local recreational benefits to doing so and from the Town being more river centric."

could include a possible accessible swim and water recreation area and that would improve drinking water status and ensure higher quality water for the area with more rigorous standards and frequency of testing having to be applied to bathing status water," Cllr. Parsons added.

There were funds allocated for the project in 2014 from the old landfill fund, however when the town council dissolved the Galway CoCo took over with the commitment of delivering the road and Amenity area, nothing had happened since. There never was and there is currently no planning permission for

the road or amenity Townparks area.

"IputitforwardtozonethatTownparksareaamenity,community facilities, open space and insert a link road to emerge also at the new Scoil Croi Naofa School. This was not feasible as planners were adamant putting a zoning use of open space or amenity or community facilities on that area would completely preclude and jeopardise the development of any road or route in that zoning and leaving it unzoned gives it the best possible chance of getting through environmental hurdles as it is area of constrained land use which will be subject to stringent high level environmental assessments," Cllr. Parsons concluded.

Now that the motion has been passed and included in the CDP and the LAP, the Council in accordance with proper planning and sustainable development and environmental considerations will finally have both plans solidly backing delivery of the longawaited Inner Relief Road.

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There has been a major investment in the town suburbs for badly needed new footpaths including Poolboy, Beechlawn and Creagh.

Active Travel funds have been allocated from the National Transport Authority in 2021 and 2022 as part of the Programme for Government focus on sustainable transport in regional and rural areas. This investment of €460,000 close to half a million is the largest investment into the Poolboy and Beechlawn area in decades and will develop safe looped walks. The project has been broken into two stages of development.

The first stage includes the wide footpaths with lighting completed through the first section of Beechlawn from the crossroad to beyond Beechlawn Organic Farm. The section in Poolboy is currently under construction to Old Mill Road estate along Old Mill Road (Hall's Boreen) and over to Oak Glen. The second stage of development will see the section completing the loop through Beechlawn and also a footpath from Rackzone previously Square D to Cúil na Canalach and Oak Glen.

Senator Aisling Dolan commented: "Beechlawn is an extremely busy and dangerous section for people walking especially at night-time. It will bring more people to safely see scenic routes along the banks of the River Suck to the old Grand Canal Bridge and the Poolboy Lock which allows the boats to come into

Ballinasloe Marina. As well as linking in with the Galway to Dublin Cycleway coming along the Grand Canal into Poolboy and town.

"I worked with engineers in Roscommon County Council to put together a case for the section of road from Beagh roundabout to Shannonbridge roundabout. So many people walk the 5km loop from Creagh Church along

the Dublin Rd. and onto Shannonbridge Rd. However the section between roundabouts is just a hard shoulder with a lot of heavy traffic coming off the M6 motorway" added the Senator.

"Thank you to Paul Browne and Tom McDermott, engineers from Roscommon County Council, for a strong proposal and total €200,000 investment and now with our project contractors finalising up we can see construction and a footpath to promote safe places for walking for people in Creagh/ Beagh as well" she concluded.

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A motion seeking to provide targeted mental and emotional health supports to students sitting the Leaving Cert and state exams was put to HSE West at a recent Regional Health Forum.

Cllr Dr. Evelyn Parsons told members of the Health Forum she has great concerns regarding the unique set of pressures young students are under sitting the traditional Leaving Cert and other state exams after prolonged uncertainty and recurrent disruptions through COVID.

"I am pleased to have gained widespread support for my proposal which the Regional Health Forum agreed to advocate the proposal to the National Office of Mental Health and Wellbeing. I welcome that it is now going forward for consideration of rolling out a National Student Mental & Emotional Helpline," said Cllr Parsons.

Cllr. Parsons proposed that HSE West put a Student helpline in place immediately to provide additional

targeted specifically to pupils sitting state exams this year in recognition of their unique mental health pressures engendered by prolonged educational and social disruption through COVID, and more recently the knock on impacts of a war at a key transitional development

"Over 60,000 students sit the Leaving Cert annually and even more students experience exam stress also. I proposed to pilot it in HSE West and that it would assist in expediting a fast track for urgent intervention and


I'm pleased the Regional Health Forum felt there was merit in my proposal. Tony Canavan CEO Saolta, Ms. Breda Crehan-Roche CEO Community Healthcare West and senior executive staff supported the proposal of a student helpline at national level as did my councillor colleagues. I hope to see this implemented without delay so that it can serve our youth as a valuable mental and emotional resource for years to come," she added.

While there are mental and emotional health resources available, funded by HSE through Jigsaw, Mindspace Mayo, West be Well she stated she was concerned that students who

> are already overwhelmed with reading materials and bookwork and low mood might find it unwieldy to get to the information they need. Cllr Parsons said she was also concerned that a national resource might not be in place quickly enough to assist this cohort of young people with upcoming exams in HSE West area.

> > Ms Breda Crehan-Roche Community Healthcare West agreed to put together a more user friendly format of existing resources immediately for students and youth.

"It is important the resource information is presented in a userfriendly manner for students' quick access. I welcome the additional online platform at Westbewell.ie which launched since I raised this issue at the Health Forum last month and thank Ms Crehan Roache for her responsiveness in compiling mental health resources in a user friendly format," Cllr Parsons concluded.

# **LIFE ADVERTISING RATES RISE AFTER 10 YEARS**

Since the magazine inception in 2011, the team have endeavoured to run the magazine on a break even basis while meeting the demand from the wider community for more editorial space and additional copies!

The first edition was 32 pages with 3,000 copies printed and we are now printing 7,000 copies of a 64 page magazine for each edition, with the demand growing for extra copies, particularly from our newsagents (Dolans, Salmons and Corrib Oil, all being disappointed when we have no additional copies for their customers for the past

number of issues).

As a result of increased running costs (paper worldwide has increased by 45%), as the publication team enter the next cycle (commencing Aug/September edition) the advertising rates are to increase to ensure we can print same number of magazines as per previous editions.

The advertisement rates for a 20% advert will be increasing from €108.33 to €123.33 and for a 40% size advert from €166.67 to €187.50 per edition.

Lyn Donnelly advertising manager stated:

"We have resisted increasing the advertising costs in the magazine for the past 10 years but unfortunately our hands are tied with the increased running costs, with our only options to either increase the advertising rates or to dramatically reduce the quality/ quantity of the magazine per run. Our subscribers who are all local businesses are the lifeblood of the magazine, with many supporting the magazine from day 1 which is testament in itself and we are optimistic the increased costings won't deter new advertisers coming on board."




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

Ballinasloe Says No public meeting in Shearwater Hotel

The Ballinasloe Says No committee have taken their next step in their campaign as they are now reviewing legal options to tackle the decision by Galway County Council to grant a permit to the waste transfer station.

Chairperson Vincent Parsons stated: "Ballinasloe Says No are committed to fighting for health, safety and to protect our unique environment around the Suck River Callows -an SPA (Special Protection Area) under EU law-on behalf of the people of Ballinasloe. It is shocking that Galway County Council Executive have decided to grant this permit despite thousands of objections from people in the area.

"The decision by the Council to grant a permit was quashed by High Court Order on two occasions in 2018 and again earlier this year. In addition, this area is subject to a 1999 High Court Order halting all major waste facilities. Despite all of this Galway County Council Executive have granted another permit for a major waste facility in the town centre showing total disregard for the people of Ballinasloe and surrounding area," he added.

