Welcome to Volume 12 issue 6

Hope Springs Eternal, welcome to the Spring edition.

Good news on Grant Aid, with nearly €700,000 investment locally since Christmas. New Cinema about to open, 160 plus new householders to get keys in a few months' time and planning permissions granted for some 60 new homes while awaiting decision on another 260. All this while there are over 4,400 of a workforce in our community and unemployment below 1,000 persons for the first time over 25 years.

It still upsets many of us that fellow human beings are being forced to lie in tents in Clare and those War Refugees who now arrive can just join the queues for food, shelter, free GP service, trolleys - even.

Upsetting more when we recall that just some decade ago the State had a functioning campus on the Eastern edge of our town that could accommodate some 1,500 patients in heated warm dorms and a nurses' accommodation block that could sleep up to 100. The State, our state, had the heat in these radiators and the glass in the windowpanes, with walls free of damp until a few short years ago but NO ONE is to take responsibility or to be blamed.

The same State, that after umpteen Commissions, into the neglect and abuse of the most vulnerable children in our Society, swore that this could never happen again, received an Interim report last month from the Inspector of Mental Health Services Dr Susan Finnerty, which highlighted the catastrophic failures of the STATE to support some of most neediest youngsters, those suffering (in this social media saturated

As we enter 2023, we are one of very few towns of this size that has two cranes on the horizon, one at the Hospital working on the new extension and a second one on the new housing development beside our local Tesco, adjacent to the new Cinema which is near completion.

These are just three of several new construction works ongoing around the town which augers well for the future with housing being the biggest concern in the current economic climate.

The expectation is that interest rates will peak in the first half of the year and inflation will recede quite quickly during the year reducing the chances of any major downturn in our Island economy.

Our experience in the development company is that start up new business continue to grow and the inflow of young families back into the catchment area still has momentum after Covid.

We hope to start renovation work on the property in Society Street in the next few weeks with completion by year end. It is hoped this will facilitate 35/40 new jobs in the Town Centre.

Along with the release from May onwards of the 165 social and affordable dwellings directly south of Tesco, many more residential schemes have been granted permission since Christmas.

Ballinasloe Municipal Council is finalising start of the part eight process at Dooley's Corner Dunlo Hill and expanding the St. Joseph's estate. Dunlo Hill will be refurbished, consisting of 15 dwellings at the with a mixture of 1 to 2 bedroom units and will be targeted for elderly people. St. Josephs estate is getting eight two-storey terraces with 2 bedroom units each designed for families.

Galway County Council has recently approved plans for 34 new dwellings along Church Road and in Kilgrave, Creagh beside Roscar. These private properties will be double storied ranging from 2 to 3 bed units, and from semi-detached to terrace housing. Included with this development will be road access to the R446, communal green space in the estates centre, bicycle parking areas, footpaths, public lighting, 77 parking spaces, and connections to the town's water facilities.

The original development was to consist of 36 housing but the planners removed two of the dwellings to provide additional communal space. The Council will also receive four of these properties in providing social and affordable housing in accordance to Part V planning law requirements. Additionally the contractors Leadlane LTD will pay €136,123 in development costs to maintain facilities within the area.

Planning was confirmed prior to December for 8 dwellings featured at Bachelor's Walk led by contractors Brian and Brenda Connolly. This development consisted of an infill project which will contribute to and finish the residential scheme on this estate. The eight detached houses will feature six four bedroom units and an additional two larger units.

In Portnick - Moycarn lapsed planning decision of 2014 but reactivated by the developer in 2019 for 16 detached two story dwellings and 10 semi-detached two stories - has less than a year to commence.

34 Houses have had their foundations poured in the Church St Social and first phase Affordable development, with An Bord Pleanála grappling with how many bungalows to allocate in the low density area of housing in Creagh.

Regarding the planning application put forward by Limehill Esker for 165 housing behind Tesco, there has been no official decision made from An Bord Pleanála which was due to be finalized last December. The planning application for this site was made by Limehill Esker which would include 106 apartments and duplexes, 27 three-bed terraced housing and 32-bed semi-detached with two-beds.

This will bring us to a total of 256 housing new units in the pipeline within our town, plus providing an availability for hundreds of people to live in Ballinasloe, with nearly 199 being built.

With a local housing need list in the MDC area of about 800 plus - it appears that nearly 50% could be accommodated with the 80% of new builds demised being for social and affordable housing.

REMEDICATION OF OLD LANDFILL TO START

Confirmation was provided from Galway County Council that a remediation project at the Poolboy Closed Landfill is starting. This plan foresees the old Municipal Landfill site remediated into an area of recreation for townspeople and visitors, and hopes to promote sustainable practises and environmental sustainability on the site.

Councillor Evelyn Parsons, a key promoter of this project, stated "There is no public park currently in town, a great omission locally for our people and it's clear that more amenities for recreation, children's play and leisure are needed, as well as remediation restoration and safeguarding our natural environment, and it may be an opportunity to also look at Climate Action and potential for community sustainable energy actions at this site."

Public consultation begins soon to explore the potential of this site, along with a draft tender for consultants to explore the feasibility of this scheme. Cllr Evelyn thanked her colleagues at the Ballinasloe Municipal Council and all local county members for their near unanimous support making this possible. "I am extremely keen to see it progress to public consultation and completion over the next few years" she concluded.



Municipal District Council members were fully briefed on new Council housing developments at St. Josephs and Dunlo Street at their recent monthly meeting.

After nearly 20 months of planning and scoping, where even bat colony issues had to be reviewed and considered the Galway County Council Executive have reached the point where they can begin the formal PART 8 planning process in constructing housing at these sites as part of an infill development project and Dunlo Hill Regeneration Project.

In essence the St Josephs construction project will finish out the estate tidily and sympathetically to its original ethos and the Dooleys Corner to the Mount will address a significant area of acute dereliction in the heart of the town.

The St Josephs Place development will cover a total area of roughly 0.8 acres consisting of eight two-storey terraces, each with two bedroom units suitable for families. An ideal location for infill, although reliefs are in place regarding flooding issues in the area. Director of Services for Housing, Liam Hanrahan mentioned that the land was owned by Galway County Council and discussed how these small properties were to fit with pre-existing developments at the site.

Cllr. Dermot Connolly emphasised that the "ethos of estate" must be maintained and that he hoped to replicate the success featured at Garbally Drive.

Mr. Hanrahan advised that the part 8 for St. Josephs will be brought before the members in early 2023.

The derelict buildings at the 1.8 acre site on Dunlo street, including seven two-storey dwellings, a three-storey over basement premises and another adjacent three storey building

consisting of a total 12-15 bedroom units, will be completely revamped.

This housing will likely be prioritized for elderly people with mobility issues on the town's housing waiting list to provide them convenient access to the town centre facilities.

On the insistence of Cllr. Dermot Connolly the external stone structure and architectural character to the building will be maintained and conserved, while the interior will be modified to allow accommodation units to be put in place. Director Liam Hanrahan hopes these refurbishments to the building will provide a more pleasant image for people entering into Ballinasloe West. Consideration was given to communal uses for the ground floor bar and shop but this proved too difficult.

Cllr Dr. Evelyn Parsons was also in favour of a memorial plaque or some other commemorative memorial be installed for Irish Bilingual poet Eoghan Ó Tuairisc at the site, who was a highly influential and internationally recognised author who was born and lived at the third house on the row.

Director Hanrahan advised that staff are waiting for the completion of some surveys and pending their arrival they will move to Part 8 as soon as possible.

The Technological University of the Shannon has opened a TUS Learning Gate at Ballinasloe Enterprise Centre. After years of government reports and plans seeking to have better third level engagement and opportunity in the town, this new innovate development allows full connect with the various TUS campuses across the island.

This connection builds on the many existing links to colleges to Ballinasloe including the University of Limerick, the University of Galway through Portiuncula Hospital, University College Cork and the National Paramedical College Campus also in the Ballinasloe Enterprise Centre.

The official launch took place at Ballinasloe Enterprise Centre before Christmas with many of our local representatives and members of the Ballinasloe Area Community Development in attendance, as well as representatives from TUS.