Chairperson Parsons and Senator Aisling Dolan, with the committee, also noted that a public meeting will be held within the next few weeks to give people an update.

PRO Senator Dolan stated: "I want to thank people in the town and living all around Ballinasloe for their continued support.

This development means hundreds of trucks coming on every road into town. It will have a detrimental impact on the lives of residents and people using our roads competing with 10 ton, 20 ton and 30 ton trucks. We look forward to holding a public meeting in the next few weeks please check our Facebook page for details."

Encompassing from the Beara Breifne Way on the West of the town and the Shannon Erne Water system on the East; a new Community Tourism network was established at a launch meeting in the Shearwater Hotel, Ballinasloe recently.

The launch night saw the Ballinasloe Area Community Development Company (BACD) outline how Tourism Development for the town and its hinterland is one of the three key pillars of the new Strategic Development Plan.

BACD had commissioned a GRD Funded Feasibility Study on the potential of a new Tourism Development which was presented to the invited audience of some 80 delegates from the trade and sector.

The Feasibility outlined how the scoping exercise identified almost 170 visitor related experiences / firms and services in a 25 km radius of the town Centre from Meelick Weir to Ballyforan and from Dartfield to Clonmacnoise.

A preliminary Map of O'Kelly Country was circulated with some 27 points of notable interest on it and the plan outlined where

the current level of evolution the network location is at, between Involvement and Development among the 3 Hotels, 21 Accommodation providers, 20 Services, 14 Live Music Pubs, 12 Restaurant / Cafes, 23 attractions, 12 Community Development groups, 7 heritage groups, 10 leisure groups, 17 Cultural and Events activities, 15 Crafters and 3 Artisan Food and Distillery firms.

The plan went on to identify how the new network could compliment the Strategic Direction of both the Beara Breifne Way Development Plan and Shannon Erne Masterplan in delivering the targeted visitor numbers that Hidden Heartlands has for the region.

The Plan used many of the benchmarks from the Destination Town Toolkit and the Community Network Guide researched by Failte Ireland to outline what actions are required to make the area more visitor friendly when the Greenway spur and Blueway of the Suck are completed over the coming years.

A strong panel of industry leaders contributed their perspectives on how places in undiscovered Ireland need to establish an experience and offer as well as just identifying assets.

Paddy Mathews, CEO of Hidden Heartlands, presented an overview on what his organisation were doing to maximise the potential of the region that had 80% of the Wild Atlantic Way passing through it but only managed to keep less than 5% of the total visitor numbers to the island. He explained their target markets for season stressing the Northern Ireland and



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Domestic Visitor. He believed that some three years on, having first attending a briefing in the town – the group were on the right direction of travel and that he and his team from Hidden Heartlands would be engaging and supporting them.

"It's no longer enough to say come visit us and discover our assets, we need to bundle them into experiences that encourages people to play here when they stay here, this network will be significant part of getting that new message out there" stated Paddy.

Ruth Mulhern, the Galway County Council Tourism Officer, was pleased that the Study referenced the Lough Derg Visitor Plan which she was involved in and outlined that the new County Tourism Plan she was currently drafting, would utilise some of the scoping work undertaken by the Feasibility - developing lesser known parts of the County.

Gerry Finn, the Chair of the Western Development Commission, referred to the role of his organisation towards reaching out for new families and businesses to establish west and that a new look tourism feel to the Just Transition Zone of the Midlands with its emphasis on Sustainability and Eco Tourism was the way forward. He also offered many practical insights in how the King House Project and establishment of the Una Bhain Tourism Network that he personally worked on, is still showing success 25 years later.

Eanna Rowe, Regional Manager of Waterways Ireland, was very enthusiastic about the plan and gave references to projects that he worked on in Killaloe and Boyle that had key learnings for the Collective. "The 7,000 boat owners are a very networked community and you must try with the launch of this network keep reaching out to a variety of groups and segments that will in time become ambassadors for this part of the country. The start-up if a new Local IWA Club on the Suck will be a huge building block in this" he stated.

Steve Dolan, the CEO of GRD Leader – who had funded the Study which has some 47 recommendations – the key to which is to form from a Working Party and new Collective – welcomed the Plan and the large, renewed interest in tourism. "From listening to the presentations from looking at the larger numbers of hinterland communities and key private investment support, we can see here tonight how much part of the Hidden Heartlands that Ballinasloe and its hinterland want to be". He referenced the difficulties with Leader Funding in transition and spoke candidly about some of the projects he was involved in, in the past with Portumna Castle, Courthouse and Workhouse.

Many Oireachtas Reps and local Councillors spoke in strong support that the Collective was the progressive route to go in chasing new business and employment for the area.

There was a robust question and answers session with the panelists before the Moderator Brian King Vice-chair of BACD wound down the evening stating that the Collective would be establishing new working relationships with all the agencies on the stage in creating an innovative and dynamic Tourism Collective for East Galway South Roscommon and North Offaly.

The Heritage Boat Association (HBA) is celebrating its 21<sup>st</sup> birthday in Ballinasloe Marina over the June public holiday, whilst also marking the 21st anniversary of the opening of the Suck Navigation system and marina.

Up to 30 Canal Barges are expected to turn up to celebrate the Anniversary promising to be quite a spectacle with great historical significance, considering these are the very boats that travelled to Ballinasloe before the closure of the Grand Canal Line back in 1961.

The Harbour is steeped in the history of the Grand Canal. The final section of the canal, from Shannon Harbour to Ballinasloe, was opened in 1828. It terminated at Dunlo Harbour, which consisted of a harbour master's house and two stores, all still surviving to this day on Harbour Road in town. The massive iron mooring rings can be seen on the lower reaches of some

of the apartments and houses now in the basin.

Before the advent of the Railways in 1830s the Canals were the principle means of bulky goods transportation – agricultural produce, coal, turf, glass, tobacco, whiskey, beer, lumber, ballast, bricks were all taken from the Ships at Dublin Port, transferred to the Grand Canal Basin and their cargos despatched to the West via the terminus at the Harbour Road. The Westminster Parliamentary Gazette in 1836; officially recorded some 1,628 first class passengers and 1,830 who travelled by Canal from the Harbour Road terminus to Dublin-a journey that took approx. 2 and half days.

Following the closure of the canal in 1961, it was no longer possible for boats to make the journey to Ballinasloe until works commenced in the 1990s to make the River Suck navigable, including the construction of Poolboy Lock – joining the town to the majestic Shannon – Erne Waterway in May 2001.

There are 40 retired M (for Motor) working boats or barges still active on the inland waterways. The last seven were sold by Inland waterways by way of tender in 2013 when raised from the bed of Tullamore Harbour. The Canal company in the 50s sank a lot of the craft to preserve them in the freshwater in the old harbours and jettys.

Ciarán Clinton of the Heritage Boats Association stated: "We are looking forward to our 21st anniversary event in Ballinasloe Marina. Seeing these barges dating back to 1847 is like taking a step back in time and will give an insight to life when Ballinasloe was the last stop on the Grand Canal. Do come along and have a chat when we are in town, our members

enjoy sharing these incredible stories."