The event was commemorated with an unveiling of a "TUS Learning Gate" plaque by Chairman of the BACD Seamus Duffy and Dr Michael Tobin, Dean of Faculty of Continuing, Professional, Online and Distance Learning at TUS.

Lyn Donnelly, Manager of Ballinasloe Enterprise Centre, was delighted to partner with TUS on this project which offers locals

an alternative from travelling to the TUS campus in Athlone. "It also strengthens the ties between the University and the locale, ensuring this service that is available in several towns and villages across the midlands is now available to the Ballinasloe community, which will be of huge benefit" stated Lyn.

The 'TUS Learning Gate' was an idea proposed by Dr Michael Tobin, Dean of Faculty of Continuing, Professional, Online and Distance Learning, to provide TUS students and staff who participate in online courses a base location to study and learn together. While being able to study from home, the objective of this programme is to provide these students a comfortable meeting location to do their college work and to meet other students studying online.

The local Learning Gate hosts many online programmes provided by the Faculty of Continuing, Professional, Online and Distance Learning from the TUS Athlone Campus. There are numerous courses available, with 53 courses for anyone seeking a Level 7/6 degree, 58 courses for anyone seeking to do a Level 8 Honours Bachelor degree and 20 courses for anyone hoping to do a Level 9 Masters. 

Plans to transform the old Bank Chambers building on Society Street into a remote working hub was given a massive boost with the announcement of €250,000 from the Town and Village Renewal Scheme.

The project is being completed by BACD as an extension to their existing enterprise space in Creagh. Planning permission was granted during the summer and following public procurement guidelines, the project went out to tender via the government procurement website “etenders” in November 2022. Final negotiations with the winning tenderer are currently ongoing with works proposed to commence in the coming weeks.

This announcement is a very timely financial injection for the project. The fund is part of Ireland’s Rural Development Policy and is coordinated through Galway County Council and is in addition to the €490k already secured from the Just Transition Fund.

The project will see the 6,000 sq ft premises converted into a state of the art remote working hub catering for 40 plus

persons, including 6 hotdesks, 16 offices (1-7 Person capacity), 3 meeting spaces, 1 meeting room, canteen and Toilet/Shower Facilities within the 3 story building.

The works will include the installation of energy efficient lighting, heating and ventilation , installation on new internal and external doors and windows, internal partitions, floor and Ceiling finishes, full furniture fit out and high speed broadband installation.

Seamus Duffy, Chairman BACD states “once renovations are complete, it will offer flexible high quality serviced office space for local entrepreneurs to co-work, to meet and to collaborate with each other and will offer remote workers (currently working from home or in other locations) a long-term solution. It will attract people into the town centre which will have a positive spin off for our town centre businesses”.

Seamus also stated there is already huge interest by local businesses, entrepreneurs, and remote workers, whom have formally expressed an interest to being located in this innovative space when it is operational in early 2024, further details available from Lyn in BEC on 0909616516 or lyn@bacd.ie

Ahascragh Distillery's three Massive copper pot stills made their way from Forsyths in Scotland to Ahascragh, now sit behind the distillery's large window in the heart of the village.

Installation of the bespoke modern equipment is currently underway, with commissioning beginning in the coming weeks with plans for first distillation in early 2023.

These copper stills will enable founders Gareth and Michelle McAllister to distil some of the first zero-emission spirits in Ireland and change the traditional energy source for Irish whiskey production.

Ahascragh Distillery will be an all-electric distillery using 100% renewable energy, with 70% coming from wind farms and 30% generated on-site through solar panels and hydro wheels in the mill race.

Distillation is a highly energy intensive process, traditionally using fossil fuels or gas to generate the needed thermal loading. No fossil fuels or gas on will be burned on site, but instead will use high temperature heat pumps and an efficient energy storage system to produce their spirits. The technology and design has been validated and supported by the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland's EXEED programme, aimed at organisations who are planning an

energy efficient investment project.

Cáit Baxter has been introduced as Distillery Manager, coming from the team at Dingle Distillery, bringing a wealth of knowledge and experience to the role. She is looking forward to overseeing the commissioning process and leading the first distillation in the coming months.

A new series of short films "Distillery Diaries" explores Ahascragh distillery's journey to making whiskey history in the West of Ireland. The films have highlighted work by local contractors and tradesmen, key milestones, and behind the scenes features. The most recent film is a look back at the past 12 months of construction and progress with founders Gareth and Michelle McAllister.

In the fourth edition of the Distillery Diaries series, Michelle McAllister highlights her interest in restoring the Ahascragh warehouse: "When I first saw the building, I knew it had a story to tell. I knew that there was a lot more it had to give. I think we all rush to build new and forget about our past and forget about the beautiful structures that we have built in years gone by."

Last year, their whiskey and gin won many international awards including the International Wine and Spirits Competition, World Gin Awards, The Spirit Masters, The Design and Packaging Masters and The Irish Quality Food and Drink Awards. Most notably, their product Clan Colla 20 Pedro Ximénez won a gold medal at the Irish Whiskey Awards, and Xin Gin was named the best in Ireland at The Gin Guide Awards.

With Job signs up all over town and employers complaining how hard it is to fill posts locally and near, national full employment according to the CSO - it should come as no surprise to learn that the town now has probably more than 1,000 more people having their lunch break today than in the 90s when we had a manufacturing back bone of some 1,000 jobs

The figures are very encouraging and our survey reveals that approximately a 25% increase in jobs in the locale has happened since 2019 - three years ago when we first undertook the exercise.

The largest employer in the town is of course the HSE with about 1,126 across the three zones - Hospital, Health Centre and Mental Healthcare. Add in the other care centres, nursing homes and medical support firms and you have practically 1350 people employed in healthcare - over 30%.

The total 4,400 work force are split with some 400 in construction, another 500 in Hospitality / Food and others dotted about but Manufacturing is down to less than 350 jobs.

Unemployment is rising across Ireland, with Galway recording an increase of nearly 1500 people unemployed since December 2021. Ballinasloe has faced a minor rise in unemployment by 9 people since last year, with 935 currently out of work.

Our survey does not include the town's largest backbone of labour force, our farmers of the hinterland, but we may get to do some analysis on that when the new Census Returns emerge in April.

financial needs at all stages of their lives. “Our service ethos means that everything we do and the decisions we make in relation to how we provide our services are always for the benefit of our members. Sean is keen to stress the branch keeping up to date with modern pressures on people – “With the ongoing cost-of-living crisis, we need to remain accessible with affordable financial services to everyone in our community and we would urge those who might have previously relied on a doorstep lender, or those who might be tempted to borrow from unregulated lenders, to come and talk to us first” he urges.

Another way the Credit Union provide access to their members is through the online banking platform. Available on the website, ballinasloecreditunion.ie, or mobile app, members can join, save and borrow from the comfort of home. Whatever way, members choose to interact, they will find friendly, familiar and trusted staff who will always go the extra mile to help.

“People should consider joining the credit union because we are a community based financial co-operative that provides members with a real alternative to the traditional bank. We have been at the heart of Irish communities for over six decades operating under a set of principles that put members first. As well as a suite of loan products which includes mortgages, we also provide a Current Account & Debit Card service to credit union members or those wishing to switch their existing current account” suggests Sean.

The more personal community-based nature of credit unions gives a special role and makes it easy for people to deal with them. It’s not a coincidence that credit unions regularly feature at the top of customer experience polls. It reinforces their unique ethos of member focused service, understanding their needs at different stages of their lives and tailoring our service accordingly.

Looking forward to his new role Sean states “ It is our firm intention to continue to support our members through the delivery of value for money financial services, member service excellence, and a continued focus on supporting the wider community through our various sponsorships and social fund.”

The Town Team - Christmas Lights Committee were delighted this year to be able to hold a switch on ceremony... the first since 2018 and as expected a great crowd showed up on the evening and were entertained by DJ Ben Parker and performances from The Town Band, the Panto Dance troop, students from Scoil Mhuire Gan Smal (Creagh) and Scoil an Chroí Naofa.



Ballinasloe received an excellent result on the recent Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL) survey, being tied at 13th for cleanest town or city in Ireland and cleanest in County Galway. Six out of the ten sites examined received the highest grade of an A and, more significantly, there were no seriously littered areas.