Boats will arrive on May 28 and will be moored for the week until June 6. This will be a great opportunity to get up close to the very barges which were once part of everyday transport life in the town and bring back memories for those who remember the barges in action especially with Guinness.

Four local voluntary groups received grants under the Community Activities Fund, co -ordinated by the Dept of Community and Rural affairs recently.

The Town Hall, Town Band, Social Services and Ballinasloe Care and Repair all received funding under the new initiative that aims to provide small grants for community groups impacted by the pandemic.


The funding was brought about to give a helping hand to the smaller groups and facilities at grassroots level by supporting them to continue their important work on the ground. Galway County Council invited community groups to apply for funding at the start of the year and the four groups were recently informed that their applications were successful.

The Town Hall secured €4,500 under the scheme. The funding which was under two strands will support the Hall's essential running costs. The committee also intends to upgrade the Cyclorama on the stage to allow for projections that are being used increasingly in place of physical sets.

The Town Band were allocated €2,500 Grant Aid which will be put towards the cost of insurance and the purchase of new equipment for their members.

Ballinasloe Social Services in Brackernagh received €1,500. Teresa Coughlan, Director of Social Services stated: "From

the funding, we were able to purchase a Sara Steady Aid. This piece of equipment encourages those using it to fully participate in transfers, thus improving circulation, breathing, digestion and muscle tone. It provides support for those to continue to attend our day services, who previously may not have been able, due to reduced or little



mobility. It also enables us to provide a day service to new referrals who previously may not have been suitable to attend due to the high level of support needed. The feedback from our clients who have used the Sara Steady is very positive."

The Ballinasloe Care and Repair team were awarded €2,000 which will enable them to cover insurance costs of their van and keep it on the road. The group is a free service that helps to keep people living in their own homes in increased safety and comfort. Volunteers carry out DIY work for older people free of charge.

The grants are due recognition for these groups whose efforts throughout the pandemic were immense and were vital to maintaining community spirit and resilience during the difficult times.


Abbie McGowan has started her new role as a librarian in town and is looking forward to bringing her expertise and her love for books to improve the overall library experience for everyone.

Abbie was born in Croydon in the UK, has Irish connections through her father's family in Sligo and Clare. She moved to Ireland when she was 9 and graduated from NUIG in 2012 with a BA in History and Archaeology, and did her Post-Grad in Library and Information Studies in Robert Gordon University Aberdeen. She has worked in a huge variety of different jobs- toyshops, book shops, pet shops. Among those roles she worked as an intern in Westside Library where current County Librarian Bernie Kelly officiates.



The construction of the long-awaited hospital expansion at Portiuncula Hospital is set to begin in the coming weeks. The development will see a new 50-bed ward added to the hospital that has felt the brunt of a shortage of beds across Irish hospitals over recent years, it won't add to the total bed tally – merely refresh the original number in a modern layout!

The replacement unit which was included under the new HSE Capital Plan 2019 – 2021, include the replacement 50 bedded ward block, fire safety works and lift replacement programme, had been due for completion in April. The 4,038sqm building which will cost approximately €25m is now expected to be completed by the middle of 2023.

"It is hard to believe that it has taken nearly three years since I secured the commitment for the ward block development at Portiuncula Hospital from the then Health Minister Simon Harris, but I now hope that the final legal issues can be completed and a contract signed to start the construction of this vital project," said TD Denis Naughten.

Naughten described the progress on the development as "frustratingly slow" and that the delays in the completion of the project had led to "serious overcrowding" at the hospital.

Planning permission was first granted for the project in July of 2017 and was set to expire in August of this year. The HSE were granted an extension of planning permission for the construction of the new ward block by the County Council and stated that the extension was needed due to "financial concerns, requirement of enabling works to prepare for development, phasing works under a separate contract, and the unexpected delays such as Covid." A contractor has now been selected for the project and hopes to start the build.

A new CT scanner will become operational at the Hospital by the

end of July. Councillor Evelyn Parsons believes the equipment highlights a commitment to the investment and expansion of radiology services at the facility and allows the hospital to provide a high quality of care. "I had previously raised concerns over the frequent breakdown of the previous scanner, however, the HSE

has now confirmed that building works to accommodate the new machine is at an advanced stage" stated Cllr. Parsons. A temporary CT scanner is now on site and is currently being used to ensure appointments continue.

The results of a national survey were published recently, revealing the experience of patients at public hospitals last year. The National Inpatient Experience Survey covered a range of criteria, including admission, hospital environment, etc. asked patients to rate, out of ten, a wide range of criteria about their time spent in hospital, from beginning to end.

Portiuncula Hospital was rated 8 on Admissions; 7.9 on Care in the Ward; 7.5 on Examinations, Diagnosis and Treatment; 6.4 on Discharge or Transfer; 7.2 on Care During the Pandemic; and 7.9 on overall experience. Out of the 40 hospitals that took part, Portiuncula ranked 29th in the country.

The feedback showcased that areas of good patient experience included being treated with respect and dignity, cleanliness of rooms and wards, privacy while being examined or treated, confidence and trust in hospital staff, and pain management. Areas needing improvement included the availability of emotional support, time to discuss care and treatment with a doctor, information on how to manage a condition after leaving hospital, and the opportunity for families to talk to a doctor.

The Irish Nurses and Midwives Organisation (INMO) Trolley Watch reports that Data collected from the month of May showed a steep decrease in the number of patients waiting for beds. There were just 24 patients waiting on trolleys in the hospital come mid-May which were the lowest numbers in the midwestern region. The figures showed a 20% decrease from the same stage in April when some 125 patients were on trolleys and a 10% decrease from May 2021 when 34 patients waited on trolleys.



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The Battle of Aughrim Visitor Centre is re-opening for the summer months and are eagerly anticipating the return of visitors after the last two years.

Since the centre last opened its doors significant refurbishment has been carried out by Galway County Council. A redesigned layout, improved information boards, and dozens of new props and displays will be available to visitors to view until September.

A new Education Zone has been created which is specifically aimed at school children. School visits will also be able to avail of the new activity pack which was produced by Dr Padraig Lenihan of NUIG. There is also a scenario game produced by Dr. Lenihan and Michael Riddell which allows visitors to act as a general and command soldiers on a map of the battlefield.

Visitors will now be able to see what a soldier in 1691 would have carried in his pack, see a surgeon's kit in all its gory detail, and admire the new sets, costumes, and props from the era.

This year's marquee event for the centre will be Heritage Week which will take place in August. Many special events are being planned including a Walk About and Talk About with local group Cath Eachroma 1691. The group also produced a short photo booklet last year titled "Where Musket Balls Are Buried" which allows readers a birdseye view of the battlefield, along with detailed information about key sites. The booklets are

available in Valerie's and Burke's shop in Aughrim village, or by messaging the group on either Facebook or Twitter.

A new app has been produced that allows people to get a virtually guided walking tour of the Aughrim battlefield.

"Aughrim Tours Galway" was produced by remember when.ie for the Aughrim Community Development Company. The app contains two tours. The first around the Aughrim Battle Site and introduces the armies and strategies that were deployed in the Battle. The second tour centres around the Village its unique history and many colourful characters.

The free app is designed so that a virtual tour guide will follow you on your journey and plays audio messages at each historical landmark throughout. The tour lasts approximately two and a half hours and gives you a great insight into one of the bloodiest battles in Irish History. The app is available to download for free on all Android devices through the Google Play Store.

Seasonal opening of the Centre is from end of May – 4th September with opening times from Tuesday – Saturday, 10.30am - 4.30pm and Sunday 2.00pm – 5.00pm.

The extraordinary life of a Ballinasloe-born priest took another turn recently when he was appointed Diocesan Administrator of a South American diocese where he was ordained. For 76-year-old P. J. Madden from Brackernagh, the latest honour bestowed on him by the Holy Father, comes after less than eighteen years in the priesthood. He will be in charge of the diocese of Houma-Thibodaux in Louisiana, New Orleans, which has a population of 34,000 until the appointment of a new bishop.

Fr. P.J., the second eldest in a family of ten, to Tomo and Gertie Madden, won an All-Ireland medal for acting while a student in Garbally College, then studied for the priesthood in the SMA Novitiate in Kilcolgan. While working on a summer job in St. Brigid's Hospital in Ballinasloe he met Mary Mitchell from Moylough and they married in 1970.

Pursuing a career in psychiatric nursing, P.J. qualified in 1968, winning first place in Ireland in the finals in 1968. Along with his new wife, they embarked on a five-year stint as Lay Missionaries in New Orleans and on their return P.J. became involved in Industrial Relations. He was appointed General Secretary of the Psychiatric Nurses' Association of Ireland as well as Assistant Secretary of the LGPSU-a union representing Co. Councils and Health Boards nationwide.

In 1987, he became General Secretary of the Irish Nurses' Organisation and oversaw it being recognised as an Official Trade Union and becoming the largest women's union in the country, increasing its membership from 6,000 to 28,000 during his twelve year tenure in charge.

However in 1999 tragedy struck when PJ lost his beloved wife, following a serious illness. He took the unusual step of returning to New Orleans and spent three-and-half years studying for the priesthood. The widower was ordained in May 2004 as a Diocesan Priest for the City of Houma, where he ministered for five years. He then returned to Ireland and joined the Diocese of Kildare and Leighlin for three years, serving in the combined parish of Naas, Sallins and Twomilehouse in Co. Kildare.

Returning to Louisiana at the invitation of Bishop Shelton Fabre,

he was made Parish Priest of Houma and has served there since. The much-travelled Ballinasloe man said he is deeply honoured by his new appointment particularly as it comes from the recommendation of the College of Consultors in the Diocese. "This diocese was formed on 5th June 1977 and has 39 parishes with 59 secular priests. It has the Cathedral of Frances de Sales in Houma, which is in south-east Louisiana" explained Fr. PJ.

"I want to thank my family and my many friends in Ireland for their good wishes and hope I can carry out the duties of my new role. I have had something of a chequered life but I always trusted the faith my parents and my late wife had in me" said the new Administrator.

The Ballinasloe ME/Fibromyalgia Support Group was set up to provide a forum for those living in the area with ME (Myalgic Encephalomyelitis/Chronic Fatigue Syndrome) and Fibromyalgia to meet, share experiences and support one another.

The group was established in March 2020 and they have been running virtual meetings through the lockdown and are now finally able to meet up in person. The founder of the group Mary Barret explains "Both ME and Fibromyalgia are long term chronic conditions, with common features including extreme fatigue, brain fog, headaches, sleep disruption and gut sensitivity. Fibromyalgia also features significant pain and stiffness all over the body. The result is that many aspects of normal day to day life is difficult for those living with these conditions which can result in many having to give up work and not being able to participate in many family and social events despite from the outside looking like there is nothing wrong with them. With no cure and little research being conducted on either illness, those diagnosed can often face a long and lonely road living with these conditions.

"Our support groups aims to limit those feelings of isolation for members by facilitating a sharing of experiences with those who can truly empathise in a supportive and confidential environment. All members are advised to seek medical advice as the purpose of the group is not to diagnose or provide medical advice but to support members on their journey" she added.

Having provided face to face meetings before the pandemic the group had to adapt to the challenges of the pandemic so decided to commence online zoom meetings until they finally got the chance to come together again last month. In their first physical meeting back, participants discussed the challenges they faced on a daily basis and shared experiences on how they navigated those challenges with many tips and ideas shared on ways to improve their quality of life.



It was also agreed that the group would make a schedule for the year and that meetings would take place going forward on the first Saturday of every second month at 2:30 pm in GELS (Galway East Life Support), Cullen's Yard, Ballinasloe beginning in July with plans for a mix of support meetings and hosting guest speakers. The provisional dates for groups meetings for the rest of the year are: July 22; September 3; November 5.



"Ah, many is the time I walked in that archway and climbed the stairs to place a printing order with your late father"

is a comment often expressed to the Kelly brothers about their former business, Kelly's Printing Works, in Society St. "And I would sit on the window sill as he took my order" they often recalled.

The humble entrance led to the former East Galway Democrat newspapers offices, acquired by Michael Kelly in 1951 and which served the community well before moving to a purpose-built factory in the Poolboy Industrial Estate in 1983. Nostalgia and loyalty still exists with the sons and daughters of "old friends" remaining steadfast to one of Ballinasloe's oldest family run businesses, now in its fourth generation. Hardly a day goes by without a complimentary comment like "my father/mother always did business with your father, many years ago" as customers arrive at the Poolboy plant. Time moves on, friends pass away, but the service at KPW remains as committed as ever.

Why not drop in and see for yourself. There is nothing they can't print-from large outdoor roll-up signs to a colourful memorial card. And you don't have to climb the stairs!

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Camcloon NS is a rural, three teacher school based in Ballydangan, Co Roscommon which currently facilitates 59 students.

# **DARKNESS INTO LIGHT SUCCESS**

Over 450 locals set off from The Emerald Ballroom, at 4.15am on the sixth "Darkness Into Light Walk." They joined the 18 other venues in the county and the thousands of walkers at home and abroad in the annual flagship fundraiser for Pieta House.

It was the first time since 2019 that in-person walks took place from organised centres. Individuals, couples, and families all joined together creating a wave of yellow as they all wore their iconic yellow t-shirt with pride.

They moved silently and respectfully through the street, up Brackernagh and Mackney before entering the darkened Ard Scoil Mhuire avenue reflective section. They paused at the lantern and candlelit display before continuing through Garbally. Here the area was bedecked with lanterns, with Paul Drysdale and Frank Kennedy providing background music as the walkers filed past, before turning into the Garbally Avenue lined with the iconic yellow tealights as far as the Garbally exit before returning via Brackernagh, some tired, others invigorated, and some a little overwhelmed.

The walk is meant to be symbolic of the journey a person makes from the darkness of despair into the light of hope and wellness. It also serves to raise awareness and vital funds for the free life-saving services that Pieta House provide in its centres nationwide.

Brian Derrane, Chairman of the Organising Group, reported that Pieta received around 100,000 calls and texts last year, up 40% from previous. The charity's telephone and video therapy services had also seen an increase in demand, up 20% on this time last year. "A huge thanks is owed to the committee members, local voluntary groups and individuals who assisted with the stewarding and other aspects of the event ensuring the walk was a safe experience for participants, as well as the local businesses who contributed ensuring the event was cost neutral with approximate €6,500 locally raised going directly to Pieta House" he continued.