The R348 Athenry Approach and R357 Roscommon Approach Road were highlighted for having a virtual absence of litter along both routes, although the pavement along the Athenry route was cracked in some areas.

The Famine Remembrance Park was commended for its mature trees, and open grass space but criticized for one bin considered old or damaged. Creagh National School and Kilgarve Gardens were complimented for their appearance and conditions. All these sites gained an A in the IBAL survey.

The La Poer Trench Monument, Ballinasloe Library and the Bring Facility received a B+, being praised for their presentation but marked down for the presence of some litter. The Main Street gained a B which was downgraded due to food and cigarette waste, however being congratulated for its positive condition regarding paving, bollards, markings, street bins and ornamental trees.

The outcome of this National Survey and Adjudicators reports was overall positive encouraging news for the town. An Taisce, the group who conducted these surveys for IBAL, stated that this was "an excellent result for Ballinasloe".

Much of this solid progress can be attributed the volunteers and indeed to Ballinasloe Municipal Council and their workers who have been active in maintaining to the town. Ballinasloe Tidy Towns Chair Tom Madden congratulated all who continue to help make it all happen.

"I wish to sincerely thank all volunteers, individuals who while out and about on walks volunteer with litter picks and report instances of litter blackspots to us. Members of residents' associations deserve great credit as they work tirelessly

keeping their estates and residential areas clean, tidy and well maintained. Galway County Council, Municipal District Area Workers and Support Staff - are to be applauded as well - Ballinasloe Friends of the Environment (a recently formed sub-group) that has hit the ground running last Autumn with a wild flower seed planting initiative in the Poolboy area. Ballinasloe Training for Employment is a local DSP Community Employment project, who in partnership with Ballinasloe Community Service Probation Project continues to provide expertise in ground maintenance and litter control in targeted areas of Ballinasloe and its environs" stated Tom.

The Tidy Towns are considering Monday, February 13th, @ 7pm for their AGM, but has yet to be finally decided. Additionally, the group hopes to organise clean-up Saturdays within the town, for Feb 11th & 25th, March 11th & 25th.

East Galway and Midlands Cancer Support Centre has just reviewed a very busy year of operation. They first opened Le Chéile, in Brackernagh a decade ago.

Some 40 trained Volunteers including house staff, complementary therapists, counsellors, support groups facilitators and more, were busy supporting just over 4,500 appointments and engagements to cancer patients and their families in 2022.

At their recent AGM supporters of the centre were informed that on average it costs €17,000 per month to provide the services. Costs are kept as low as possible as the centre does not receive Core funding from the HSE or any other official agency.

These costs are met from the generously donated fundraising, donations, and some grant applications.

All services are given to the clients free of charge which reduces the burden on them and their families. They are offered complementary therapies as well as counselling as they deal with their cancer treatment and beyond.

The current committee/board: Chairperson – Ciara Maples, Secretary – Ellen Egan, Treasurer – Brian Eccles, members Noel Gavin, Kevin Flynn gave a fulsome account for the charitable organisation's activities.

The outgoing Committee Chaired by Brian Eccles included Anna Mitchell, Noel Gavin and Martina Jennings.

The Team outlined their Plans for 2023 including

- Working with Medtronic on a seamless way of co-ordinating our Volunteer register, training, working time and events.
- Planning to raise funds for a new Hydrotherapy Pool.
- Enhancing Children's CLIMB programme (Children Lives Include Moments of Bravery).

- Upgrading bus for Radiotherapy Transport to/from Galway – (currently being purchased from Kilmartin's Ballinasloe).
- Increase sales through our online shop on Thriftify (thriftify.ie).
- HPV Vaccination Research- Europe.
- Continue to be involved in National Awareness Cancer Campaigns..
- Continue growing vegetables and flowers in the polytunnel and sensory garden.

Centre Director Jacqueline Daly outlined some of the new services that they will

be rolling out to the community in the coming months, involving a Post Mastectomy care clinic (bra fitting), Indian Head Massage, Face Reflexology, Meditation and Relaxation outdoors (Tynagh-Lyme Hill), Patient Advocacy-Cancer Patients Europe, European Cancer Organisation and European Association of Urology.

In order to keep this €200,000 plus per year support organisation on the road for the year ahead the Centre will naturally be involved in serious amounts of fundraising activities which will include, Move against cancer, Mack Hanson's fundraiser (Ireland and Connacht Rugby Player), Kayaking, Various Coffee Mornings and a Lough Ree Kayaking challenge by Maya Frost.

Jacqueline, and the Centre Manager Anna Obara, reminded everyone that new Volunteers/People can always help and are always needed for tasks such as Fundraising, Getting involved, Promotion of centre, seeking Corporate Sponsorship, Gardening/general maintenance, Office administration support, Driving the bus to/from Galway for Radiotherapy patients.

They thanked existing volunteers for their time, engagement and dedication.

I particularly enjoyed reading Phillip Pullman’s ‘His Dark Materials’, JK Rowlings ‘Harry Potter’ series and Tolkien’s ‘The Lord of the Rings’ series.”

At the minute she is loving Patrick Rothfuss ‘The Kingkiller Chronicles’ and not-so patiently awaiting the third installment! “I’m also a big fan of audio books, I love how the narrators can bring the text to life. I find it’s a great way to consume literature, especially when you are busy doing hands on things. With your library membership you can login to BorrowBox and have access to loads of free audiobooks and ebooks” she enthuses.

“I love the endless possibilities that Libraries contain. I don’t think you can ever be bored if you can make, create or read. I love that Ballinasloe Library hosts book launches, readings, art exhibitions and talks covering very broad subject matters. I am hoping to use my previous experience of hosting art workshops, and my love of books and writing to foster creativity in our local young people. Ballinasloe is a very talented and creative community, and I’m excited to work with individuals and groups on their upcoming exhibitions and events“ encourages Zara. If anyone has ideas for events or things they would like to see, please do pop in and meet her.

Zara remembers the Library it as the old convent and going to confessions/mass in the adjoining church! “The building is now bright, with loads of natural light flooding it and its well-spaced out. The Church Gallery is my favourite part of the building, with its beautiful, vibrant stained-glass windows. It’s a lovely calm space for exhibitions, readings and talks. We also have lovely spaces dotted around the library that are great nooks for reading a newspaper, studying or just chilling out”, she explains.

With your library membership there is a whole host of online resources available to you for free. Including access to eMagazines, eLearning and language classes and online newspapers. You can also come in and use the PCs to research your family tree!

At the moment her free time has been taken up with crafting. However, they are in the planning stage of our new theme for Group 8’s annual exhibition. She hopes to spend more time this year reading and writing.

As to the best kept secret of the library she is clear – “ In November 2022 we launched the Open Library allowing patrons access during unstaffed hours. After completing a short induction, patrons will be able to come into the library from 8am – 10pm, 7 days a week. Patrons will be able to check out and return books, use the PCs and printing facilities. I think this is great for those who, our regular hours don’t suit or even those looking for a place to study in the evenings or weekend”, states Zara.

Ballinasloe Social Services received a grant of €80,000 as part of a new Community Centre's Fund founded by Minister Heather Humphreys T.D., a key focus in government strategy to invest in community centres and halls across Galway.

The Social Services hope to use this funding to install new solar panels, windows and doors, an electrical system, a stove, and an

upgrade to their meeting rooms. These improvements will be installed on the premises within the old building and the new extension constructed in 1986.

This exchequer funding will aid the 50 year old organization to reduce heavy utility costs, allowing them to invest in services which aid the elderly and vulnerable.

As the organization only receives partial grant funding by the government, this new allocation will also benefit the ongoing costs for running the services. Additionally, the team hope to upgrade the pre-school garden on the premises, having received a grant of €30,324 from the Late Late Toy Appeal in 2021 to improve the quality and safety of the play area.

Ballinasloe Social Services are a group dedicated to improve the lives of the elderly, physically disabled and people in need within our town and hinterland.

The organization recently celebrated their 50th anniversary and hopes to continue supplying resources to aid their clients.

Volunteers assisting with the charity provide many of the services including regular day care, food deliveries through Meals on Wheels, and assistance for kids via the childcare facility. There has been an increased demand for aid within the town, with many people requiring social needs due to the isolation caused by the pandemic.