The importance of hosting this international event to the economy of town and its hinterland cannot be underestimated; proof enough was provided with the two year absence during the Pandemic and the Year of the Foot and Mouth. As a heritage event is has no equal-a point underscored and acknowledged by President Higgins in his opening address in 2018 when he pronounced the Great October Fair being worthy of UNESCO status. With the cooperation of local authority there is no reason why this cannot be achieved.

However with some 4 months left on the planning cycle there is frustration on the part of the Festival Organizers on how some of the undertakings given last Autumn will ever be put in place.

With practically six months of the year behind us, commitments and assurances given to meetings of the MDC and full County Council about significant resources being deployed and the early appointment of an Event Coo-ordinator, assistance with Insurances have yet to be finalized.


"We have been looking for a follow up meeting with the Council Executive to discuss plans and production for 2022, in its absence it is extremely frustrating and difficult for our voluntary committee to plan for this year's event" said chairman Mal Croffey.

It was fitting that the Moore and Clonfad Dramatic Society should celebrate their 40th year with the staging of a special show to support Ukranian Refugees and in the process raised €5,850 for the war-torn victims. A packed house witnessed the hilarious comedy "The Stations" in the local Community Hall, as part of their annual productions.

From small beginnings in 1983 Moore & Clonfad Drama Society has grown from strength to strength. The parish has a long tradition of involvement with the stage right back to the late fifties when the late May Greene, Patrick Kenny and PJ Flannery toured the West with the comedy Hospital Ward written by Lady Gregory. For many years the late Patrick Kenny and Micheál Grenham, and many more no doubt, were often seen threading the boards in comedy sketches – those two had a particular penchant for comedy.

Following in this tradition very shortly after Fr Richie Horan became PP in the parish of Moore, the well-known magician priest, worked his magic and very quickly gathered an ensemble of willing parishioners to take part in a play. Thus, the Moore & Clonfad Drama Society, came into being. The Group performed its inaugural play in 1983, directed by Fr Richie Horan. Sive, by the very well-known playwright John B Keane was the first performance of the group all those years ago.

This was followed by two further productions of Sive in 1989 and again in 2003. Many of the same cast were involved in the first two productions but the late May Greene and Patrick Whelan were the only two to reprise their roles as Nana Glavin and Carthalán in all three productions. The group performed many other plays from the pen of John B. Keane, including The Field (1984), Many Young Men of Twenty (1985 & 2001), The Year of the Hiker (1991), Big Maggie (1995) and Sharon's Grave (1996).

The Group were also successful across a range of other plays from many other playwrights such as Thy Dear Father (1986); Daughter from over the Water (1987); The Year of the Hiker (1991); The Righteous are Bold (1992); Philadelphia Here I Come (1993); A Crucial Week in the Life of a Grocers

Assistant (The Fooleen) (1994); The Playboy of the Western World (1997); Happy Birthday Dear Alice (1998); Juno and the Paycock (1999); A Lovers Meeting (2000); The Country Boy (2002); Lovers - Winners & Losers (2004) and Out of Order (2009). These plays covered a range of genre from the very serious to more comedic. The Group were very lucky to have superb directors to guide the various productions regardless of the genre. These included Fr Horan himself; the imminent John Boland, well known in drama circles, who acted and directed in many productions with the Group; Greg Blackwell

(2012 & 2014); Cupid Wore Skirts (2018); Pretend Sick (2019) and The Stations which was due to go on stage in March 2020 but couldn't be performed because of the Covid Pandemic. This was eventually staged this year in April 2022. The Group is now very well-known for its funny and fun filled productions. Audiences are guaranteed 'a belly load of laughs'. The productions generally include plenty of mayhem and comedic intrigue brought to life under the superb directing skills of Mr. Liam Curley. Liam's association with this group is of very long standing and the group acknowledges that its success is synonymous with Liam's particular genius, in directing comedy and his capacity to bring every modicum of fun from every character on stage and every line in the script.

When not involved in plays many members of the MCDS are involved in other activities on stage such as variety concerts and Scór. Scór audiences all over the county will recognise many of the members and the many wonderful characters brought to life in the many Scór sketches down the years. Many individuals have acted in perhaps one production

but there is a core group that have remained stalwarts of the Group both on and off the stage but having new people join as both cast and backstage crews has ensured a lifeblood in the group that is very necessary to keep the tradition alive.

Over 300 very memorable characters have been brought to life in over 25 plays since the inaugural play in 1983. This is a significant achievement for a small rural parish but one that MCDS is very proud of. The Group use their performances to generate funds and over the years have managed to raise significant funds for various charities supporting the development of Moore Community Hall and projects associated with local schools and many different community groups.

Amateur Drama is great fun and a wonderful way to make friends and give something back to the Community. As always the Moore & Clonfad Drama Society would love to see new members join the group and keep this wonderful tradition going in our parish.







The BARA Singers are gearing up for their annual marquee event Songfest this June. They have become an intrinsic part of community life, growing organically from a first meeting in October 2005 of a group of active retired people who liked to sing together have fun, entertain and be creative.

Offered as an optional winter activity to an already very busy active retirement association in Ballinasloe eleven ladies and two gentlemen signed up initially. They continued for the season of weekly two-hour rehearsals learning songs of all genres. Some remain the backbone of the group. 

I Am Lewy is a fresh, contemporary translation by poet Mícheál Ó hAodha of Ó Tuairisc's late novella An Lomnochtán (Mercier, 1977), which brings alive Lewy's vivid, impressionistic account of a tumultuous few months in the early/mid 1920s.



The autobiographical novella plays largely around the centre of Ballinasloe – St John's Church of Ireland, Dunlo Hill, the Fair Green, St Michael's Square. The Earl has left, but Lewy's family now pays their rent to a solicitor in town instead. The residue of the Civil War is still to be felt and a Free State soldier has had his head blown off by a bomb in the Square, according to Lewy. Irregulars roam east Galway and south Roscommon, especially around Dysart. Car stealing and a variety of other non-peace time acts are vividly portrayed through the lens of a very young boy.

At the fair with his demobbed, slightly shellshocked father, under his

seamstress mother's table while she measures the clients, minding his siblings on the Green across from the Workhouse, entangled with memories of 'Brazenface' Rosaleen McNally, and the skeleton in the sandpit, pitying the Orphans fed on the Nuns' Pee-Soup, Lewy tries to get his head around it all.

Eoghan Ó Tuairisc (1919–1982) was born Eugene Rutherford Watters on Dunlo Hill, Ballinasloe, where he grew up in one of the sadly now-derelict houses. His parents were Thomas Watters, a shoemaker, who had been wounded at the Battle of the Somme in France. His mother, Maud Watters (née Sproule), was a seamstress and clairvoyant.

After attending Garbally College and graduating as a primary school teacher in 1939 from St Patrick's College, Drumcondra, he taught in Finglas, Dublin for many years, and completed a Masters in UCD in 1947. He is remembered best as a writer

with a prolific output through both Irish and English, of poetry, stories, prose, novels and plays. He received numerous literary awards throughout his life for his bilingual writing and was elected as one of the early members of Aosdána.