The group continues their ongoing fundraising with monthly raffles where participants can enter a draw to win amounts of €100. Critically, the organization received support from the Ballinasloe Enterprise Centre with a Christmas Jumper Appeal which raised €400 for Ballinasloe Social Services. Furthermore, the social service can be supported by their donation page at www.ballinasloesocialservices.ie.

Director of Services Teresa Coughlan is very appreciative of the aid provided to the group by our town: "Without the people of Ballinasloe, we wouldn't be here today. They have given so much to us over the years in the form of financial assistance with fundraising and donations, as well as with volunteers".

Acclaimed writer and poet Dr Rita Kelly has been appointed as the Irish Language Development Officer for Cumann Gaelach na hEaglaise (Irish Guild of the Church of Ireland). Widely known for her works in both Irish and English, she has also been involved in promoting and developing the Irish language across the country for the last 50 years, making many friends and connections through the celebration of the Irish language.

Locally reared Rita, first married in 1972 to Eugene Watters/ Eoghan Ó Tuairisc (1919-1982), is an accomplished bilingual poet and writer. Since 2015, she has been married to Edel Connolly, a former secondary school principal. A native of Galway and primarily associated with East Galway, she has also lived around Ireland along the River Barrow near Carlow and in Waterford, as well as abroad in Manhattan and Germany.

The former Ballinasloe woman now resides in Birr, County Offaly. This location is an ideal base to work with the Church of Ireland community across the country, North and South, as Development Officer responsible for promoting the Irish language.

Rita is active within the Birr

Group of Parishes. In 2022 she was commissioned as a Lay/ Parish reader and is also a member of the Birr Parish Select Vestry. This position allows Rita to bring together and connect people in speaking Irish, as members of the Church of Ireland do not often have this opportunity to worship in Irish. Rita and Cumann Gaelach both acknowledge the great work done by her predecessor, Caroline Nolan, first appointed in 2011.

Cumann Gaelach na hEaglaise was originally founded in 1914 to promote the rituals of the Celtic Church, to motivate the use of Irish within the congregation, to collect written devotional literature and sources, and to encourage the use of Irish art and music.

The Society organizes and supports regular Church Services throughout the country at various occasions, for example St Brigid's Day, St Patrick's Day and other feasts and festivals. Services are supported in Irish in Christchurch Cathedral, St Patrick's Cathedral Dublin, St Fin Barre's Cathedral Cork, Christchurch Cathedral Waterford. Cumann Gaelach hopes to continue the same support to parishes throughout the country in providing services in Irish.

This position of Development Officer is funded by Foras na Gaeilge. Rita hopes that people will contact her or Cumann Gaelach to support the promotion of the Irish language within the Church of Ireland community.

Ballinasloe Municipal Council held a civic reception for Aiden Sheridan, a local man who swam the length of the Shannon in support of the Irish Cancer charities. In attendance were local representatives Cllr Dr. Evelyn Parsons, Cllr Dermot Connolly, Cllr Peter Keaveney, Cllr Declan Geraghty, Cllr Michael Connolly, Cllr Timmy Broderick and Mr Liam Hanrahan who awarded Aiden Sheridan with a Galway Irish Crystal Plaque to honour his achievements.

It was the first time since COVID the Councillors were able to honour a citizen's significant achievement in this way.

Last July, Aiden swam the length of the Shannon starting at Dowra, Co Cavan finishing at Curraghgour Boat Club, Limerick - a total distance of 245 kilometres, which took 15 consecutive days to accomplish. Aiden raised over €50,000 for the Irish Cancer Society and East Galway and Midlands Cancer Support. He had previously lost his brother to cancer, and

his sister was diagnosed with breast cancer but has made a full recovery.

Cllr Dr. Evelyn Parsons paid tribute to the athlete, highlighting this enormous success, stating "It's a real achievement, more people have walked on the moon than have swam the length of the Shannon, and Aiden is now the sixth person to have swam Ireland's longest River Course". Additionally, she thanked the public for their great support, emphasizing our town's willingness to support a noble cause. In her remarks she pointed out that Ballinasloe and its wider community are always generous with their giving but seem increasingly so at Christmastime.

Aiden was shocked with his welcome at the civic reception, explaining that he felt "honoured to receive the award today from Ballinasloe and Evelyn, it's a real privilege to get it. Believe me, not many people receive them". Aiden then congratulated everyone who made this task possible: "I would like to thank all the team, all my family and my two kids, and everyone who supported 'Sheridan Swims the Shannon'".

The funds raised by this mammoth undertaking will go directly to providing a bus service for East Galway cancer patients to receive regular treatment appointments in Galway city.

Patricia is a Atticorry, Creagh native, with over fifteen years working as assistant supervisor within Ballinasloe Training for Employment. She has strong roots working with many community groups over the years, serving as secretary/treasurer for Ballinasloe Rugby Club as well as managing their under 18 and Inaugural Senior Women's Teams, she is currently a trustee with the club. She served for over seven years on the board of Ballinasloe Credit Union as a voluntary Director as well as being involved in other community groups and activity.

Patricia graduated from AIT Athlone with an honours degree in Business, Social Enterprise, leadership Management and Community Development and is IPass certified and has a Diploma in Training and

Education from NUIG and Training and Development from IITD.

Ballinasloe Training for Employment CLG is a Department of Social Protection scheme that was founded in the 1990's and is run by a voluntary board of directors. Its aim is to help unemployed people re-enter the workforce by offering relevant work experience of their career choice alongside bespoke certified training to help them upskill.

Participants are provided with useful on the job learning in a wide variety of areas including Reception, Administration, Accounts, Cleaning, Maintenance, IT/social media and Community Development, General Trades, Environmental and Pitch development. They typically provide work experience through postings with over sixteen community, not for profit and voluntary groups in the Ballinasloe Area who act as sponsors.

The Scheme aims to provide a welcoming environment to support, facilitate and encourage individuals to develop professionally and personally, through one-on-one person centred career planning.

Participants can identify their goals as well as their learning and training needs. As training is such an integral part of community employment, a dedicated training plan is in place for each participant supported by undertaking job related training.

They strive to give participants the skills and experience they need in order to progress to mainstream employment or further education depending on the overall goal of each participant and their background in life.

The scheme is not just for young school leavers, but in recent years has proved a valuable steppingstone for Mothers re-entering the workforce after some years with small children, other participants mid-career who have since COVID - re - evaluated what they wish to achieve or do next. Those who were laid off or those who may wish to try something very different. People returning to live in the West - who thought their working life was finished but in seeking part time hours locally, often use this scheme as a stepping stone to find a position they find worthwhile.

Portiuncula Hospital has appointed Leanne Norton as the new Bereavement Support Midwife for the hospital in providing support to women facing bereavement issues. Previously focusing on a career in Nursing, Leanne began to develop an interest in counselling with her experience working in St. James Hospital, Dublin. Gradually she evolved her skills as a midwife, working in the Midland Regional Hospital in Mullingar and the Rotunda in Dublin, eventually gaining her position in Portiuncula.

Athlone based Leanne is thrilled with the job, seeing it as a very important role. "I want to be able to provide my patients and their families with the compassionate, individualised and culturally sensitive support they need" explains Leanne.

The staff of Portiuncula embraced Leanne's initiation, with Director of Midwifery Deirdre Naughton and Hospital Manager James Keane welcoming her to the post. Deirdre specifically singled Leanne as: "a very passionate and caring member of staff who will work closely with her colleagues to ensure parents receive care which is clinically skilled, compassionate, consistent, kind and respectful."

Local Deputy Denis Naughten TD recently called on the Taoiseach to personally intervene at Portiuncula Hospital regarding capacity concerns. Currently with just 157 beds and a daily average of 22 patients, Portiuncula has an enormous demand for hospital wards being 40% greater than Limerick

University Hospital this winter.

In 2020, Denis previously wrote to the then Minister for Health highlighting the grave situation locally, and proposing that two separate buildings should be amalgamated to provide greater space for the emergency department at the hospital. Nevertheless the HSE has still not formally announced a decision to rectify issues at the premises within the last two years. A new 50 bed block is currently being built at the site, but Denis Naughten T.D. emphasised greater bed space capacity is still required for the growing demands on the hospital.