Ó Tuairisc is buried in Creagh Cemetery, next to his first wife, the painter Una Watters (d. 1965), whose work has recently been revived. An exhibition of her work was held at the United Arts Club in Dublin earlier this year.

Ó Tuairisc is survived by his second wife, Rita Kelly, herself a bilingual poet and writer of note, brought up in Clontuskert and Brackernagh, who is the rights holder to all his work. Her support for and editorial input to this translation of An Lomnochtán was invaluable, according to publisher Bridget Farrell of Bullaun Press.

further on down the line in her career.

"I've taken part in some great productions down through the years. The Little Mermaid, Elf the Musical, Oliver, Evita, Steel Magnolias, Sunshine on Leith, American Idiot, have been some of my favourites. The thrill of live performing is like no other. You get one chance to live the moment! It's electric and there is nothing like the feeling when the curtain comes down" she added.



Damian Mac Con Uladh, our Corinthian Correspondent, awoke me to the Bloomsday connection to our fair town and indeed one of its prominent public worship buildings as well as the Holles Street National Maternity Hospital some years ago.

Bloomsday (16th of June when James Joyce first met his lover and wife - Galway based Nora Barnacle) whilst celebrated the world over, has muted acclaim in town even though the web of time and 117 years has brought us back full circle to the plot of Ulvsess (celebrating it's centenary year of publication) and the romantic wanderings around Dublin of the protagonist -Leopold Bloom.

For those unfamiliar with the novel "Oxen of the Sun" chapter 14 of Ulysses, mentions a Dr "Horne" no less than ten times. That refers to Sir Andrew J. Horne, who was born in 1856 in Ballinasloe, the son of Junius and Frances Horne of Society Street, who owned a number of buildings on the street, from the old Convent secondary school at No 2 (where they probably lived. Dr Rossitor later lived there) up to what was McCullagh's at No 5.

Horne was the founder and first Joint Catholic Master of the National Maternity Hospital in Holles Street. He studied medicine

in Dublin and Vienna, was joint Master for 30 years, he was active in the Foundation of the Women's National Health Association as well as the Society For The Prevention of Cruelty To Children. He became President of the Royal College of Physcians in 1907 and died in 1924.


It is suggested that Horne represents Helios, the Greek sun god, and also oxen (Horne=horn).

Playing around with his name, Joyce wrote: "Send us bright one, light one, Horhorn, quickening and wombfruit." Referring to the hospital, Joyce continued: "Of that house A. Horne is lord. Seventy beds keeps he there, teeming mothers are wont that they lie for to thole and bring forth bairns hale so God's angel to Mary quoth. Watchers tway there walk, white sisters in ward sleepless. Smarts they still, sickness soothing: in twelve moons thrice an hundred. Truest bedthanes they twain are, for Horne holding wariest ward."

In 1915, Horne had a stained glass window erected in memory of his parents in St. Michael's Church, which also contains windows erected by his father, Junius who died in 1907.

We published a snippet on the Facebook page last summer and I got a call from an (former Portnick based Horne) inlaw who thought I might be interested in meeting a descendant of the Hornes - the Great Grandaughter of Junius and Grandaughter of Andrew - Margret - a sprightly ninety something year old - still living a fiercely independent life in south Dublin in the Horne residence.

The appointment was arranged and I over stayed my welcome by some 2 hours - she was utterly engaging - she had unique memories of her childhood before the war and her father's recollections of visits to Ballinasloe. The sitting room and dining room walls were bedecked with photos and souvenirs



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

of her family tree - and she showed me wonderful scrap books of picnics at Garbally's 40 steps, Clonfert Cathedral, The River Suck in the thirties and forties.

Margret's father Andrew, like his father born in Society St (who gave his residence to the Sisters of Mercy for their School) - studied medicine in Trinity and when the bugles sounded in 1914 he volunteered for service with Royal Army Medical Corps. He served with distinction and his photographs and watercolour sketches of his time on the front and tending to the wounded are fascinating. As a Lieutenant he was one of the very last cohort of officers with the wounded evacuated from Gallipoli.

The story of the fledging state and the Catholic natives finding their way through education and sacrifice sometimes with huge support from the church and betimes frustrated by the same institution is etched into this

> family's tree. Andrew eventually became Assistant Master of Holles St. and was married to Delia Moclair it's first ever assistant female Master!

> Margret herself studied and trained for Almoning (modern day Social Services) she was the Chief Almoner to the Adelaide & Meath Hospital and was a pioneering voice in the early days of getting social workers accepted into the trade union movement. She also served in a variety of Catholic third world lav missionary activities. A connection

with Sean McBride (who famously was nearly killed in a road accident and nursed back to life by the FMDM sisters in Portiuncula and became Chair of the Board of Trustees) saw her develop a friendship with Monsignor Louis Page. Sadly she was one his last visitors to Arus Vianney before he died in 1999

The erudite, loquacious and very hospitable Margret was able last summer to get about to visit her since deceased twin sister, attend her religious duties - as a car driver but railed at the injustice of

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In his probing assessment as to why our community may have witnessed sectarian outrages 100 years ago this is the second and final part of a moment in our collective history that does cause some shame and discomfort.

"The East Galway Democrat" published the following letter from Andrew Staunton, Chairman of the Urban Council, on 22nd April:

- "I desire to bring under the notice of the Public the following:
- (1) The failure of non-Catholics in Ballinasloe and District to take any action in connection with the atrocities in Belfast.
- (2) No protest has been made by this section although other parts of Ireland have done so.
- (3) The non-Catholics here as in other parts of Ireland are amongst the most prosperous in the community.
- (4) Although a Conference has been held by the three Governments and certain recommendations made, no effective steps, as far as the Northern and English Governments are concerned, have been taken to honour the agreement arrived at.

(5) It is time a Conference of the leading people of Southern Ireland was held with a view to making an exchange of the Catholic workers of Belfast for some of the large non-Catholic landowners and businessmen, or as an alternative, that families be migrated from Belfast and billeted on non-Catholic families outside the Six County Area, as this seems to be the only remedy to avoid the possible extinction of the Northern Catholics."

One can only guess at what the writer hoped to achieve by the publication of this letter, but its effect must certainly have been to exacerbate sectarian tensions locally. He was wrong, though, in assuming that the Protestant community in Ballinasloe was indifferent to the situation in the North, for on the same page of the paper a news item appeared headed SOUTHERN PROTESTANT APPEAL: "We are informed that the Southern



Protestant Appeal reached Ballinasloe on Thursday evening for signatures, and already some have been affixed by the local Protestants. By Saturday it is hoped to have the Appeal completed and returned to headquarters." The text of the Appeal read as follows:

"We, whose signatures are here appended, being Protestant residents of Southern Ireland, desire to express our abhorrence of sectional bitterness manifesting itself in acts of violence. We earnestly hope that recent horrible reprisals, culminating in the killing of children, will make it clear that citizens of all creeds and classes must unite in a most determined effort to secure peace.

"We most earnestly represent to our follow-Protestants, as well in Southern Ireland as in the Six Counties, that all their



influence should be used to secure the greatest possible means of agreement and co-operation between all sections of Irish citizens.