Lately the National Ambulance Service have begun to transfer non-urgent patients to Roscommon University Hospital. This protocol will aid Portiuncula and other emergency departments in the region. Denis Naughten, who proposed this idea, welcomed the news stating: "While this won't resolve the crisis in our local emergency departments, it will mean that patients will get access to more timely care which will allow them to be discharged from hospital far quicker".

On an unrelated note, a National Inpatient Experience Survey 2022 was conducted across many hospitals in Ireland, with Portiuncula scoring 82% patient satisfaction across 161 people questioned. Portiuncula was praised in this review for its cleanliness and for the assistance provided by staff, but was criticised for its poor provision of written or printed information. 

PUBLIC MEETING LEARNS OF DUGGAN PARK POTENTIAL



Joe Kelly Senior, a passionate GAA Tribesman and local supporter all his life, ran the GAA Supporters Shop in the Pre All-Ireland build up in Greenes' old shop in Society St. - raising significant sums for the County Football Board.

Joe set about highlighting the true potential of the Duggan Park

in a Winter Campaign, culminating in an open public meeting in Gullane's Hotel in early January attended by over 60 people, TDs, Senators and Councillors.

Chaired by Pdraig Lyons and briefed on the Heritage of the ground by Cllr. Declan Kelly (cousin of Joe), the meeting heard a summary outline of the type of development that the ground could accommodate if the stakeholders and key interests agreed on such a Masterplan.

Joe's Highlighting campaign drew heavily for support from a lot of players and officials of GAA past and present and indeed a great many ex pats who were involved in playing or coaching down through the years. Retired businessman Billy O Carroll and even Colm McLoughlin, Chair of the Duty Free in Dubai, among others wrote in support of Joe's future vision for the Duggan Park.

Following a whirlwind of media interviews and a statement from the Duggan Park Committee confirming that there "is a multiple staged plan in place for the development with full planning permission and €500,000 has been spent thus far on the early phases, done to an excellent standard by local contractors with the support of the previous Town Council for grants and sports capital grants. The work carried out is future proofing Duggan Park and is done on a budget". The County Board had some communications with Joe on foot of the meeting and outlined their views on how best they would proceed with the advancing of the plans over time for the Duggan.

Joe, after some 50 years of campaigning, decided that this project was his very last one as he is now fully confident that the Duggan Park will be developed over the next 3 years with the best County board he has ever seen. "I will now be supporting their efforts with fundraising and encourage everyone who engaged with me to do the same" stated Joe.

Following on from the launch of the Ballinasloe Area Tourism Network in April last year in conjunction with Hidden Heartlands, Waterways Ireland, The Western Development Commission, Galway Rural Development and Galway County Council Tourism Dept. - a steering group of local tourism and hospitality interests have been busy pursuing next steps.

Key to the Feasibility Plan is the strategic positioning of the town and the network from Ballyforan Bridge to Meelick Weir and from Aughrim Battlefield to Shannonbridge - as a touchstone town on the twin pillars of the Beara Breffni Way and the Shannon Erne Waterway.

With over €59 million of Tourism Investment coming to the Hidden Heartlands via the Just Transition Fund, the fledgling Grouping under the auspices of BACD are confident that with success and support - the town and its hinterland tourism network can position itself as an off grid slow tourism gem of the Hidden Heartlands.

Already becoming a "Bundoran of the Midlands" with last January's Mike Denver Dancing Weekend having every available room booked out in town for two nights - along with rooms in Loughrea and indeed Athlone - the town is gearing up for several busy attraction

weekends anchored around hotel based events with a huge weekend promised again in the Shearwater for the last weekend in March - first of April with the National Jiving Championships.

Attempting to build on the huge heritage and amenity work done by a variety of community and voluntary interests the group are with the active support of Hidden Heartlands, going to host an early season FAMM event for key personnel in the service and hospitality trade in an effort to grow an Ambassador Circle for East Galway and South Roscommon.

This will build out to a Taster Opening Season Weekend - scheduled for late May that will offer some key pillars of activity and theming to locals and visitors alike to grow awareness of all the opportunities that really do exist locally for people to be engaged with on a break.

The government have approved an additional increase of €5,000 for income threshold for people living in social housing in County Galway from €30,000 to €35,000. Senator Aisling Dolan welcomed this saying it's "good news for people living in Ballinasloe and across the county".

Individuals who receive/ earn an income up to the latest €35,000 figure are now eligible for State support.

Senator Dolan stated this will "be a huge benefit to people who are working and earning an income up to €35,000 and could be eligible for State support for housing. I know of young mothers and fathers working flexible hours in all types of sectors including catering, retail, healthcare to support their families and struggling with the rising cost of living."

These social housing thresholds are based upon net income for a single person. There is an increased 5% to the €35,000 limit for every adult living in the social housing to a maximum of two additional members, and an increase of 2.5% for every child within the premises.

The Local Authority Affordable Purchase Scheme helps people on low to moderate incomes buy homes at reduced prices. The local authority takes a percentage stake in your home that covers the reduction in price. So, if you buy the home at a 20% discount the local authority will have a 20% stake in your home. If you want, you can buy back the local authority's stake at any time, but you don't have to. This scheme is aimed at first-time buyers, but there are some exceptions to this.

With over 30% of 300 new builds coming on stream to town in the next 24 months – deemed Affordable workers and families should be assessing their options.

To be eligible your income must be within the stated threshold, you must not have previously owned a residence unless the dwelling was lost due to bankruptcy, and furthermore the Council will assess your need for this housing within 12 weeks of the application.

To qualify for the scheme:

Your income must be below a certain level. This is calculated by multiplying your gross annual income by 3.5. This figure is known as your 'purchasing power' and it must then be less than 85.5% of the market value of the affordable home.

OR

You must have proof from a bank or financial institution that you cannot get a mortgage for 85.5% of the market value of the home

If are interested in purchasing an affordable home, you can search for any available properties on the Galway County Council website or within local housing listings online. To register, you can request an application form to the Council which can be filled out and send back along with photo identification, a proof of address and a proof of income.

Additionally, if you are renting a property registered under PRTB, you can now apply for a €500 Rent Tax Credit for 2022 and 2023 to a total of €1000, which can be requested on revenue.ie.

The Ballinasloe Says No committee welcomed news from Galway County Council that permission has lapsed for the Poolboy Waste Facility, along with no further petition or extension requested by the applicant. Originally validated by Galway County Council, approval for development on the site by way of licence has now been deactivated.

Ballinasloe Says No is a community group who have challenged the granting of permits to operate a station at an inappropriate location in Poolboy. The activists, along with the public in Ballinasloe, have submitted over 2000 objections due to safety and environmental concerns regarding this facility polluting the town.

Chairperson of the committee Dr. Vincent Parsons welcomed the news and congratulated the group on their achievement. "Major health hazards would result from these types of major waste facilities such as noxious gases, dust, insects and vermin as well as pollution of waterways and environment. As part of Ballinasloe Says No we have fought against this inappropriate location and we have taken this to the High Court and won" he stated.

President of the group, Eamon O'Donoghue, was pleased with the confirmation saying: "This is wonderful news for the residents of town. We have highlighted the health and environmental challenges of a waste transfer station in this location as well as the road hazards of large waste trucks coming through the streets of our locality".

Senator Aisling Dolan, who is the Co-Founder, Secretary and PRO for the committee, stressed the significant action taken by the activists in preventing the development of this waste transfer station: "We have a great group with a huge commitment who have campaigned and fundraised over the

past 5 years. Together with Chairperson Vincent Parsons and Eamon O'Donoghue, we have won three times in the High Court challenging permits for the waste transfer station. We would like to thank the legal team of solicitors and barristers as well as people who became part of our legal group and put their names on the line for Ballinasloe now and in 1999."

Councillor Evelyn Parsons emphasised that proposed development at the Poolboy Waste Transfer Station was against the current Ballinasloe Local Area Plan, and was delighted that her proposal for a remediation strategy at the facility will be included with the draft County Development Plan.

Cllr Parsons is a staunch environmentalist and member of the Climate Change and Biodiversity Strategic Policy Committee (SPC), having raised ecological concerns on various occasions. "Throughout the CDP process I've championed the guiding principle of environmental justice for fair distribution of environmental benefits and burdens to enable communities such as ours equitable opportunities to prosper within the county in terms of environment, quality of life, health and future economic growth opportunities including attracting investment and sustainable tourism" she stated.

It remains to be seen if the appellant will pursue other avenues to achieve his stated commercial objectives but the group are remaining vehement and vigilant.



Gerry Sweeney, who has been a member of the Committee and Director of the Company to the Building since its formation, stepped down. He was the last serving original member of the original group that acquired the lease from the Church Authorities which has 23 years left to run.

Chair noted his experience and expertise will be greatly missed. His wealth of knowledge on the history of the Hall is second to none, and all congratulated him on his service.

Máire Hughes detailed all of the incredible work undertaken by the Committee over the course of the year: 17 official meetings were held, fundraising events took place, grant aid was secured, much was achieved within the Hall. The Theatre was host to many productions, dance classes, cinema screenings, recordings and various rehearsals throughout the year, culminating with the very successful PANTO “Cinderella” production last December.

Much work went into the clearing and refurbishment of office

spaces to the front of the

building with particular gratitude being paid to Gerry Maloney and members of the CE Scheme for their involvement. This reorganisation allowed the group to rent office space from July to December. There are still several rooms available for short- and medium-term rental and anyone interested can contact Michael McCullagh at (090) 964 9939.

Accountant James Coyle gave a detailed overview of the Theatre’s finances, detailing all income and expenditure. He highlighted that the figures shared covered the accounting year March 2021 to March 2022, resulting in a net surplus of over €9k which was up from a deficit of €4k for the previous 12 months. He emphasised the finances were in a good position showing income at €50,249 and Expenses at €38,909 considering that the Theatre was restricted with the pandemic.

The Community Centres Investment Fund application was successful just before Christmas, and the Theatre is to be awarded a total of €251,900 in funding. Earmarked to replace all existing windows with double glazed sash windows, replace the doors and repair a portion of the stonework. In addition a portion of this grant will be used to update the Theatre’s lighting system to modern LEDs. The Committee confirmed that a Project Manager would be engaged to oversee this huge investment in the future fabric of the building – as it is the largest successful grant ever awarded to the ongoing development.

As part of a matched funding element to this grant, they will be launching their “Buy a Pane of Glass” campaign in the coming weeks to raise the necessary finances. - keep an eye out for this and consider donating.

Sympathies were expressed at the meeting to the families of the late Clare Curley and Eugene Ward – who were stalwart supporters of the Theatre.

“We’d like to thanks the townspeople who continue to support us, Linda Cummins and Tus, Patricia Kelly and Karyn Gavin in GRD, Mary McGann and indeed Sharon Duffy, Arts Officer at Galway County Council, as well all of our wonderful hard working volunteers“ concluded Máire.

Peter Cleary is a returned local artist, living in Bridge Street, who is working solidly in his art studio.

Raised in Cleaghmore, with a brother Brian (Dubai), Katie (Dublin), Eimear (Belfast) by parents John and Anne, who now reside in Beechlawn, he was inspired by the drawings and work of his art teacher Sandra Madden as a Garbally student. The mentoring saw him choose Limerick School of Art and Design (LSAD) as his third level calling.

Peter had a unique and fulfilling experience attending LSAD, with the work provided at the school being a good fit for him. The course provided him an early opportunity to toil with a diverse pallet of materials including copper, stone and wood, stimulating his creativity and inspired his later work with printmaking. Peter praised the Limerick school, saying it was “an environment that both encouraged the student and also ably assisted in their development as emerging artists.”

Peter has travelled Europe to develop this skill, featuring his pieces in many exhibits around the world and winning numerous awards for his work – as well as being profiled recently by the Sunday Independent.

The Art student travelled the world, experiencing the nature and landscapes of California, Dresden and Bergen which now manifest in his work. Peter undertook a Master’s Degree in the Bergen Academy of Art and Design, Norway, with the culture of the country and the paintings created by

his former professor having a significant impact on his creative imagination. During his travels he met his partner Lisa-Marie from Hamburg, Germany, with the pair marrying last year in Copenhagen.

Now back in town, in his bespoke studio which provides him flexibility of creating his projects at his own working pattern. For his pieces, Peter returns to the idyllic places he visited in his travels, painting all the details he remembered from these trips. Additionally, the artist takes great influence from his locality in his creations: “the River Suck, the expansive boglands and the woods in Garbally are places that formed my early encounters with Irish Landscape” he explains for context and backdrop for his work.

Peter is now preparing s a solo show which will display the many paintings he produced. He hopes to display his work in Hillsboro Fine Arts Dublin, an acclaimed contemporary gallery which is recognised internationally.

Two paintings of the artist were exhibited this year in the gallery, with both receiving excellent feedback and were sold to art collectors.

A follow-up archeology talk hosted by Fiona Maguire will be presented at the Library this February, with Fiona highlighting discoveries found during the “Big Dig” in town.

After the success of the first “Big Dig” talk, local archeologist of Atlantic Archaeology Fiona will return to reveal more insights in various artefacts found in Ballinasloe over the years. The “Big Dig” project, a major town enhancement project carried out in the principle streets of the town revealed many of these artefacts, including most notably the discovery of a rare set of rosary beads estimated to be around 500 years old. Additionally, the discoveries found in the great fort of Dún Leo, a medieval well and two cemeteries found just below street level have provided the content and inspiration for this presentation.

Now for the second round of this seminar, Fiona will take another look at these discoveries and elaborate on the artefacts found, which will also provide an opportunity for library visitors to view the artefacts from this and first seminar. The talk will take place on Saturday February 11 at 14:30, the event is free of charge and no bookings are required.

The Library will also feature various other events throughout February, local artist Sarah Loughnane will be displaying her newest art collection, with each piece highlighting a moment in her life.

The exhibition will feature numerous abstract and beautiful acrylic paintings, each using unique painting methods and styles. The collection will involve new, previously unreleased artworks and all are welcome to visit. The exhibit will start on February 2 and will end on February 28, and Sarah herself will be present at the exhibit on February 18. If you would like to see more of Sarah’s art, she uploads many of her pieces on her Facebook and Instagram @sloughartistry.

Lately at the Library, another art exhibition was staged “We See You, We Hear You” by COPE Galway, spreading awareness surrounding domestic violence against women. Featuring seven podiums, six displaying plaster heads made by artist

Maura Finnegan with each depicting women of diverse ages and ethnicities. Included with the sculptures were QR codes which featured audio recordings of anonymous women sharing their experiences of domestic abuse. One podium was left empty, representing women who lost their lives to this violence.

COPE Galway Domestic Abuse Service provides support to women and children who are either experiencing or have experienced domestic violence. First opened in 1981, the organisation has helped over 12,000 women and children through their one-to-one and group supports, their 24-hour helpline, refuge accommodation, their outreach service across the county and their training services. Her Dad-Poolboy's Ritchie Darcy, was a gifted all round athlete in his youth-Community Games, hurling, football, rugby but especially in boxing-he made his mark.

Growing up with parents Betty and Paddy, he remembers the new boxing club arriving to town after the Polish Pontiff's visit and the long evenings in the top floor of the Emerald. "I was only 9 when I started and we had some wonderfully committed coaches-the late Tom Watters, Buddy Donnellan and of course Frankie Walsh" he recalls.

They might have been influential but they had material to work with-the 57kg youngster won 3 consecutive Connacht and National Titles in the mid-80s.

Ritchie left Garbally after his formal education, went to the UK for a few years and came back some 30 years ago to purchase and operate a bar-Dicey Reillys in the neighbouring town of Gort in 1993. He brought his wife Dawn with him and they reared a family of three-Cian 29, Darragh 25 and of course Cliona 17.

The former champ threw himself into the business and rearing his kids but in 2004 James Fahey of Peterswell and a few others in the South Galway hinterland came together and founded the Tobair Pheadair Boxing Club.

He became a volunteer, mentor and then coach and got his two eldest lads interested in the sport. Within a few short seasons he was ferrying them along with other members to different tournaments and sparing events with a newfound toddler baby sister in tow.

"I grew up in the back of the car or around a boxing ring or gyms, following Dad, Cian and Darragh all around the West and Mid West" laughs the current World Youth Champion Cliona.