"We further desire, as members of religious minorities in Southern Ireland, to put on record that the South of Ireland has been notably free from sectarian violence, and that in our opinion it is only by the maintenance of friendly relations between members of the different religious bodies that the future happiness and prosperity of the country can be assured."

In addition, on 13th May a letter appeared in "The Democrat" from Rev. Samuel J. Narney, Methodist Minister of Ballinasloe:

"With reference to the Southern Protestant Appeal which has been circulated amongst the ministers and people of our Protestant communities, and which expressed abhorrence at all sectarian bitterness, I wish to point out that I submitted the document to every available member of my congregation with others, and in no case was a signature refused. Our Methodist people here bear willing testament to the goodwill and support of our Roman Catholic fellowcitizens, for many of whom, personally, I have the utmost respect and esteem. As a community we wish to live as Christians first and foremost, imbued with the spirit of love towards all, enjoined by Our Blessed Lord, claiming only the liberty to exercise our faith and free citizenship, and holding ourselves aloof from mere party politics. We have had special services of intercession for the peace of our beloved land, and in every way have sought to contribute our quota to the peace and prosperity of the town and district in which our lot is cast. I may also add that it is proposed to send a Methodist representative from the town to convey our candid sympathy with the sentiments of those Southern Protestants who have this evening convened a meeting in the Mansion House, Dublin, for the purpose of bearing witness to the spirit of goodwill and tolerance

hitherto general in the South and West of Ireland. To this spirit I, as a much-travelled Methodist Minister, can bear hearty testimony."

The same edition of the paper reported that the Select Vestry of Creagh Church of Ireland Union passed a resolution on 11th May to the effect that "we abhor and condemn as most unchristian and uncivilized the murders and outrages which have been committed upon men, women and children, as a result of sectarian hatred, as well as the forcible depriving of any Irish citizen of his means of livelihood because of his conscientious opinions."

While nobody claimed responsibility or was ever brought before a court of justice for the campaign of intimidation in Ballinasloe, it was common knowledge that the Executive (Anti-Treaty) forces were the culprits. This faction of the I.R.A. remained dominant locally until challenged by the arrival of a 50-strong company of GHQ (Pro-Treaty) troops to occupy Garbally Court on 14th

Though there were many instances of attacks on Southern Protestants during the period in question, these were mostly confined to the countryside.

Ballinasloe seems to have been the worst urban area for this activity. It is scarcely without significance that, whereas the Protestant population of the Twenty-Six Counties fell by 34 per cent between 1911 and 1926, locally the decline was 50 per cent.

How did Ballinasloe achieve this unenviable distinction for sectarian intolerance? A number of factors were at play here. Firstly, the practice of Presbyterian-owned businesses employing their co-religionists from Ulster rather than recruiting locally was a cause of resentment. Secondly, there was a total absence of responsible leadership, military, political and religious, at a local level. Neither Ada English T.D. (Anti-Treaty) nor Patrick Hogan T.D. (Pro-Treaty) is on record for a statement on the situation. The Urban Council was similarly tight-lipped, as was Fr. John Madden, Administrator of the parish, who became preoccupied with the moral issue posed by girls from the town visiting Garbally Court after dark to consort with the Free State soldiers billeted there. No attempt was made to rally the majority community of the district in support of their Protestant neighbours. Thirdly, the local I.R.A. had failed to cover themselves in glory by their martial prowess during the War of Independence. When the opportunity presented itself, targeting with impunity defenceless Protestants and ex-policemen provided a welcome release of pent-up energies.

Until the work of the late Peter Hart began to appear over the past two decades, historians of the period generally ignored the more vicious manifestations of sectarianism in the early days of the Free State. An egregious example of the air-brushing out of unpalatable facts can be found on page 293 of Fr. P.K. Egan's "The Parish of Ballinasloe" published in 1960, where he writes: "In the Ulster pogroms, carried out by Orange mobs, following the establishment of the Northern Ireland parliament by Lloyd George's 'partition act', many Catholics were killed, and greater numbers were driven from their homes. Fearing reprisals a few Protestant businessmen left Ballinasloe and retired to the North, but those who remained were not molested."

Egan, who was regarded as a serious historian, came to Ballinasloe as a curate in 1938 when many parishioners must still have had a clear recollection of the events of 16 years previously, and he was known to have conducted extensive local interviews in the course of his research. It strains credulity that he could have been unaware of what really happened in the town in 1922!

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Because of the Civil War in Ireland, one hundred years ago, the All-Ireland Football Final was not played until 7th October 1923 which saw Dublin defeat Galway by 6 points to 4.

The Westerners featured eleven Ballinasloe men in their lineout, backed up by one from Loughrea, two from Dunmore and one from Mountbellew. However the road to Croke Park was not easy as the Connacht championship did not commence until 6th May of 1923 and saw two objections being successful. The Connacht final saw Sligo beat Galway by 3-2 to 1-7 but Galway lodged an objection over a controversial goal and in a re-fixed Connacht final the men in maroon beat the Yeats county by 2-4

to 1-5, in Croke Park.

A week later, Galway faced Dublin in the All-Ireland final with Willie Flanagan replacing Frank Benson in goal, and introducing Paddy Kilroy from Caltra and Harry Cunningham (Mountbellew). A young man who played his way onto the Galway team that day was Patrick Jennings, a native of Kilbannon, Tuam, who was ordained a priest seven years later and was PP in Killererin for 17 years until his death in 1981.

Society - serving as an Office holder for a number of seasons.

She was gentle, courteous, fun loving and generous to a fault.

In her professional life she was helpful, thorough and had a huge attention to detail. She went over and beyond duty to any client. She established her own private accountancy and audit practice in the last decade and was the first Auditor to the Ballinasloe Town Hall Theatre CLG - guiding the financial prudent management of the early years of the company through Charity formation days. All her private and public clients will testify to her dedication

and professionalism.

Few will remember her passion for sport of her pre marriage days apart from the usual Roscommon and Pearses supporting moments but when her children took up soccer and indeed camogie – she threw herself into the support of them on the field and Clubs that encouraged their talents with huge vigour and typical 100% commitment. Town AFC and Pearses Camogie Clubs were both blessed with her support and enthusiasm.

Claire was a very active member of those club through the years and always there to help out – whether it was trips to Halewood or Club Rossie All-Ireland Final Preps.

In latter yearws, as the cliff face she was facing grew taller and her own options for fun became limited, she would light up with the retelling of exploits or just activities and key educational moments of her three chicks!

Claire will be missed by us all. Our community's cultural and sporting fields have lost a huge enabler, participant and encourager. Our loss is a drop in the ocean to the void in her loving family - Our thoughts and deepest sympathies are with James, Jake, Ciaran, Aiveen and all of the Curley & Guinan families at this very difficult time.

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Aughrim lost one of its beloved teachers and community activists with the recent passing of Jo Scannell O'Sullivan (formerly Ward).

The former primary school Principal and local heritage and history devotee, began her teaching career in the early 1950s, having briefly served in both Ballinasloe and Kiltormer, settled permanently in her native Aughrim for another 43 years. She

was appointed Principal in St Catherine's Aughrim, for the last 8 years of her career.

Jo began her studies to be a primary school teacher at Mary Immaculate College, Limerick during the late 1940s. During this time and beyond, the marriage ban was in place, and Jo had decided that such was her vocation to teaching that she would forego any ideations towards marriage. Thankfully, however, the ban was lifted and Jo married Garda Detective Tony O'Sullivan, having three children, Eoin (deceased) Shane and Sinead, where they settled in Aughrim and which allowed Jo to be involved and immerse herself not only in the school, which she always loved, but in the community at large. In later years after Tony passed away, Jo remarried Ballinasloe native Liam Scannell, a retired garda.

She was very interested in local history and was a very active member

of the Aughrim Heritage committee which later evolved into the Development Committee. This group was instrumental in getting the Heritage Park in the centre of the village and the Interpretive Centre; a centre that educates on all aspects of the Battle of Aughrim, incorporating a museum and lecture space along with a café. Jo, herself, would have given some talks during the annual summer schools on the battle and she very much incorporated this epoch of history into her daily classes. She too, was a contributor and coeditor on a book that was published on the history of Aughrim in the late 1990s.

Jo's commitment to community life in Aughrim was further exemplified by the love she had of her local Church. This was recognised a number of years ago when she was awarded the Benemerenti Medal, or Papal Medal for over 50 years' service to the Church. For many years Jo prepared the readers schedule, the servers, sang in the choir and was a minister of the Eucharist along with preparing students for the sacraments.

After Jo retired, she totally enjoyed spending time in the company of her two granddaughters Alida and Sholah while always indulging in her passion for painting and true to form continued to help students, this time at Glebe National School with their art. Her love of heritage, the Irish language, art and music amongst other things form part of the great legacy she left behind to the village that she cherished.

It was fitting that many of her former pupils returned to form a guard of honour as their teacher's remains was brought through the village to its final resting place in the New Cemetery.

### BALLINASLOE MAN DIES IN NORTHAMPTON



John Brendan D'Arcy who passed away in Northampton, England was one of a family of twelve that grew up in Ballinasloe. He was born to Thomas and Janey D'Arcy on 29th April 1927, in the Market Square and in his late teens enlisted in the Irish army for the last few years of World War 2.

Like some of his late brothers, John worked in Ballinasloe's Top Quarries and also trained as a

carpenter before being "invited" to England in the 1950's to help with the rebuilding of London after the war. But living in dormitory type accommodation, as well as feeling homesick, was not what he expected.

However John persisted and became competent in many trades. He helped build Gatwick Airport in readiness for the Queen's opening, painted the lampposts and phone boxes on The Mall in preparation for Princess Margaret's wedding and still managed to work for Bryan Ferry and Roxy Music.

In 1974, John and his family moved to Northampton where he spent

many years working at the Ministry of Defence bases. This entitled him access to the inner sanctums of top security installations throughout England, something he was very proud of.

A great lover of Chelsea football, his love of country music, listening to Irish Radio and his love of his family were always his priority. But John never forgot his roots and on his 90th birthday he brought his entire family back to Ballinasloe for a gathering with his Irish relations. It proved to be a very nostalgic occasion, reuniting with his two remaining siblings, Nuala and Brian, as well as in-laws, cousins and friends.

Although still driving at 91 years, his health gradually deteriorated and the loss of his beloved wife was another blow. He then unfortunately contacted Covid in hospital and passed away just short of his 93rd birthday.

The family honoured their dad's wishes by bringing his ashes back to his hometown and following mass in St. Michael's Church, the funeral took place to the family plot in Creagh Cemetery. It would have been his 95th birthday. John D'Arcy is survived by his daughters Mary and Sandria, son Keith, brother Brian, sister Nuala and a very large extended family and friends.

After immigrating to Boston, he met the love of his life Peggy. They married in 1966 and set up life in Boston where





## **Ballinasloe History Walk**

- 1 Start at the statue known as *The Man with the Horse*, where Main Street joins St. Michael's Square. From the crossing near the statue, continue by turning right onto Main Street. The prosperity of Ballinasloe in Georgian times can be seen in the scale and classical style of the buildings here. A fine group of four frontages stand across from the statue of The Man with the Horse. With shops and pubs on the ground floor for the most part, these Main Street premises have several floors above.
- 2 Walking along Main Street, lift your eyes above the shop frontages for one of the town's characteristic sights. There are the Diocletian windows that grace several facades. They are from the years after 1805 when the 2nd Earl was in charge. A window of this sort is formed under a semi-circular arch with two upright divisions so that the whole opening is divided into three parts.
- 3 As you stand at the meeting point of Bridge Street and Main Street, you will see the Victorian frontage of a commercial premises, originally the Masonic Hall. Next to it stands a classical looking, beautifully-crafted, early 19th century stone house, currently a guest house. Beside these is a tall, fine stone-fronted classical mansion, which is now the Bank of Ireland. It was originally the town mansion of the Lord of all of Ballinasloe, the Earl of Clancarty. A friend of king George IV, the Earl was one of the architects of the resistance to the emperor Napoleon. It could be said that he was the person to whom most credit is due for the layout, growth and architectural character of Ballinasloe as we see it today.
- 4 At the end of Main Street, head along Bridge Street, then turn to the right to the pathway which runs to the riverscape where you can see channels flowing through the several arches of the long stone bridge over the river Suck, one of the town's most precious monuments. The Bridge has been in continuous use since the 16th century and its extension in 1754 prepared it structurally to carry even the heaviest juggernauts of today.
- 5 Walk through to the far end of the park; you will approach St Michael's Church (1852-58) that stands in a commanding position over the Square. Its architect was J.J. McCarthy, a follower of Augustus Pugin (famed for other Neo-Gothic churches in Ireland) and the design is said to have been revised by Pugin himself. Inside are many fine stained glass window. Of particular quality are those of St. Patrick and St. Rose of Lima, of 1925, by the renowned Dublin Stained glass artist, Harry Clarke and The Raising of the daughter of Jairus by Patrick Pollen, inserted in 1958.
- 6 From St. Michael's Church now walk up St. Michael's Square back towards the Man with the Horse Statue. Take a left into Dunlo Street, an important street in the history of the town, which contains, together with other buildings of about the same date, the late-Georgian Garda Station. The Station is towards the far end of the street, on the right hand side. Also on this street, over Dolan's Electrical Shop, you can see another fine example of Diocletian windows.
- 7 Halfway up Dunlo Street, turn right up Duggan Street, which will take you to St. John's Church (Church of Ireland, 1843). It dominates the vast Fair Green which becomes a hive of activity during one week every year when up to 100,000 people throng to the October fair. Look out over the Fair Green and admire one of the grandest freestanding classical monuments in the region. Dedicated to Charles Le Poer Trench, it was designed in the Neo-Greek style by the English architect George Papworth (1781-1855). A mile past this monument on the Main Galway road, South West of the town, the Earl of Clancarty's former country house is situated, where imposing gates mark the entrance to Garbally Court. It has been a school since 1923.

Walk down Church Hill onto Society Street and turn left, arriving at the Courthouse on the right. Society Street, like Main Street, was the 19th century location for the professional classes. As well as The Courthouse, it contains the former Bridewell (or gaol) from the 1840s. Further along this street, Ballinasloe Railway Station is a must. Constructed in 1851, it is a Neo-Gothic limestone tour-de-force and a fine example of the quality of rural Irish railway architecture in the mid-19th century.









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