The two lads were nearing the end of national school or starting secondary and before they knew it Darragh had won County and Connacht Titles and an Irish Championship.

While Ritchie might have taken a break from the sport for over 20 years, some of the tricks he was taught in the Emerald in the 80s came in handy as Cliona had no formal training, sparing or coaching for most of the two years of COVID. During the lockdowns it was just her and her Dad as coach, mentor and

sparring partner.

Early days were Pure Mule she recalls. "There was just me and Sophie Burke-two girls out of 50 lads, 3 club night training sessions a week, all the running, sprints and sparing,with the boys and of course our coach Ronan Kelly."

To put her achievements in context there are just four boxing clubs in Galway county and there are very few female boxers, Cliona regularly has to go to Castlebar for sparring sessions. She also was invited to the Irish International Boxing Camp in Edenderry under the tutorship of Liam Brereton.

She has like her Dad, dabbled in other sports in the Gort Community School where she is a popular leaving cert, including team sports Camogie-where she excelled as a full back and especially Basketball-which she really enjoys as a forward.

"I'd encourage every young girl to try every sport once, the individual and the team, if you are interested in a particular one just go with your guts" she urges.

For Cliona-she is fairly cool about her pre-tournament build up "lots of running, gym and a very strict diet regime are what give me the focus on the way into a bout" she notes.

She is coy about what puts her in the zone prior to getting into the ring but she does admit that she listens to a lot of Dubliner Luke Kelly's upbeat music in her cans before the fights.

Even with 7 National Youth titles under her belt and the historic first Irish World at her grade she is committed to defence of her title as she is still under age next year and she is not neglecting he books, with her eye firmly on an educational career post leaving cert.

Cliona definitely has a long career and bright future ahead of her, but she says she's taking it step-by-step. "For now, I want to stay amateur. I'm taking one step at a time. The Olympics would be a big goal but baby steps first" she cautions.

While the Irish Athletics Boxing Association have been very good to Cliona - in sponsoring all her travel and attendance to Training and High-Performance Camps as well as the International Tournaments she still has to have a few loyal sponsors in her corner.

Luckily for her Whyte Security, Casey's Sports Bar Birmingham and Murray and Co. Birmingham have been very supportive of her journey so far.

Final word to Ritchie however "Will you let readers know we are looking for a new premises here in Gort for the Club !"

From the 1950's to the 90's the FCA were a familiar sight around Ballinasloe, attending several outdoor events, splendidly attired in their green uniforms and shiny boots. The FCA (Forsa Cosanta Aitiuil) had succeeded the LDF (Local Defence Force) which was set up by the Government in the 1940's because of an ever increasing threat to its neutrality.



The headquarters of the 'B' Coy 16 Btn FCA (Ballinasloe) was in the Old Railway Hotel on Sarsfield Road. It had been leased by the Dept. of Defence, having previously been based in the Garda Barracks in Main St. (1940-42), and the Military Hut in Kilconnell (1955-59). The area of 'B' Company membership extended from Kilconnell to Newbridge in the West, to Lawrencetown and Shannonbridge in the East.

The late Michael Kitt of Caltra, who was later to become a TD, was the first of the FCA officers to

be commissioned in 1946. He was succeeded by Ambrose Gannon, who served up to 1959 and was followed by Commdt Peter Cummins (1959-63), Commdt Thomas Quinn (1963-1970), Commdt Oliver O'Grady (1970-1977), Capt Michael McCullagh (1981-89), Commdt Dermot O'Dowd (1990-94) and Commdt John Diskin (1994-96).

The Coy had yearly training camps in Finner (Donegal) and the Curragh (Kildare) during the 60's and 70's as well as many other. The FCA had taken part in numerous activities over the years, including An Toastal in 1954, the visit of the Rosary Priest, Fr. Peyton to Loughrea; the Pope's visit to Knock, the annual St. Patrick Day's parade and had performed Guards of Honour for important dignitaries when they visited the town. The also attended events in surrounding villages and brightened up many a function as they marched in a very dignified and colourful unit.

When the Cuban Crisis arose in 1963 the Ballinasloe unit was posted to Shannonbridge and set out locations in the battlements to monitor what weapons were issued and a full inventory of all trucks, drivers' names and addresses, and to place the Emerald Ballroom under its command, on the instructions of the Dept. of Defence.

A branch of the FCA was formed in Garbally College on 1st September 1952, which encouraged many students to enlist. Among those who joined up was 678833 S.S., John Kirby, on 10th October 1954 and was in Finner Camp in 1955 and Dun Ui Mhaoiliosa in 1956. The now retired Bishop of Clonfert left the FCA on 23rd August 1956 to enter the seminary and join the priesthood.

'B' Coy trained their members in the use of weaponry including .22s, .303s, Brengun, Gustaf, Ving and 81mm Mortar etc. Attendances would average 70/80 per week at the outdoor practises. Under the supervision of highly trained personnel,

the young members found being able to use live ammunition was a very serious and responsible matter. It also gave the recruits their first form of discipline.

In 1961, the first 16th Btn Dinner Dance was held in the Hodson Bay in Athlone. The CO called it an opportunity to give "wives and sweethearts a chance to come out of the woodwork." Over the years the FCA enlisted many young men from a very wide area, resulting in life-long friendship. No longer do we see the marching men in green around but we applaud the service that the FCA has given for almost half a century.

The local River Suck has enjoyed an increase of 55% or 439 lock passages visiting the Marina in 2022, with 1229 boats being recorded in 2022 compared to 790 in 2021. The increase in visitors has positive effects on local tourism post COVID.

Within the last three years, tourism along the Shannon river has been developing. Since 2019, domestic bookings have risen by 40% and there has been a large increase in registered boats along the river, with 9,000 being reported two years ago to just over 9,500 this year. Waterways Ireland recorded over 14,000 boat journeys through the river Shannon in the six months to June of 2022, which is higher than in the same time period in 2021.

Half of the 439 passages through the lock in Poolboy would come from private cruisers, with the other half being hired cruises. A portion of these passages can be attributed to local boat owners, but the significant portion of hired cruises

highlights the many tourists travelling into Ballinasloe.

“This goes to show that promoting the wonderful waterway and facilities on offer can make a huge difference in attracting more visitors and tourists. Roll on the 2023 season and looking forward to seeing you all out on the river in the year ahead” stated Graham Bartlett Chairperson of the local Branch.

Faite Ireland hopes to continue to revitalize tourism on the river during the decade to encourage people to visit the towns and ports along the waterway. The agency will focus on upgrading Ireland’s old, relatively inefficient fleet and growing cruise business. Modern, larger boats have the ability to cater for groups and families. In 2018 boat rental companies sold about 4,000 “rental weeks” to more than 17,000 tourists, indicating the strength of this strategy in providing for large groups of individuals. Additionally, this strategy lent itself well to people looking for ‘staycations’ during the pandemic.

The River Suck Branch is the 25th and newest Branch within the IWAI network. The River Suck is ideal for anyone travelling the river for a daytrip, and the marina featured conveniently in the centre of Ballinasloe allows visitors to explore our town. This tourism will also benefit our local economy, allowing greater marketing opportunities for our town.

“Well done to IWAI River Suck branch - increase of 55% more boats with more people coming to visit and enjoy Ballinasloe and surrounding areas! Onwards and upwards in 2023!” exclaimed Senator Aisling Dolan.

The archaeological finds uncovered in Society Street during the course of monitoring of works for Ballinasloe Water Services Upgrade and Town Enhancement Scheme were the subject of a fascinating talk by Creagh native Fiona Maguire, Member of the Institute of Archaeologists of Ireland, before a capacity audience in Ballinasloe Library last November.


As part of the team from Atlantic Archaeology, a Sligo-based company, Fiona had been working on the project since July 2018, when in May 2020 portion of a Late Medieval/Post-Medieval cemetery was uncovered at the foot of Church Hill, under the pavement and roadway outside Supermac's and McGorisk's Pharmacy. This discovery cannot have been altogether surprising, for in 1968 a human skeleton was found at the same location during the erection of an ESB public lighting standard. Duly noted by Professor Rynne of UCG, the remains had been

left in situ.

A total of 10 articulated bodies and a large quantity of disarticulated bones were discovered, approximately 12 centimetres down from the pavement and road surface, amounting to 18 burials of individuals all under 45 years of age at the time of death. Interments had taken place between the years 1477 and 1638. There was no evidence of the use of coffins, which would not have been unusual during the period in question. To judge by the arrangement of the limbs, the bodies had been wrapped in winding sheets. A curious feature

of some of the burials is that light-coloured stones had been placed where supposedly the individual had a pain or injury while alive, a mortuary practice reflective of the belief that in this way the body could be healed of its afflictions after death. Of special interest were 65 barrel-shaped beads, probably animal bone, discovered about the feet of a female aged between 35 and 44 years. When strung together they formed a six-decade rosary.

Also recorded was a circular drystone well constructed from angular limestone blocks built in courses. It had been backfilled with layers of post-medieval building material. A well in a cemetery seems counterintuitive. It may, however, have existed prior to the graveyard, and afterwards functioned in a ritual context, not as a source of potable water. At present its location is marked by an arrangement of contrasting paving stones on the



The real significance of the Society Street excavations consists in the corroborative evidence they offer of the development of the town west of the Suck earlier than the 18th century. Petty's Atlas of 1683 shows a church on a hill near a street of houses. Surely this must be what we now know as Church Hill, once the location of a possible Bronze Age hillfort. (Whether this or the structure that occupied the site of St. Michael's Church was the

legendary Dún Leodha remains a matter of speculation.) The 1837 Ordnance Survey map shows the 1818 St. John's Church of Ireland surrounded by a ditch or bank which has since disappeared from the grounds of the present building, though a segment of it can be seen extending across the upper end of the grassy, enclosed area at the back of the Town Hall. An old name for Church Hill was Knockadoon (Cnoc an Dúin: Fort Hill), while later it became known as Cnoc an Teampaill, translated as Temple or Churchyard Hill. The Canons Regular of St.

Augustine once owned the site of the Society Street graveyard, and in pre-Reformation times the Canons, who were secular priests, not monks, served the parish of Kilclooney from the Priory of St. Mary in Clontuskert. It would hardly be too fanciful to suggest that the foregoing points to the existence of a pre-Reformation church on the summit of the hill associated and contemporaneous with the Society Street cemetery.

Fiona's talk was followed by a question-and-answer session, after which she was presented with a framed replica of the rosary beads referred to in her lecture.

The third volume of “The History of Moore and Creagh in the Half Barony of Moycarn” by Sandra and Padraic Kilduff was launched recently in Moore Hall by Dr. Christy Cunniffe.

Seven years research and writing, interviewing and digitalising old photographs culminated in three volumes and almost 1500 pages about the survival of landowners and tenants rich and poor from the 6th century until the 1920’s.

This dedicated pair have now finished a gargantuan project with the launch of Volume three just within one year of the other two companion books. The duo received sponsorship from Roscommon Co. Council, the Moore History Group, and dedicated local history lovers, allowing this passion project to be finalized.

Sandra and Padraic were born in Ballinasloe, both having achieved Masters in History, now living in Moore. They both feel the books are not just written for academics, but for the ordinary causal reader. Their highly researched and referenced work is aimed at students and youth to foster a love of the

history of Ireland, and of their own area in South Roscommon and East Galway.

The couple launched the initial two volumes in December 2021 to a limited crowd due to Covid restrictions, but was streamed worldwide to many spectators. Sandra and Padraic thanked all their supporters who provided photographs and information for the book at this event, and Dr. Christy Cunniffe congratulated both authors on their achievement with the seminal volumes release.

The volumes feature tales regarding the lives of the different landlords and indeed land owning families with their personal, economic and social lives being explored. Volume three particularly highlights the lives of people in Moore and Creagh who strived to gain ownership of their lands against the Royal Irish Constabulary during the late nineteenth and early twentieth century.

These landowners had a profound impact on our local history and abroad. Readers from Ballinasloe can use these book to reflect on the struggles of their ancestors in holding their lands for future generations.

A Key Town businessman and one of Clifden’s proudest sons passed away at his residence in Kilgarve on the 3rd of January. One of eight children, Jim was born to master tailors in 1932. They loved their months in the sunshine and spending countless hours getting to know their Yankee grandkids. Jim could often be found soaking up the sun in the back yard before heading down to his “abroad local” Fiddlers Green in Millbrae, CA, where he had his very own corner and a pint or 4 of Coors Light, his holiday drink of choice.

Genial Jim Burke was larger than life –he never met a stranger, walked like he owned every street in whatever country he was in – his marble-topped cane adding even more gravitas to his already impressive silhouette – and met many world leaders, including US Speaker Nancy Pelosi, California Governor Gavin Newsom, and Taoiseach Leo Varadkar to name a few, he loved their parties where often he knew more the guests than they did!

P.J. Hill, who passed away in his 90th year, at his home in Derrymullen, Ballinasloe, was one of four brothers who learned to be cobblers and shoemakers in Society St. It was their late father, Pat Hill from Kilconnell, set up the business in the early 1950's and trained his sons in the footwear business.

Born in Menlough, P.J. later moved to Kilconnell and attended the local National School, where he was often prevailed on to act as telegram boy or postman, while still in school. Afterwards he worked as a barman in different locations before joining his late brothers Bobby, Jimmy and Liam in the Society Street workshop, learning the shoe trade from his late father.

Over sixty years ago, P.J. decided to branch out and set up his own business in Bride St., Loughrea. His brothers, Jimmy had done likewise in Galway while Bobby moved to Roscommon, leaving Liam in charge of the Ballinasloe premises, with his late father. His youngest brother, Kevin, had moved to Dublin to work for Custom and Excise.

P.J. married Eileen Donovan from Brackernagh in the fifties and they had three children, Mary (Connaughton), Robert and Paul. Robert, went on to work in Dubarry for several years before joining his dad in the Loughrea business. They became one of the most industrious and popular outfits in the lakeside town before the dreaded Covid brought an end to their business a few years ago.

Coming from a musical family, P.J. was a versatile accordion player, as was his brother Liam and they often joined their brother Jimmy, who had a part-time band. A former secretary of the local athletic club, PJ loved cycling the roads in the locality and further afield, and in the evenings enjoyed his membership of the Bridge Club.

Possessed of strong religious beliefs, PJ was very committed to his work as a Steward at Knock Shrine, his involvement in the House of Emmanuel Providence, Clonfert and his dedication to a number of local charitable organisations, over very many years.

The late P.J. Hill is survived by daughter Mary, sons Robert and Paul, sister Noreen and many more relatives and friends.

A FRIENDLY AND OBLIGING NEIGHBOUR



Down through the years, **Tommie Aherne** from Cleaghmore was often described as "The Good Samaritan" helping out neighbours, friends and accident victims, at all hours. He was always charitable in his deeds and believed in the motto of "never seeing anybody stuck" and refusing to accept payments for his assistance. These little acts were done with love and joy, and were part of the "muscular christianity" of Tommie's faith.

The fourth eldest of a family of eight children born to Michael (Mick) and Mary Aherne, Tommie was born in 1927 and lived out his life on the family farm. He was a farmer, husband, father, lifelong Pioneer and self-taught accordion player, who also sang in the Church choir. His capacity for work was never diminished. He expanded his interests, delivered milk in the town as well as supplying building sand and later, with his good friend, the late Paddy Kenny, started manufacturing concrete blocks.

In the 1950's, Tommie bought a Morris Minor car and started supplying milk to the town's householders, twice a day. He married Maureen Cunningham, from Kilcastle, Ballydangan, in 1962 and sold his cement mixer to fund a brief honeymoon. They were blessed with seven children but Maureen unfortunately passed away in 2017 after 55

years of marriage.

In their later years, the couple travelled on holidays abroad, particularly to Medjugorje and The Holy Land as well as visiting families overseas. A man of deep religious faith and a caring family man, Tommie, with others was instrumental in having the unnamed dead burial grounds in Cleaghmore suitably commemorated and having a grotto and Crucifix erected. It was later named the Famine Memorial Park by the local committee. He also joined his sisters in the Church choir, allowing him to combine his love of family with his joy in singing.
